The Ponder Heart, and off Broadway in Come Share My House. She was seen in the Paris Festival production of The Skin of Our Teeth with Helen Hayes and Mary Martin, and in Berlin with Ethel Waters. She has been gathering new audiences with her one woman show along the college circuit.

PETER DE ANDA (Judge) made his New York début earlier this season in an off-Broadway production of Julius Caesar. He is a graduate of the Pittsburgh Playhouse School of Drama and has appeared in Pittsburgh with the Irene Kaufman Players in Of Mice and Men and A Hatful of Rain. He can currently be seen in the motion picture. Poor Little Sam.

MORRIS ERBY (Newport News) recently completed a tour in The Desperate Hours which starred Sammy Davis, Jr. He has appeared in many major plays on the West Coast, including The Blacks, The Rainmaker. The Connection and Raisin in the Sun. Mr. Erby's film appearances included Onionhead with Andy Griffith and Man on a String with Ernest Borgnine.



LINCOLN KILPATRICK (Deodatus Village) studied with the American Theatre Wing, and made his Broadway début in *A Raisin in the Sun*. His off-Broadway appearances have included roles in *Deep Are The Roots* and *Ballad of Jazz Street*. Mr. Kilpatrick had a leading role on television's Naked City opposite Nina Foch and Patrick O'Neaí, and will be seen as Jim in Huckleberry Finn.

LEX MONSON (Missionary) returns to The Blacks after a stint on Broadway in Moby Dick. He made his New York début in an off-Broadway production of See How They Run, and appeared with the Abbott Players of Chicago in many productions. Mr. Monson was the head of speech and drama at the Nolan School in Detroit and the Radio Institute of Chicago, was a dance instructor at the Duncan School of Dance and founded his own school of drama and speech in Chicago.

THELMA OLIVER (Virtue) got to New York with the Broadway bound Kicks and Co. While on the coast, she appeared in the motion pictures South Pacific and Pirates of Tortuga. Since coming to New York she has danced with Pearl Primus' African Dance Co. and the Donald McKayle Dance Co. Off-Broadway she has been featured in the musical Fly Blackbird, the N.Y. Shakespeare Festival production of The Tempest and at the Stroller's Theatre.

ESTHER ROLLE (Felicity Trollop Pardon) has appeared off Broadway in 4-17 and has worked extensively with community theatres. She has been lead dancer for the Asadata Dafora troupe, and she toured with Massie Patterson's Calypso Carousel. Miss Rolle has sung as soloist with calypso orchestras, and she was guest artist on tourwith African Holiday.

HAROLD SCOTT is again appearing in a Genet play after his personal success in the playwright's *Deathwatch*, for which he won an Obie Award. He appeared in the Broadway company of *The Cool World*, for which he was cited as Most Promising Actor by Variety. He was in the Broadway tryout of *Kicks and Co.*, and off-Broadway was seen in *Death of Bessie Smith*, *Dark of the Moon* and *The Jackass*. Mr. Scott is presently training in the repertory company of Lincoln Center.

LOUISE STUBBS (Augusta Snow) was first seen on Broadway in *Take a Giant Step* as Christine. She appeared off-Broadway in *Tryout, Light in the Cellar, The Jackal* and *The Other Foot.* Television audiences have seen her in *Harlem Detective.* She is a grad-

BRAVOS FOR HEY YOU, LIGHT MAN

"Oliver Hailey is a young playwright with a future. In "Hey You, Light Man!", which opened last night at the Mayfair Theater, he discloses an imaginative gift expressed felicitously in terms of theater.

Mr. Hailey knows how to create a mood and how to shape a character. Although "Hey You, Light Man!" sounds echoes of Pirandello in its preoccupation with the contrasts between illusion and reality, it establishes a delicate atmosphere of its own. In its treatment of its two principal characters, it arrives at a good deal of wistful, humorous individuality. Madeleine Sherwood plays Lula Roca with endearing warmth.

Alfred Ryder, who has staged "Hey You, Light Man!" with ease and felicity, plays the leading man with bittersweet grace.

There are other able performances, but it is the work of Miss Sherwood and Mr. Ryder, who are on stage almost throughout the play, that stands out. "Hey You, Light Man!" is well worth investigating both for these performances and for the chance to meet a promising new American playwright."

GENE FRANKEL (Director) has directed some of the most successful productions ever presented off-Broadway. In 1960 he directed Sophie Treadwell's Machinal for which he won the "Obie" as Best Director of the season, while Machinal was awarded the Vernon Rice Award for Best Production of the Year. He was director and co-producer of the Ibsen-Miller An Enemy of the People which ran a year off-Broadway, and Volpone for which he won the "Obie" as Best Director, and which was awarded the Lola D'Annunzio Award for the outstanding achievement in the off-Broadway Theatre. Mr. Frankel has directed Moment of Fear for NBC and Volpone for the Play of the Week. He is currently the director and head of the Gene Frankel Theatre Workshop.

SIDNEY BERNSTEIN. The Blacks represents the third successful producer-director collaboration between Sidney Bernstein and Gene Frankel over the past twelve years, the others being the prize-winning Volpone of 1956-57, and the pioneering off-Broadway production of Nat Turner in 1950-51. In 1959-60 he produced Summer of the 17th Doll in association with the Washington Arena Stage, and in 1958 presented Horton Foote's Midnight Caller and John Turner Davis.

GEORGE EDGAR. While Mr. Edgar, a young Wall-Streeter, has had a long record as a theatre angel, *The Blacks* represents his first role as a producer. In the medium of the art film, he produced *A Boxel of Cherries* which is enjoying wide critical acclaim.

ANDRE GREGORY. Last season Mr. Gregory co-produced *Deirdre of the Sorrows*, and was manager of the American Theatre at the Brussels' Worlds Fair two years ago. Before that he was assistant to Jean Dalrymple and stage managed at the City Center and the Phoenix. He is a member of the Director's Unit at the Actors Studio.

TALLEY BEATTY, who is responsible for the dance movement in *The Blacks* has won international fame both as a soloist and a choreographer. For many years he was associated with Katherine Dunham and more recently has come into his own as a choreographer.
