READY TO MEET

Wilson Broadbent, The Daily Mail's diplomatic correspondent, said Mr. Roosevelt's death apparently was one of the greatest shocks Churchill ever suffered. The secretary who broke the news withdrew for five minutes. He returned to find Churchil's eves wet, a half-smoked cigar cast aside and dispatches scattered before him.

The Daily Telegraph's political correspondent wrote that "two important events are impending."

"Allied troops may reach Berlin and advanced elements of the American and Russian armies may soon meet.

"The government is prepared for either event to occur earlier than had been expected a few days ago. The ministers are prepared to be called together any moment before Commons meets again Tuesday."

14 Lost as Tanker Rams Merchant Ship

NEW BEDFORD, Mass., April 14—At least 14 seamen lost their lives when an American freighter and a Canadian tanker collided and burned in Buzzard's Bay, the First Naval District at Boston announced last night.

The Navy said eight seamen still were missing and 38 hospitalized at New Bedford. Survivors of the American vessel said that their ship was proceeding in a dense fog when it was rammed by the Canadian tanker that immediately burst into flames.
