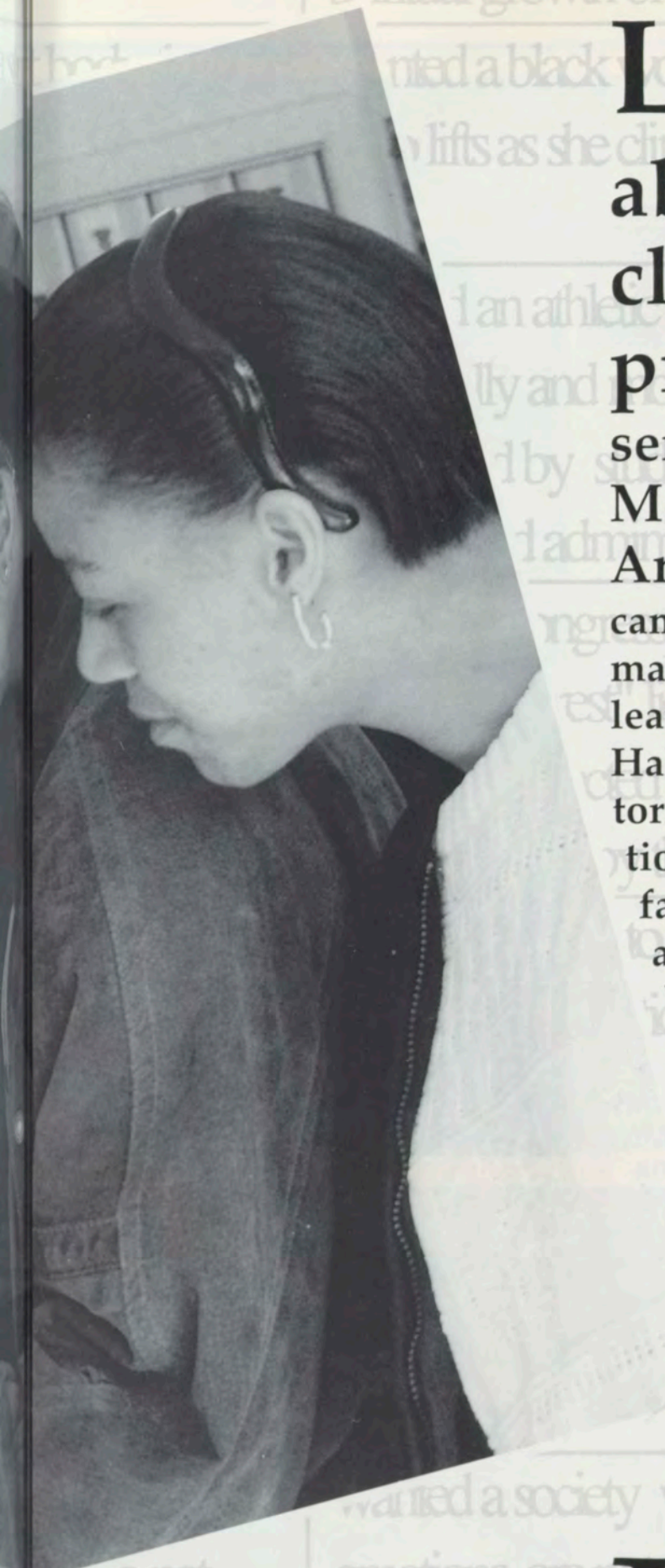

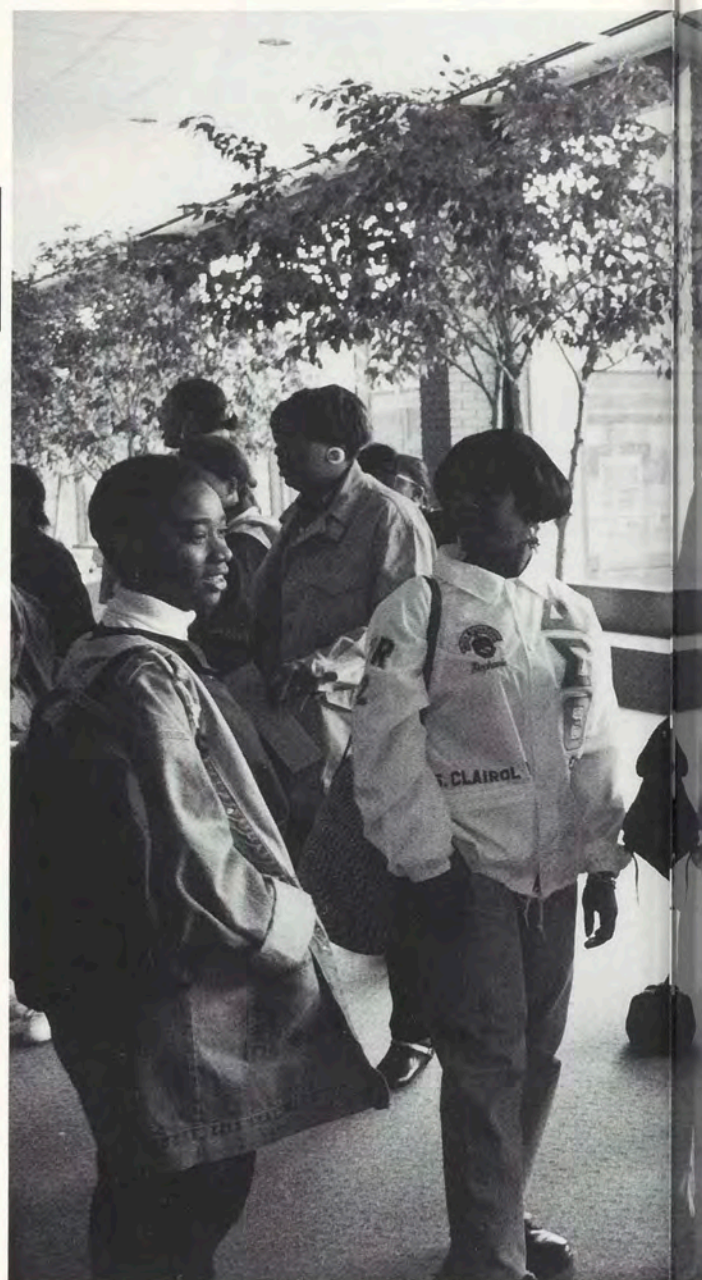
Changes at Spelman

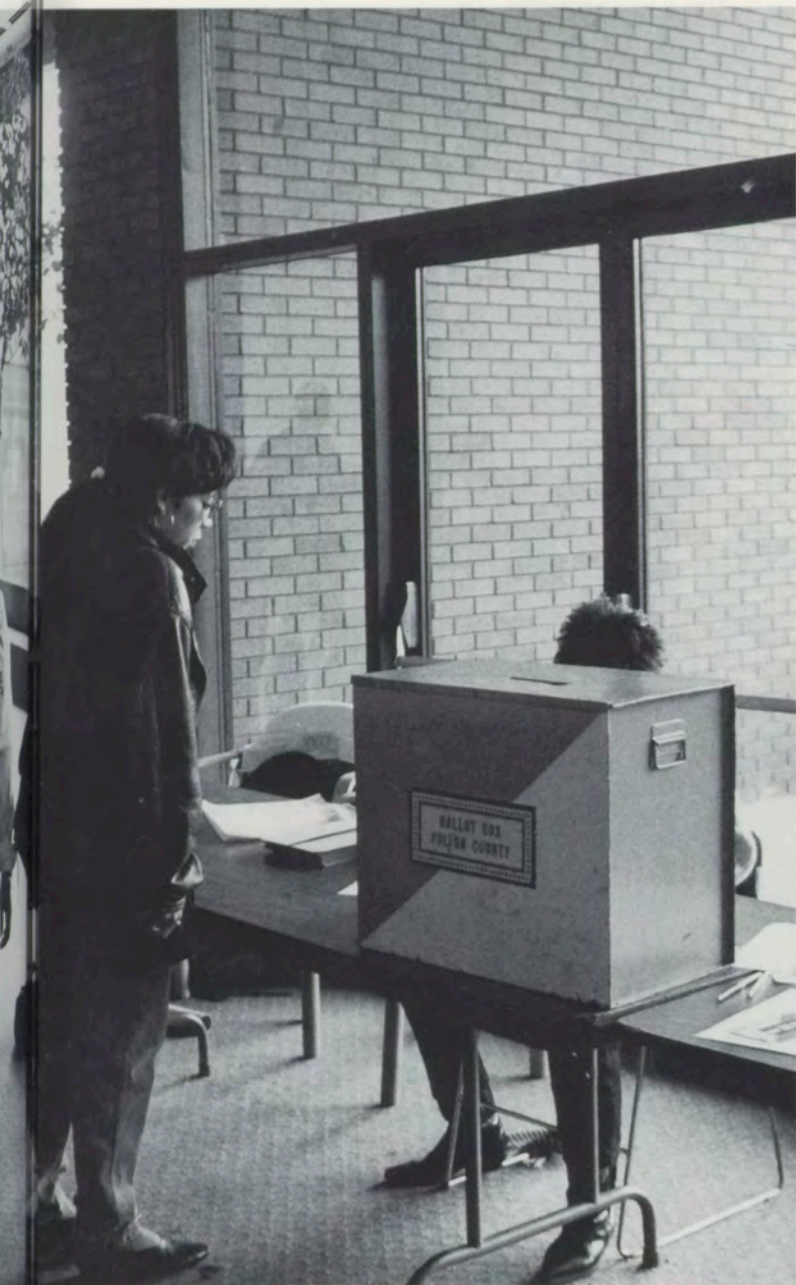
This year Spelman students witnessed many changes in policy as well as in practice. Beginning in August, Mr. Fred Buddy, Spelman's Registrar, instituted new registration policies. In an effort to expedite registration for some those students whose balances were paid by registration did not have to stand in the dreaded financial aid line, notorious for adding 2 hours to your registration experiences. Additionally, the location of registration in Lower Manley as opposed to Read Hall seemed to add not only organization, but also a little more comfort to the registration process.

Another change witnessed during this school year was the change in convocation time. This year for the first semester, convocation was scheduled from 7:00 P.M. to 8:30 P.M. Tuesday and Thursday nights. Many students were not happy about this change and their complaints were heard. Second semester, convocation returned to its previous time of 11:00 A.M. to 12:00 P.M. Tuesday and Thursday.

