

GENERAL INFORMATION

Atlanta University is a member of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools, the Council of Graduate Schools in the United States and the North American Association of Summer Sessions. The courses offered, both graduate and undergraduate, are of the same standard as those offered in the regular session and carry the same credit. Members of the faculties of the six sponsoring institutions and educators from the faculties of leading institutions throughout the United States comprise the teaching staff.

REQUIREMENTS FOR ADMISSION

Atlanta University has an affirmative action policy and does not discriminate on the basis of race, religion, nationality or sex in its admission or employment practices.

A student is eligible for admission to college courses if he has completed 16 regular college entrance units or their equivalent in an accredited high school. Certificates listing entrance credits must be sent directly from the principal of the school attended to the Registrar.

Students coming from other colleges may take advanced courses upon presentation of letters of qualification from their institutions. Those wishing to transfer to one of the institutions in the Atlanta University Center should apply for admission to the school in question before the opening of the summer session in order that their summer work may be approved by the school they wish to attend.

Admission to the graduate and professional schools is granted to graduates of colleges of approved standing who have done sufficient work in the field in which they wish to take the degree to meet the requirements of the department concerned. Specific requirements for the various graduate schools may be found in the regular Atlanta University Catalogue.

All applicants must complete an official application form and present a transcript of all work taken at the college level or above as well as show evidence of good character, desirable personality and high ability. Forms may be obtained from the Office of the Registrar.

The University reserves the right to require at any time the withdrawal of those students who do not maintain the required standards in scholarship, those who cannot remain in the University without danger to their own health or that of others, and those whose presence is found to lower the moral tone of the University.

REQUIREMENTS FOR DEGREES

Undergraduate students should consult the dean of the college from which they expect to receive the degree in order to determine the specific requirements.

The requirements for graduate degrees are the same as those for the general session and may be found in the Atlanta University Catalogue or the special announcements and catalogues of the various schools of the University.

Requirements for candidacy for the various degrees awarded by Atlanta University are stipulated in the regular University catalogue.

VETERANS

Atlanta University will do all it can to assist veterans of any branch of the armed forces to enter its graduate programs. Veterans are required to meet the same standards as other students in matters relating to grades, class attendance, conduct, and graduation. The University will make whatever considerations are possible without lowering its standards and impairing the prestige of its degrees.

A POLICY STATEMENT ON THE CONFIDENTIALITY AND **RELEASE OF INFORMATION ABOUT STUDENTS**

Atlanta University, like other institutions of higher education, accumulates and maintains records concerning the characteristics, activities and accomplishments of its students. Because the University recognizes the student's right of privacy, a policy regarding the confidentiality of the information which becomes a part of the student's permanent records and governing the conditions of its disclosure has been formulated and adopted. This policy reflects a reasonable balance between the obligation of the University for the protection of the rights and privacy of the student and its responsibility to society.

A student has the right, upon request to the proper official, to know of the existence and content of all materials that are in his official records kept by the University and to inspect and review such records except personally signed confidential documents placed in the file before January 1, 1975.

The student shall have the opportunity for a hearing by appropriate officials to challenge the content of the student's official University records, to insure that the records are not inaccurate, misleading or otherwise in violation of the privacy or other rights of students, and to provide an opportunity for the correction or deletion of any inaccurate, misleading or otherwise inappropriate data contained therein.

The information listed below is considered "public directory" information and may be released without permission from the student. A student does, however, have the right to direct that any or all of this information not be released without consent. Such request must be filed, in writing, with the Registrar's Office. Such items include:

- a. whether or not the student is currently enrolled;
- b. the school or division in which the student is or was enrolled and his or her class or year;
- dates of enrollment; C.
- d. degree or degrees earned (if any), date of degree, major or area of concentration and honors received;
- local address and telephone number; e.
- home address f.

All other information is considered confidential and may be released only under specific conditions. A full copy of the University's policy may be obtained in the Registrar's Office.

COMMUNICATION SKILLS REQUIREMENT

All entering students are required to take the examination in reading and writing on Saturday, June 17, 1978, in Dean Sage Auditorium.

The Communication Skills Examination will be given in two parts. First, a standardized reading test will be administered. This will be followed by an expository essay of between 400 and 500 words. The topics will be provided and are appropriate for the various disciplines and professions represented in the University Curriculum. There will be a number of current events topics also.

