

THE SCHOOL

The Clark Atlanta University School of Library and Information Studies was established in 1941 at Atlanta University. The program is accredited by the American Library Association and the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools. The School offers a 36 semester hour program culminating in the Master of Science in Library Service degree. It also offers a sixth-year program representing 30-36 semester hours beyond the master's degree leading to the Specialist in Library Service degree.




THE HISTORY

Clark Atlanta University was formed in 1988 through the consolidation of Atlanta University, founded in 1865, and Clark College, founded in 1869. Enrolling 2,000 undergraduate and 1,000 graduate students from over 40 states and 50 countries, CAU is one of only two private, historically black, comprehensive universities in the nation offering degrees from the bachelor's through doctorate. The University is comprised of the School of Arts and Sciences and professional Schools of Business Administration, Education, Library and Information Studies and Social Work

THE PROFESSION

The rapidly growing library and information science profession offers diverse career opportunities and room for both personal and professional growth. In today's information-based society, information specialists, counselors, managers and librarians provide leadership in all areas-business, sciences, social sciences, technology and the humanities. Hence, people from all undergraduate majors are needed, as are those reentering the work force or changing careers. It is a profession in which the demand exceeds the supply, and the demand is expected to continue growing.



Programs in the Clark Atlanta University School of Library and Information Studies are directed toward preparing graduates to perform in information environments of all kinds: community organizations, libraries and archives, museum networks, information brokerage operations, information retrieval systems, schools, universities, special and public information areas.

Our special library contains the essential books, journals and resources pertinent to library/information studies as well as necessary audio-visual equipment. In addition, the reference, general and special collections of the Robert W. Woodruff Library in the Atlanta University Center are available to students and faculty, as is a Computer Science Laboratory.

THE EXPERIENCES

Internships

The Clark Atlanta University School of Library and Information Studies (SLIS) offers internship opportunities as a part of the curriculum for the master's degree program. The internship is a supervised, planned field work assignment at the professional level, in a library or information center. The SLIS 781 Internship course is required for state certification for students in the school media area of specialization.

Diverse internships offer master's degree students the opportunity to translate theoretical considerations into practical applications while earning three to six credit hours. Past internships have been arranged with the Atlanta, Fulton and DeKalb County Public School Systems, the Coca-Cola Company, IBM, Equifax Corporation. The Atlanta Newspapers, Inc., McKinsey and Company, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, Georgia Power Company, AT&T, Chrysler Corporation, Time Inc., the Carter Presidential Library, and the Salvation Army Officers Training School. Post-degree internships are also encouraged and have included positions at the Library of Congress and the National Library of Medicine.

The Colloquim Series

The Colloquium Series presents lectures, demonstrations, films, field trips and other learning experiences to help students become familiar with trends and issues in the profession.


Placement

The School of Library and Information Studies maintains a Placement Service for graduates, designed to assist alumni in securing professional career positions. The placement services of Clark Atlanta University and the Atlanta University and the Atlanta University Center are also available. The School receives numerous requests for its graduates from libraries and other information agencies throughout the country.

ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS: MASTER'S DEGREE

Graduates of colleges and universities accredited by a regional or general accrediting agency are eligible for admission. Admission requirements for the master's degree are: 1) A bachelor's degree from an

accredited institution.

FINANCIAL AID

The School awards a number of tuition scholarships, grants and traineeships to entering full-time students. Awards granted annually by the School are made on the basis of scholastic achievement and financial need.

Assistantships with monthly stipends are available in the School of Library and Information Studies. Part-time employment is available in various public, special and academic metropolitan libraries in the Atlanta area.



2) Three recommendations, including references from former professors or employers giving evidence of the applicant's potential for successfully pursuing graduate studies and a career in the library/information profession. 3) A minimum cumulative undergraduate grade point average of 2.50 on a 4.00 scale. For applicants with grade point averages below 2.50, consideration for admission may be given if there is a higher GPA in the undergraduate major, if there is a higher GPA in graduate study, or to those with library/information related occupational experience. 4) The results of the Test of English as a Foreign Language (TOEFL) for foreign students. 5) An interview with the student may be requested by the School.

6) The results of the General Test of the Graduate Record Exam (GRE) as reported by the Educational Testing Service. Although current test scores are preferred, reports up to five years old will be accepted.

An applicant may request transfer credit for a maximum of six semester hours of graduate study in library/information studies. Graduate hours may be transferred only from a school of library/information studies whose program is accredited by the American Library Association. Those who have earned a master's or higher degree may request a reduction of not more than six hours in the 36 hours required for the Master of Science in Library Service degree. Students may take courses for enrichment, transfer or certification and may be admitted on a non-degree basis. Juniors or seniors in undergraduate colleges within the Atlanta University Center may enroll in 400 level courses with the approval of the Dean of their

The Specialist Degree Program is designed as a formal continuing education experience for those who hold the master's degree in library/information studies. This sixth-year program of study, which is planned with students in terms of their individual career goals, updates knowledge and skills, strengthens areas of specialization, and redirects career goals. Courses are to be selected and the research project is to be performed in consultation with a faculty advisor appointed by the Dean of the School.

COURSE OF STUDY