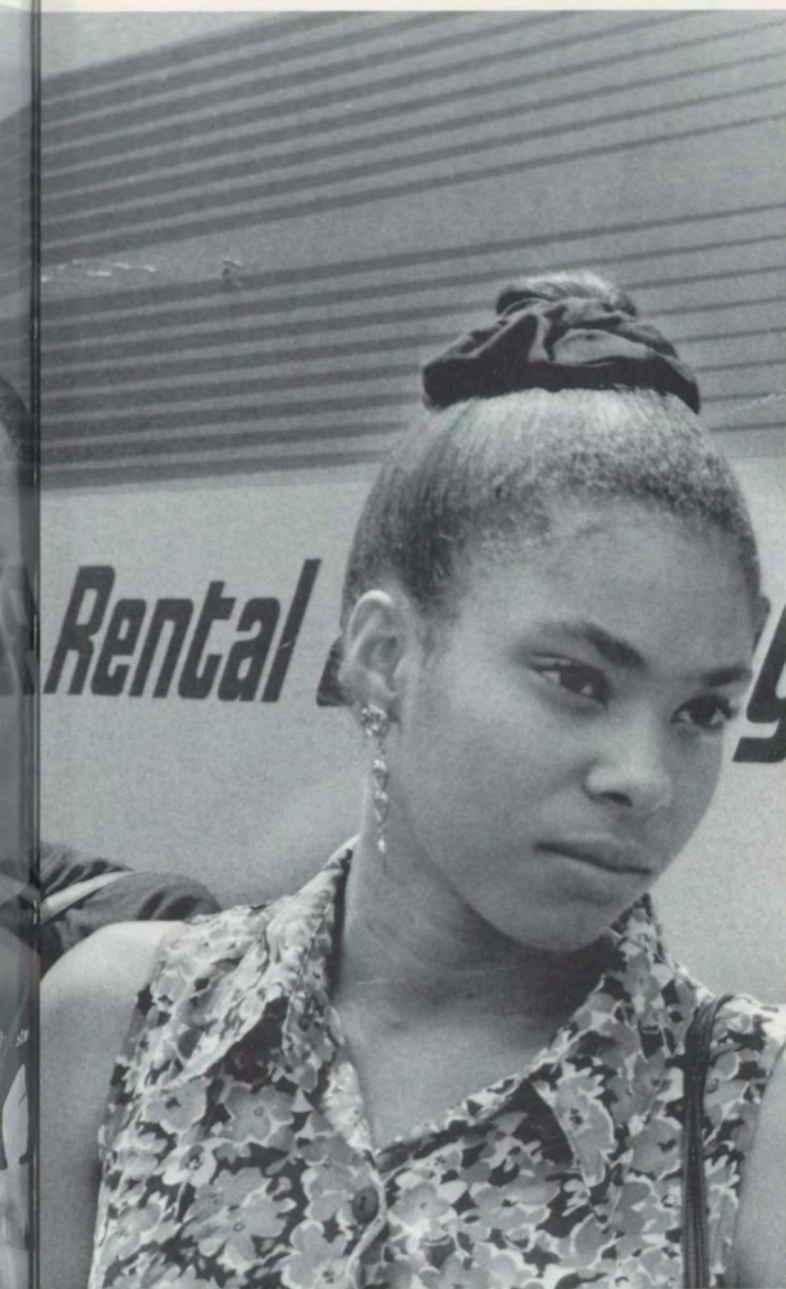

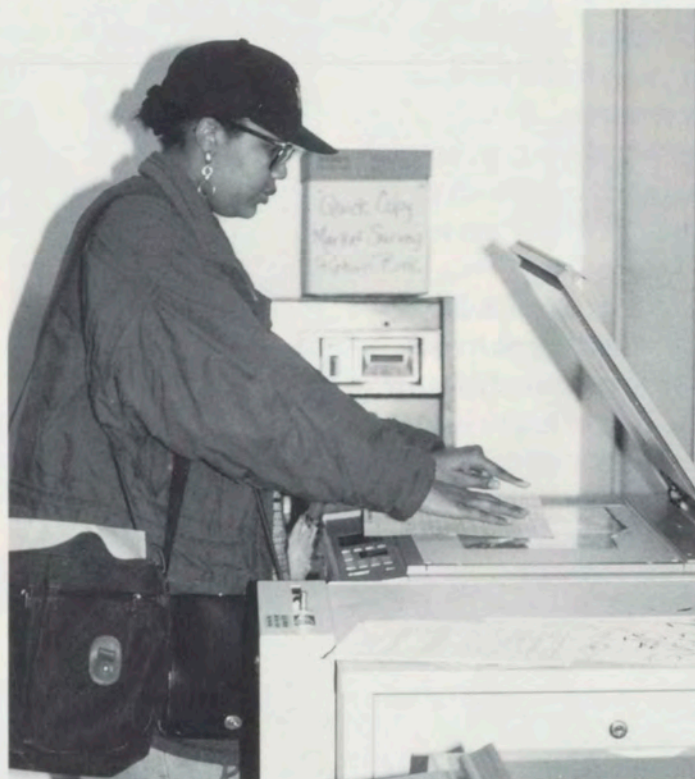

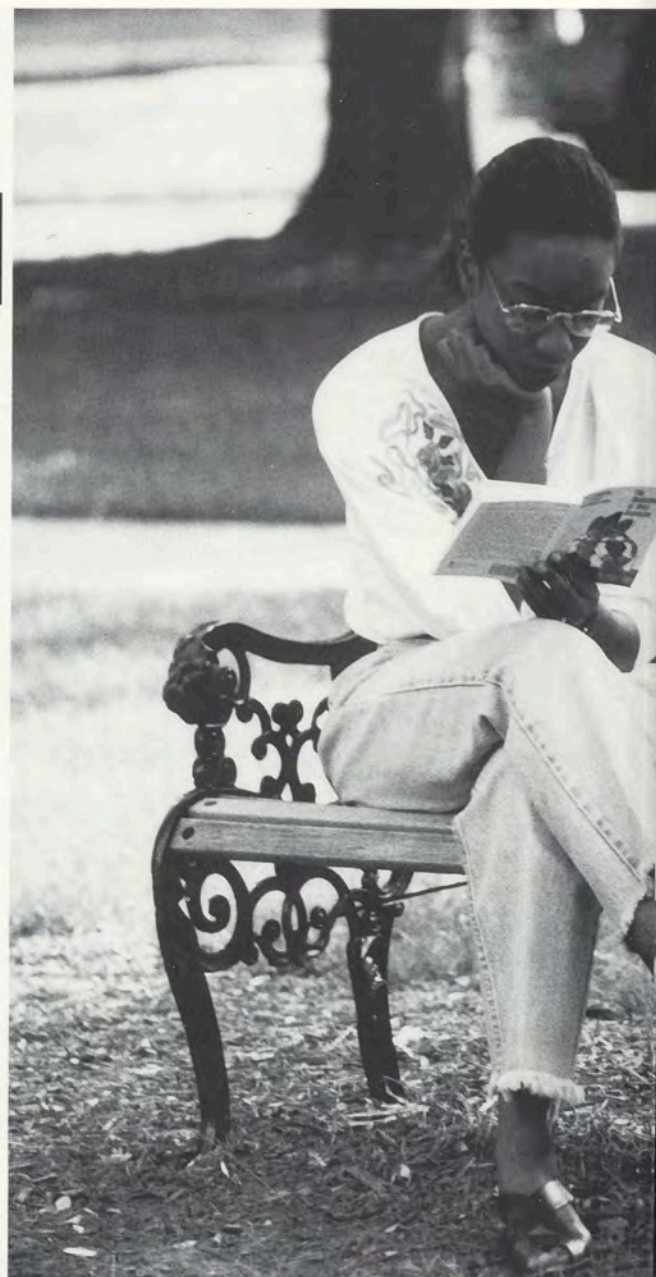

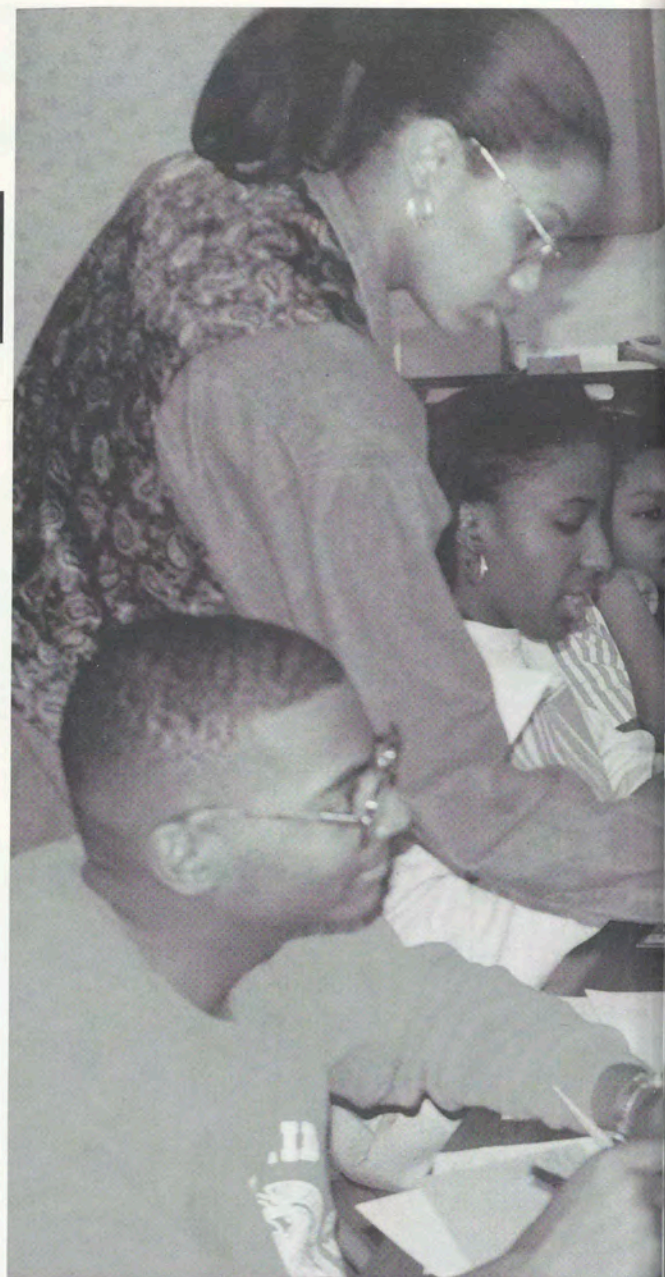

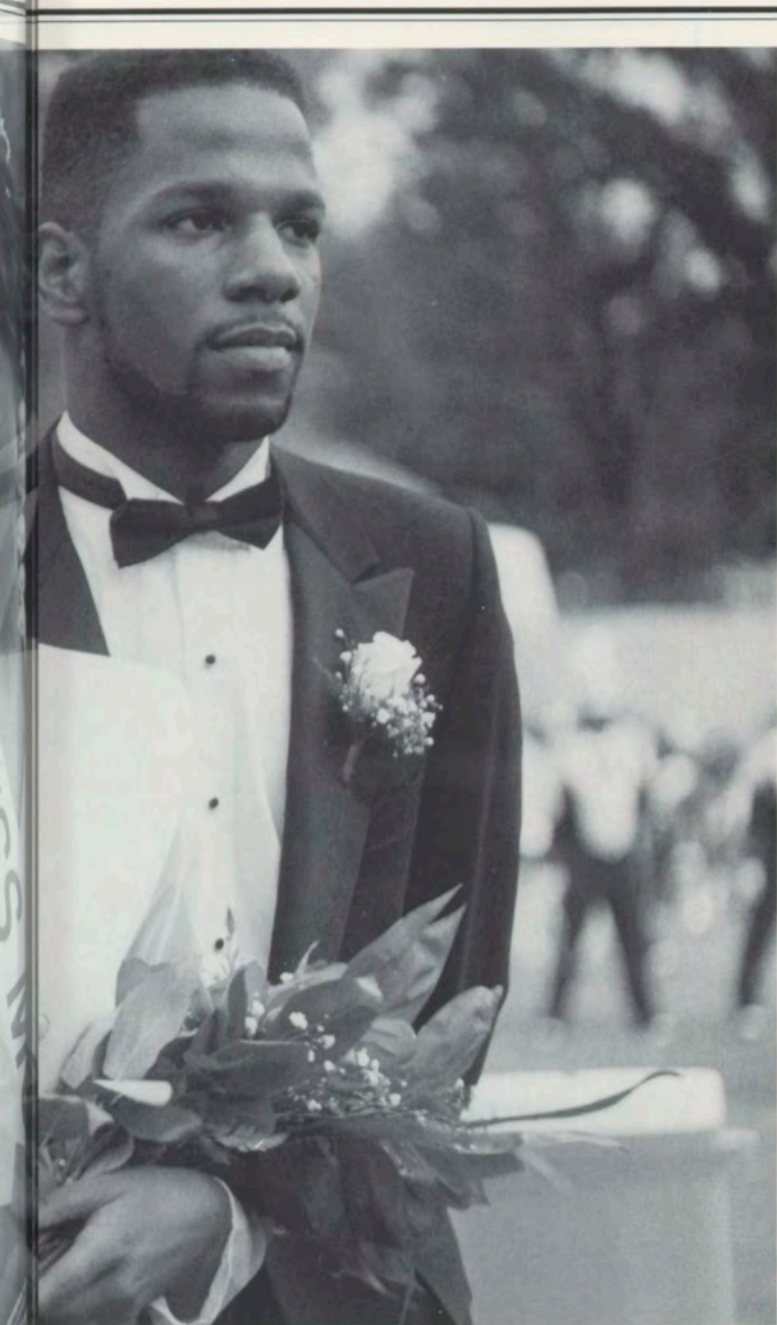

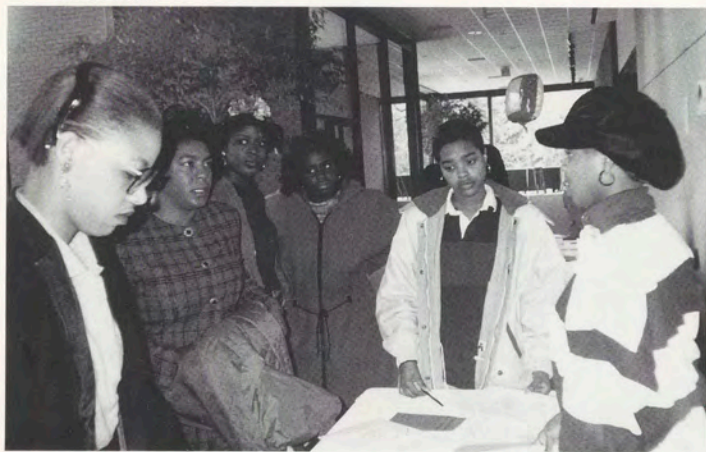

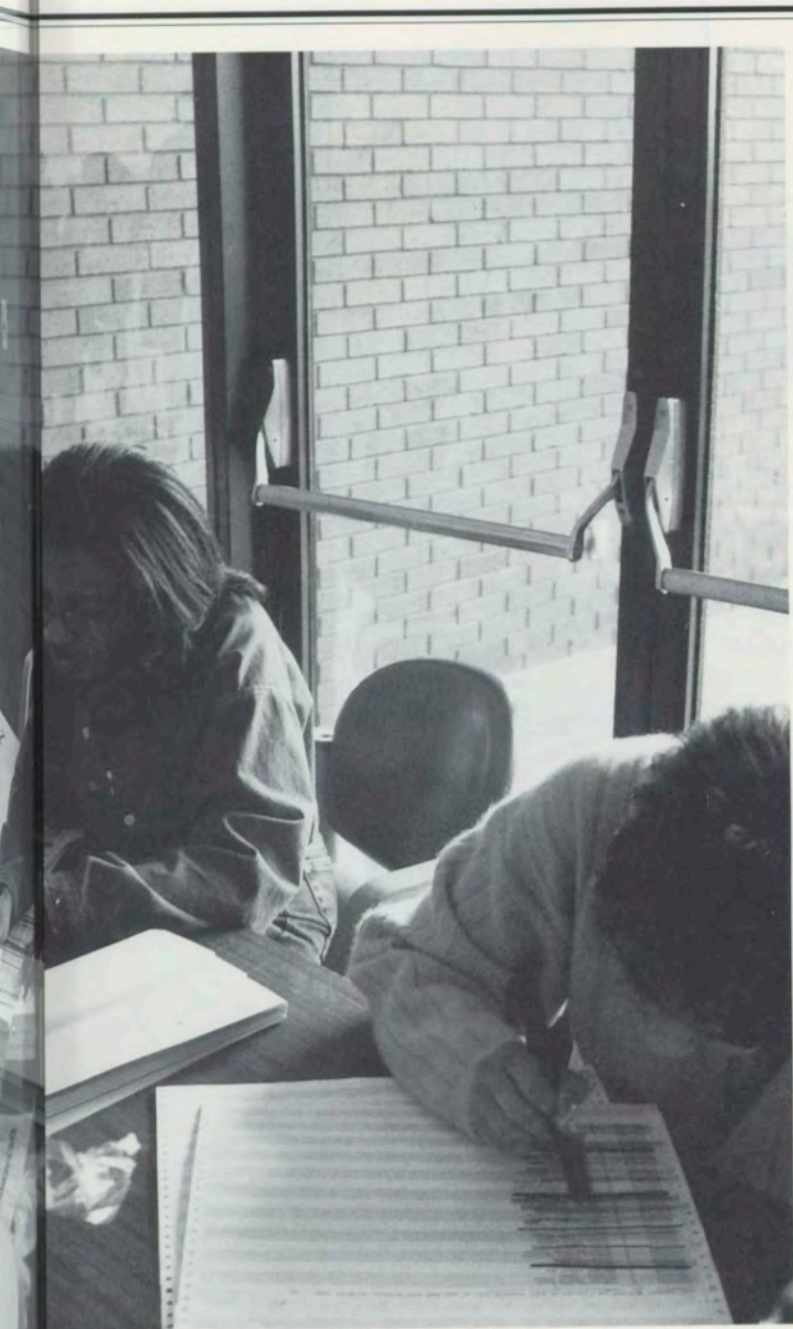

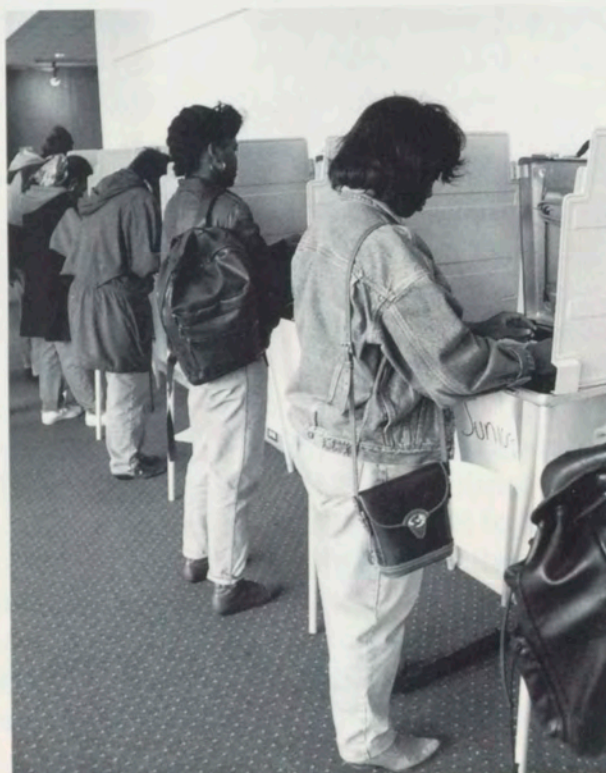

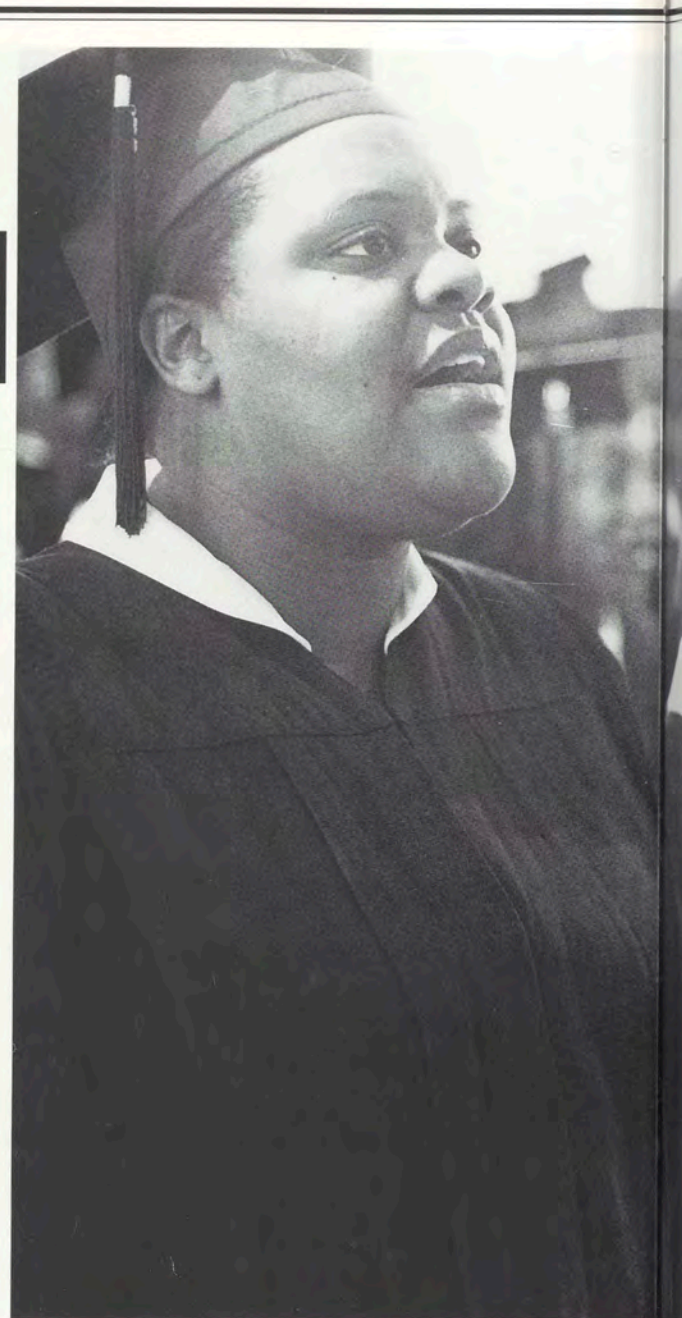

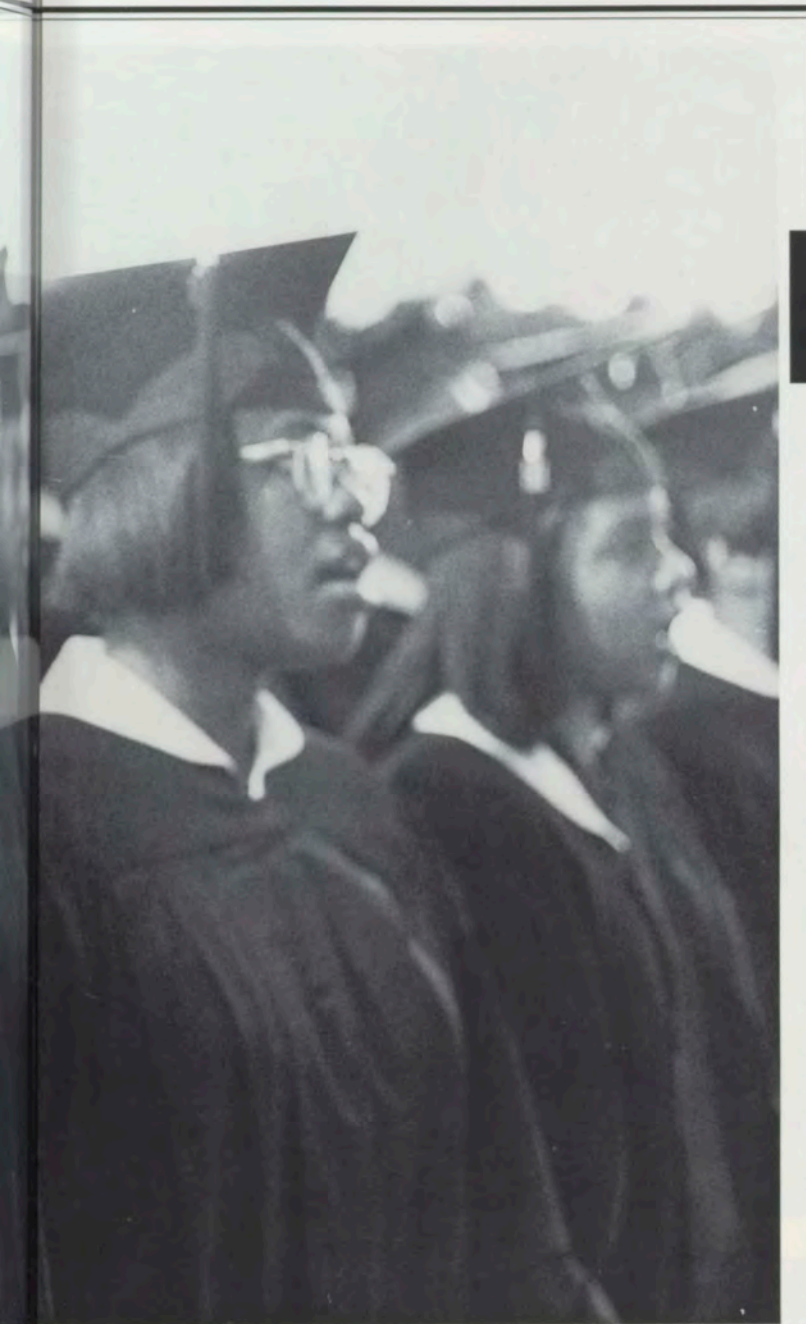

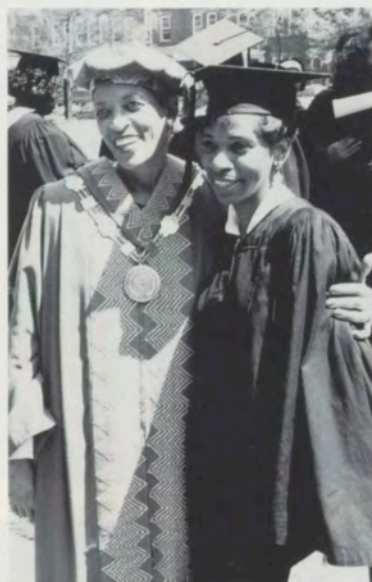

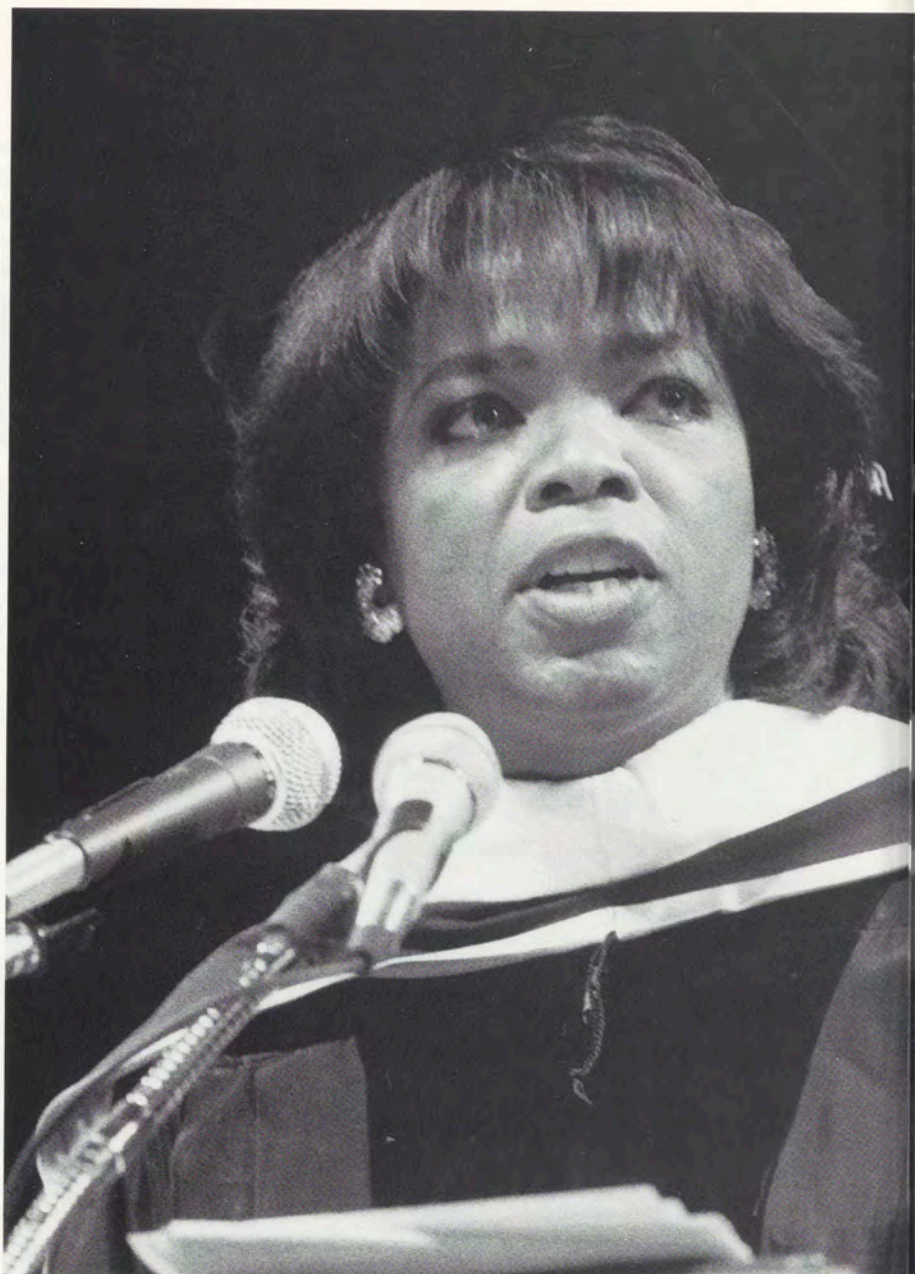
Commencement

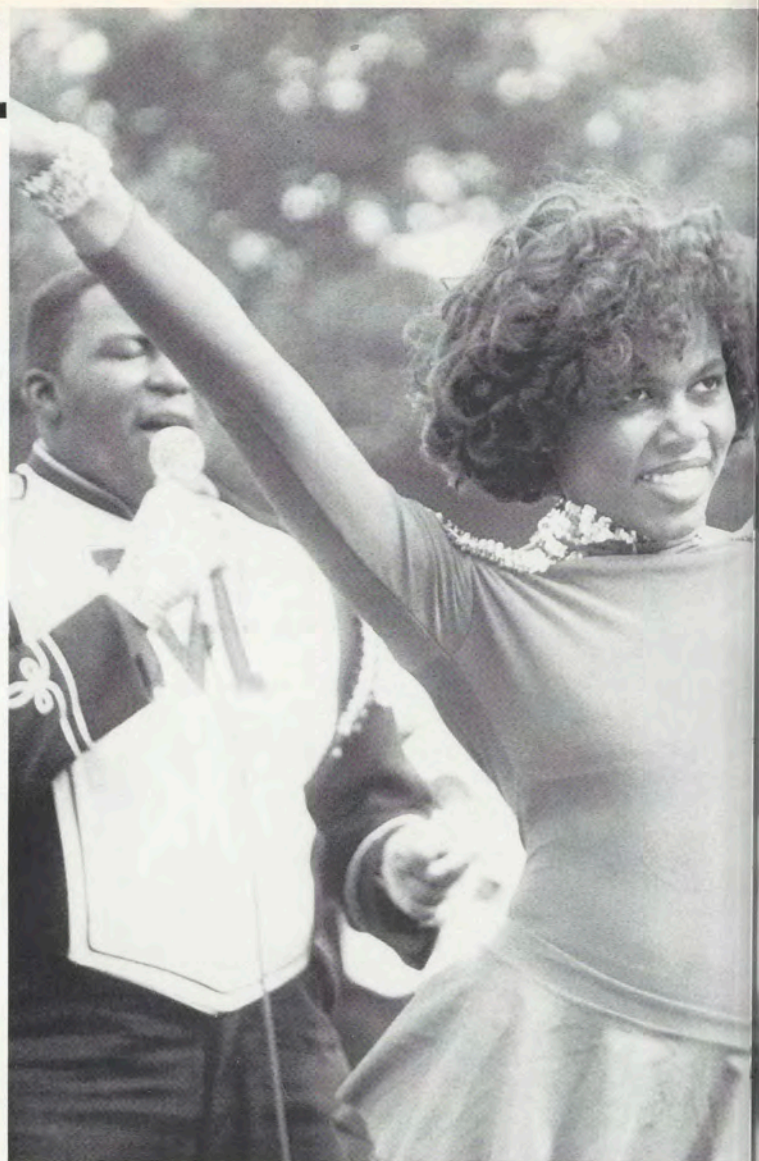

Sports ≠ Spelman

Although the sporting events at Spelman are often overlooked financially by administration and generally by the student body, Spelman women involved in these activities were truly dedicated to their team whether it was basketball, swimming, volleyball, tennis, or track. Despite this neglect, Nicole Martin, a member of the basketball team explained, "Spelman athletics provides competition as well as a good work out."

Maricia Bennekin, a veteran Spelman athlete, stated that Spelman athletics were very different from her high school experiences. "Going from an established program to one that we had to establish, not having enough equipment nor proper transportation was difficult at first." She recalled a time when they traveled "15 deep" in one van with equipment. "If anything would've happened, we would have been in trouble." When asked how she felt about the neglect she had experienced as a member of the basketball team, Maricia stated, "Everything is on the backburner..if it's not Glee Club or something academic then it's not what 'Spelman' is about." However, most members of the basketball team maintained at least a 3.0 g.p.a. Explaining her disappointment with students lack of support, Maricia stated, "Sisters, will go over to Morehouse and pay \$5 when our games are free!" Finally, Maricia stated, "I love to play so much that I could care less if one person is in the stands. I play for the love of the game, not for recognition. People look at our record and say 'Man, they're not doing so well,' but if they would come to our games they would see that they are close games and we are good."

Indeed, our sister athletes have not received the support, praise and recognition that they so deserve. Perhaps it is time that administrators and students recommit ourselves to actively supporting all aspects of a Spelman womanhood. We must embrace our athletes because being an