All students should register for the examination by filling out the form provided in their registration materials.

Test scores will be mailed to students by June 23.

Reading classes and composition classes will begin on Monday, June 26. ALL STUDENTS WHO DO NOT PASS THE COMMUNICATION SKILLS EXAMINATION MUST ENROLL IN A READING AND/OR WRITING CLASS THIS SUMMER.

Students are asked to use the following test schedule:

Students should bring their I.D. cards and a pencil.

EXPENSES

The tuition fee is \$82.00 per semester hour for undergraduate students and \$95.00 per semester hour for graduate students. The matriculation fee for students registering for graduate courses for the first time is \$5.00. All students pay a library fee of \$3.00. Students living on the campus pay a \$5.00 medical fee. (See Atlanta University Student Health Service, Page 5) and a fee of \$4.50 for Student Health Insurance.

Tuition, all fees and room and board are due and payable in full at time of registration.

REFUND OF FEES

No refund of fees is granted when withdrawing from the University unless the student has received permission to withdraw after making formal application to the Registrar. Students withdrawing during the first two weeks of school will be refunded two-thirds of the tuition. No refunds after the first two weeks.

The same policy as that applicable to withdrawing from school will be applied to dropping a course if the total number of course hours is lowered thereby. Dropping one course and adding another simultaneously will be considered a change in schedule, providing the credit hours are the same. Additional credit hours will be charged at the usual rate.

STUDENTS WITHDRAWING FROM THE UNIVERSITY AFTER REGISTRATION WILL *NOT* BE REIMBURSED FOR ROOM COST. ROOM DEPOSITS ARE NOT REFUNDABLE. Graduate women may obtain lodging in the dormitories at Atlanta University, and male students at Morehouse College. Local undergraduate students should contact their Housing Department for rooms.

Students living in the dormitories of Atlanta University and Morehouse College are required to furnish bed linen and towels. It is important that students understand that the school will not assume responsibility for supplying these items.

Room rent is payable at the time of registration. When a room is reserved for the Summer Session, it is expected that the student will remain in the dormitory throughout the session in which he or she is enrolled at the institution.

The cost for room and board for male students housed at Morehouse College is \$72.00 per week for single occupancy and \$59.00 per week for double occupancy. Female students, housed in the University dormitories, will be charged \$25.00 per week.

Students requesting room reservation for the Summer Session should send a money order or cashier's check, made payable to Atlanta University Summer School, to the Business Office, Atlanta University, Atlanta, Georgia 30314. The deposit for male students will be \$72.00 for single occupancy and \$59.00 for double occupancy for room and board. For female students a charge of \$25.00 for room should accompany the request. In each case, the deposit will be credited toward the total charge for room and board or room.

SECURITY DEPOSIT

Each female resident must make a security deposit of \$10.00 against damage to the dormitory property. This deposit is refundable by the Business Office upon proper withdrawal from the dormitory at the close of the Summer Session.

THE ATLANTA UNIVERSITY STUDENT HEALTH SERVICE

> Notice to Candidates for Fifth or Sixth Year Certificates

Students who are candidates for Fifth or Sixth Year Certificates from the Georgia State Department of Education must consult with the proper advisors in the School of Education in order to insure that the courses they take can be credited toward the completion of a planned program of studies leading to the Fifth and Sixth Year Certificates.

Students who hold Grants-In-Aid for In-Service Study from the State Department of Education for either Five-Year Study or Six-Year Study must consult with the proper advisors in the School of Education to insure that the grant will be used toward the completion of a planned approved Master's program or planned approved Six-Year Certificate Program.

COURSE LOAD

Normally, the maximum course load is 9 semester hours. Exceptions are rare and must be approved in writing by both the Advisor and the Dean of the concerned school.

THE GRADING SYSTEM

The grading system is set forth in the regular Atlanta University Catalog. Additionally, a grade of "D" may be used for undergraduate students.

CLASS ATTENDANCE

Requirements for class attendance are determined by schools, departments, and/or faculty members.

CANCELLATION OF COURSE OFFERINGS

Atlanta University reserves the right to cancel any course(s) because of unforeseen circumstances. Any changes prior to registration will be set forth in the supplementary announcement which will be distributed by or before the period of registration.

For most courses, class will meet eight weeks. The days and time blocks for most course offerings are listed on the pages that follow. Meeting stations and teachers will be available in the supplementary announcement.