athlete at Spelman is one of the many ways Spelman women demonstrate leadership, team work, and commitment.

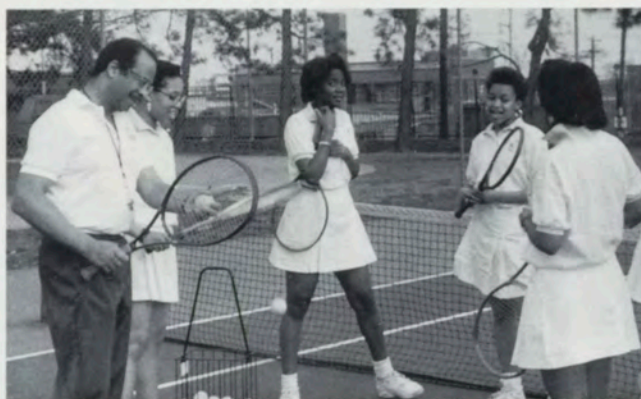



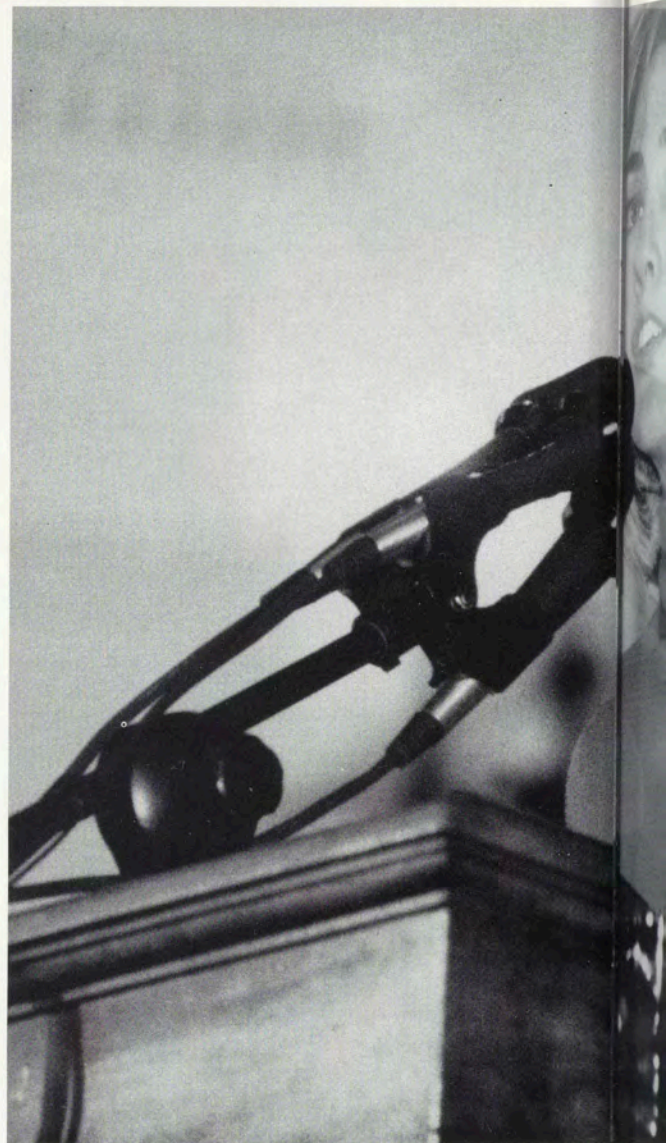

From the boardroom to the stateroom, women have made great strides by assuming leadership positions previously occupied by white males. Leading the way, First Lady Hilliary Rodham Clinton took an active and often controversial role in the national leadership. Additionally, Janet Reno became the first female United States Attorney General and Carol Mosley Braun became the first African American woman elected to the Senate.

Sister To Brother

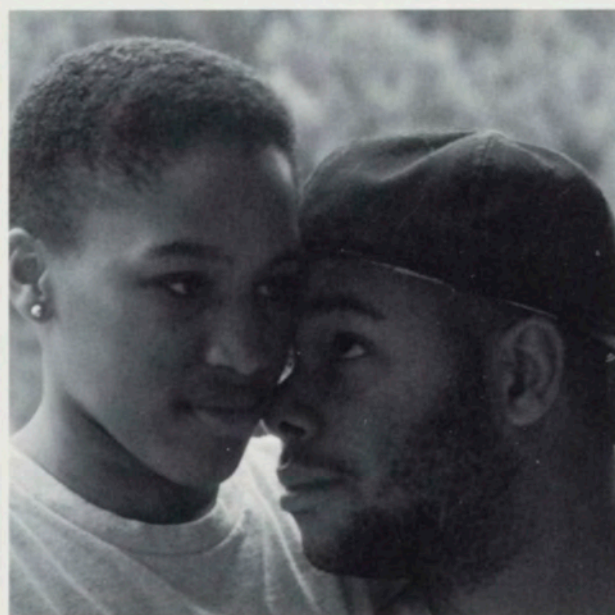

Images. Perceptions. Both are powerful entities in our society that often shape and mold how we view ourselves, as African American women, and how others view us. Television, movies, and videos are filled with varying portrayals of Black women; thus, we must be very careful about what we categorize as entertainment. Dr. Mona Phillips states it best in

"Why Sha-na-na and Wanda aren't Funny"....

And we laugh. It is difficult to explain why it is important to be critical and careful of all the nice dishes (served on gold-plated platters) served to us in the name of "entertainment" and black "visibility." It is difficult to explain - because we laugh...

...At us. At someone's idea of the "diversity" of us. We probably think that the carefully-constructed "girlfriend" is the "opposite" of Sha-na-na. You know: The Girlfriend. The feminized, middle-class one playing "audience" to an adolescent's stand-up comic's weekly routines. You know: The Girlfriend: My fiance goes to Spelman... and on and on. But it is just television, so we laugh...

...At the continuation of the history of resources (i.e., our love of language, our fondness for the colorful, our wit) taken from colonized communities, sold back in distorted, unrecognizable form and at a very high price...through the conduit (this time) of young, very talented African American artists and actors. We accept (oh so gratefully), and we laugh at someone's idea of us sold to us in twelve-minute portions sandwiched between the beckonings of capitalist interests telling us we can be better women and men. Just try a new and improved soda, lipstick, beer... And we laugh because - well, just because. And we laugh until we actually do begin to recognize us in the unrecognizable, and find our sanity in someone else's madness. And we keep laughing at Wanda and Sha-na-na and us and...

....any other thoughtless comic on late-night cheap programming who can put together a routine sitting on the toilet two minutes before it is "showtime" because the laugh is on us...and everyone knows that material full of easy laughs/lays can make careers... ..these comics spreading the misogynist word about Wanda and Sha-na-na and the Invisible Girlfriend...I suppose it is time for our...

...laughter to edge not right into silence - but rather to slide left into a maniacal scream. And the loud letters that will deluge the offices of those who make us up so that they can sell lipstick and haircream will make them wonder if we have lost our collective mind...and make them wonder if maybe Sha-na-na and Wanda were bad ideas - ...because no one is laughing...

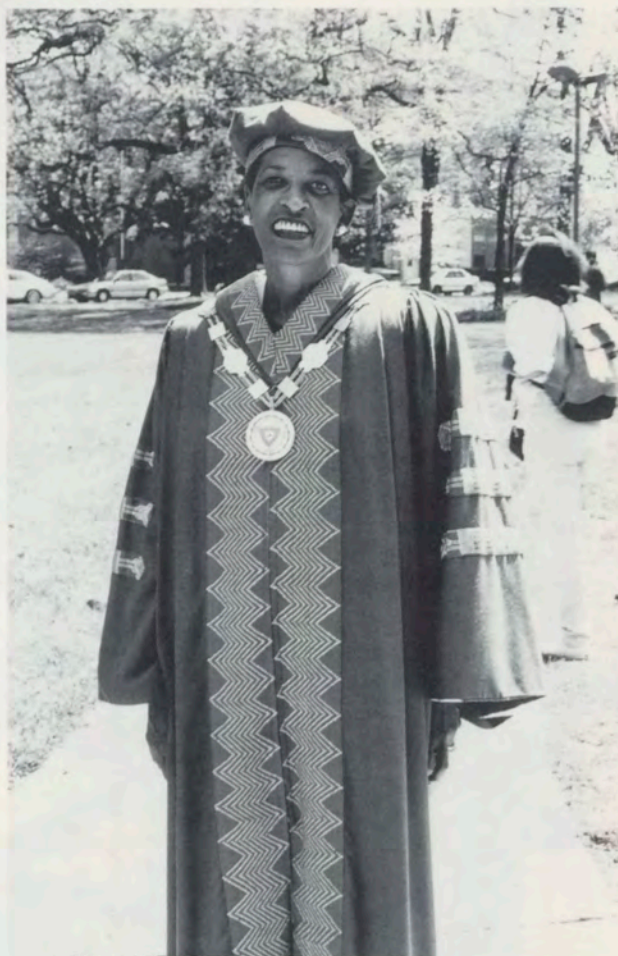

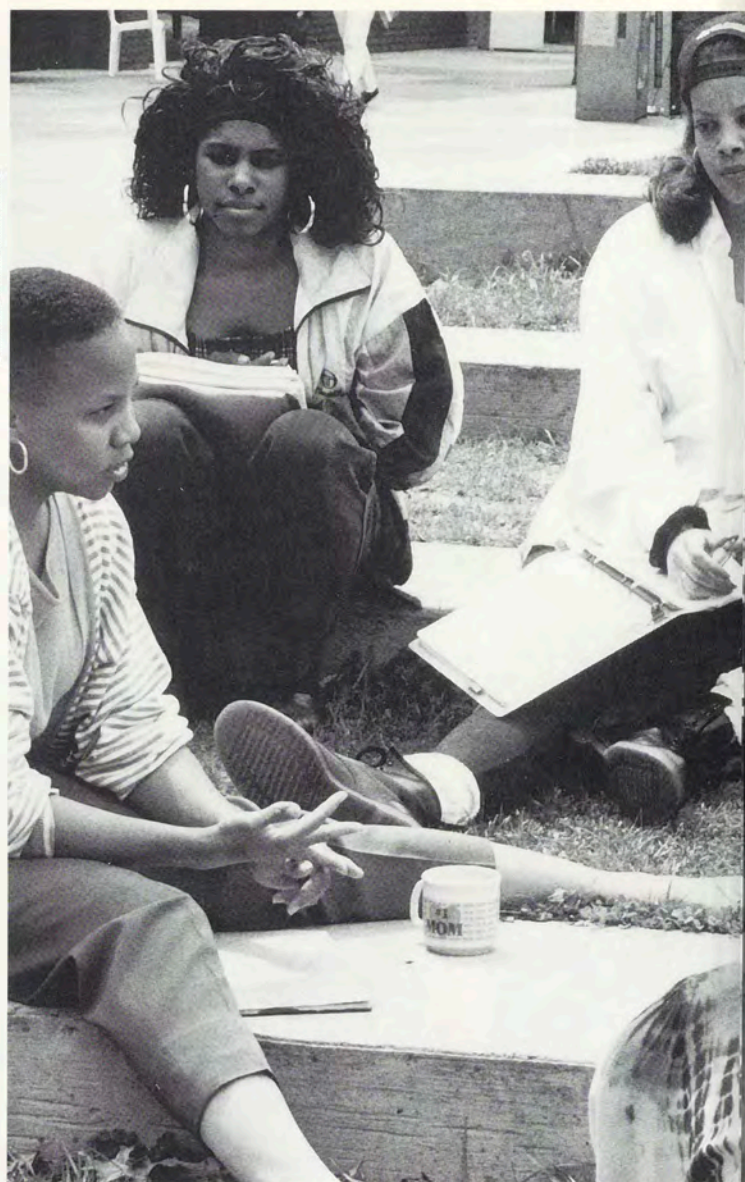
Faculty

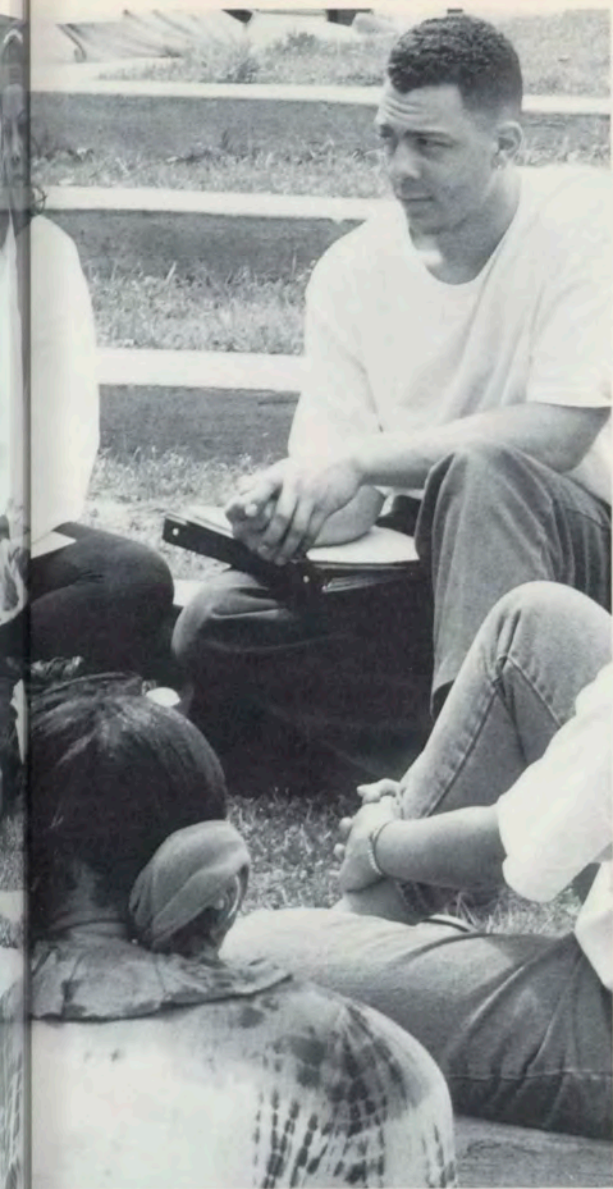

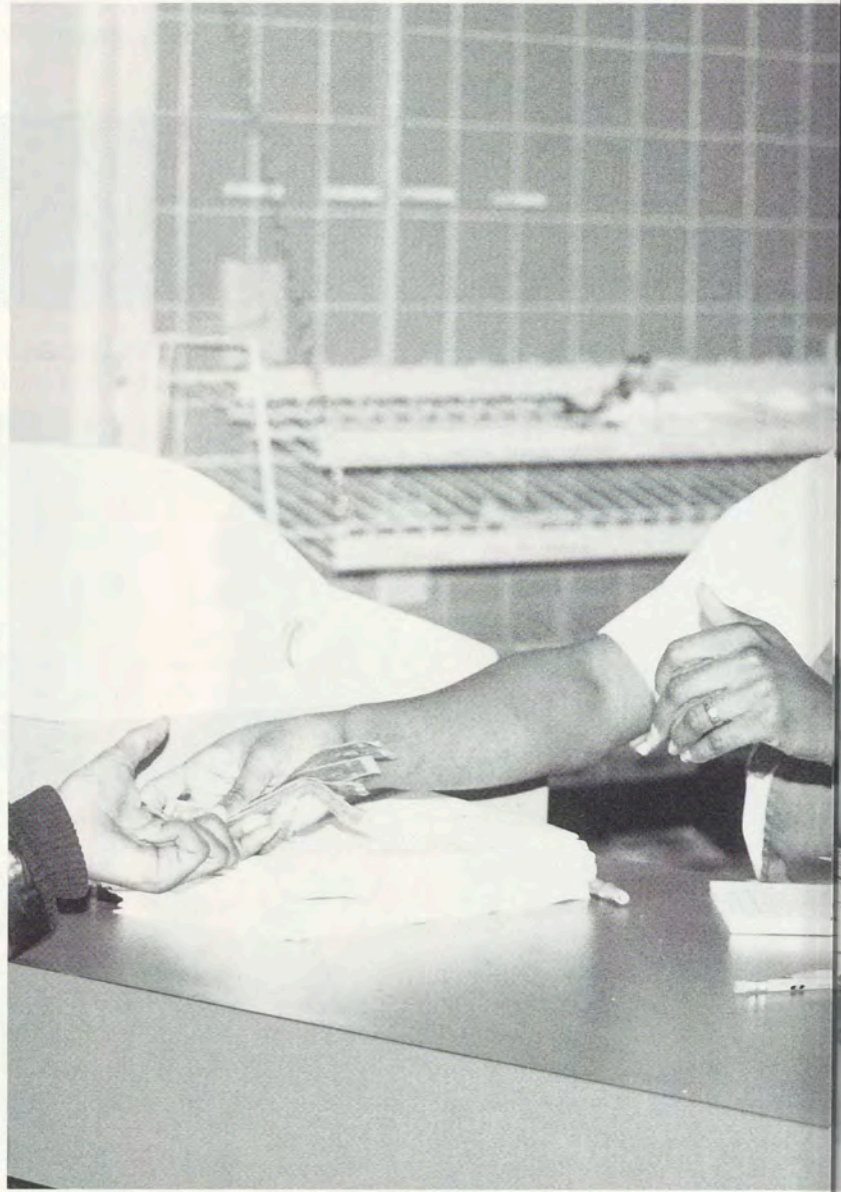


Dr. James Gillam and Teffone Taylor discuss the Tiennaman Square crisis at lunch.

COMMENTARY

Now that my thanks have been given, I have a few other things to say. First I want to explain the concept behind this publication. I wanted to produce a publication that was an honest reflection of what students feel. No sugar cooking or diplomatic censoring. Spelman is a wonderful place, but no place is perfect and when we neglect to recognize faults, then we can never grow or improve. Unfortunately because the staff was sooo small and new to yearbook production, all of the issues that I would have liked to cover more thoroughly like Continuing Education students, faculty tenure or students who are mothers were not covered. I wrote 95% copy, took 95% of the pictures, designed 95% of the pages. I'm not bragging, but to be quite honest the publication suffered because I did so much. How can a publication that is supposed to represent the ideals and concerns of over a thousand African American women be a fair representation through the eyes of one person? I did my best, but it should have been better. There should've have been more people on the staff. There should've been better participation with group pictures and there should've been a lot less attitude. Many of you have not even bothered to stop by and pick up your yearbook from last year. You deserve truth and quality publications, but they will never exist if you don't participate. I long for the day when there will be no taboo subjects at Spelman like Academic Dishonesty, Sororities or Homosexuality. When sisters won't feel stifled by peer pressure or administrative rhetoric. But I truly long for the day when the individual student will feel a responsibility for her academic as well as social life at Spelman. I long for the day when town meetings will be well attended when elections won't be a three-ring circus, when students will be proactive and not reactive. As of today, July 30, 1993, there's no yearbook editor which means that no one cared enough to insure that you will get a yearbook next year. Don't complain because most of you don't even know where the yearbook office is!!! I'm not mad, just disappointed that so much talent is wasted. Anyone can do what I have done. I want this publication to start a dialogue between administrators, students, staff members. I will probably make some people mad, happy, surprised, and pleased, but I really just want to make you think. So I hope that this book sparks a fire in you.
