
improvements, only one thing is of definite certainty — change. From its humble beginnings as an experimental country, to its present influential position, the United States has undergone a constant metamorphosis that has resulted in its being extolled as a world power. Today, scientists and engineers constantly amaze even themselves by exacting results un-thought-of before. The energetic approach with which the United States tackles foreign affairs is to be admired. From the outside, life in the U.S. appears to be Utopian. Internally, however, an examinatory look shows that the competitive norm (known as the *American Dream*) that drives the United States has left some prosperous, while many are left to struggle for a substantial existence. Statistically, the suffering masses generally consist of minorities.

The largest minority group within the country is the *Black*, or *African-American*, race. In its struggle for civil rights and financial fertility, the majority of the *African-American* race is still entangled in economic suppression and racial discrimination. From infant mortality rates to homicide statistics, the lifestyle of the *African-American* is always significantly disadvantaged as compared to White citizens. In a land of supposed equality, statistics that are indicative of the quality of life in America are always lower for a Black person. The Black population in America is faced with a doubled-edged sword. On the one hand is the government and media who white-wash the horror of life in the *Ghetto* by terming it an epidemic — implying that attempts are actually being made to annihilate the situation. The other, perhaps even fiercer, hazard is the competition/negligence that Blacks face from each other — materializing in forms of hatred such as *Black-on-Black* crime and other genocidal acts.

B lack Rage is becoming an increasingly common term among the members of the American society. Provoked by glass-ceiling jobs, reverse affirmative action and lack of improvement opportunities, *Blacks* are striking out against their immediate surroundings — themselves. Deceived by "get rich-quick" dreams, poverty-ridden *Blacks* are reduced to the drugs trade and theft. Frustrations resulting from disease-infested neighborhoods, welfare entrapment, and constant belittling from the society at large often results in murder.

owever, this misery that the Black race is ensnared in is as much mental as it is physical . . . Some experts argue against mandatory racial quotas and other methods by which Blacks are pitted against more qualified Whites (more qualified in that they've been exposed to evolving educational methods and theoretical practices). It is said that these methods condition Blacks to believe that they are somehow less apt to

success than Whites. The belief that the world of power, wealth, and plush lifestyles "belong to the White man" runs rampant within Black communities.

Forgotten and overlooked by society, Black individuals are only exposed to the cycle of degradation and self-loathe that has existed in Black neighborhoods for generations. Most major cities seem to take conscious steps to overlook the Fruit of the Ghetto—Black children with the potential

entrapped in a world of crime, drugs, and danger. Cities re-route highways to connect suburbs — doing away with the need to travel the inner cities. Documentary programs show clips of the *Ghetto* as if it were some foreign country. Advertisements consistently promote politically incorrect messages such as "White is Right" and "Thin is In". Be it subliminal or direct, Blacks are leaning on the proverbial mental crutch.





Joint Venture: Olympicia Field Hockey Stadium Construction Under Way At Clark Atlanta and Morris Brown





he Olympic Torch was passed to Clark Atlanta University in June when CAU and the Atlanta Committee for the Olympic Games (ACOG) held a ground-breaking ceremony for the facility that will serve as a venue for field hockey when the Summer Olympics arrive in Atlanta in 1995. The 5,000-seat facility, to be completed by August 1995 by E.R. Mitchell Construction and Turner Associates/Architects & Planners, will be used for Clark Atlanta football and track events after the Olympics. It will also feature a full concourse service levels.

Adults and children from around Atlanta attended the historic ground breaking and watched the "turning of the dirt." The ceremony continued at Morris Brown College, where a ground breaking was held for the renovation of Herndon Stadium into a 15,000-seat facility that also will serve as a field hockey site during the Olympics. The two facilities, at an approximate cost of \$25 to \$30 million, will be located across from each other on Martin Luther King, Jr., Drive, connected by a pedestrian walkway.

MBC Graduate Has High Legal Aspiration



Education Majors Set Fantastic Record

This year thirty-two (32) of the graduating seniors at Morris Brown will receive degrees in Early Childhood Education. A quick review of the past graduating classes clearly highlights the significance of this impressive number: 1993—13 graduates; 1992—7 graduates; and 1991—2 graduates. We are looking at 1500% growth! In addition, it is critical to note that each of the graduates has already passed the Teacher's Certification Test (TCT) of Georgia. Few colleges can boast of that 100% achievement. Under the leadership of Dr. Edwina Hill-Miles and with support of dedicated faculty and staff, the department has flourished both in quality and quantity. Dr. Ruth H. Pace, Supervisor of Student Teachers, credits the success of the students to "the progressive leadership of Dr. Miles." "I am extremely proud of our senior class." Dr. Hill-Miles modestly said "Some of them, I am certain, will be future leaders in the field of education. Biology Student Co-Op's At N.A.S.A.

Ms. Tegi Ruffin gained some very valuable experience in her major this past year as a Co-Op student in the Controlled Ecological Life Support System (CELSS) Project at the Kennedy Space Center in Florida. The goal of the (CELSS) project is to evaluate the feasibility of biogenerative life support system for use in extended space missions such as lunar or Mars bases. Such a system would rely on agricultural production, carbon dioxide consumption), and waste processing system to recycle nutrients. In other words, NASA is attempting to design a small-scale version of the Earth's biological life support system for use by humans in space.

The KSC-CELSS staff has recently examined hydroponic

The KSC-CELSS staff has recently examined hydroponic plant growth on solutions containing nutrients recycled from inedible portions of crops (i.e. — leaves, stems, roots). One potential problem with this approach would be the toxic organic compounds contained in the liquid extracts of inedible crop material. Tegi was responsible for conducting bioassays for the presence of these toxic compounds. She examined germination success and root growth in wheat seeds exposed to various concentrations of extracts from both edible wheat and potato material. She also evaluated the effects of biological degredation of the organic compounds using bioreactors. Results indicated that the liquid extracts from crops do contain growth-inhibitory compounds, but that conditioning the material in the bioreactors largely eliminated these negative effects. In fact, growth stimulating effects were observed with certain bioreactor liquids.

Tigi's work included a variety of laboratory techniques involving chemistry, microbiology, and plant physiology. She was also responsible for compiling and analyzing the bioassay data, as well as presenting her results to the research group at the end of her assignment. The Co-Op position was an opportunity for her to gain experience within a research environment while providing assistance to the resident staff.

Ms. Ruffin is a junior majoring in Biology from New Orleans, La. She plans to pursue a career in Biomedical Research specializing in molecular genetics.







Arthur Edward Langford, Jr., the second child of Arthur and Florence Langford, Sr., was born October 3, 1949 in Atlanta, Georgia.

He attended public school in Atlanta where he graduated from Luther Judson Price High School. He later graduated from Morris Brown College. After graduating from college, he received training in the ministry. He was ordained as a Baptist minister at Free For All Baptist Church in 1971.

While a student at Morris Brown College, Senator

Langford reacted to the death of *Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.* by immortalizing him in a play, "The Life Of A King." This production has been performed at

colleges and churches nationwide.

As a young college student, he participated in a demonstration in support of workers at the Southwest Hospital in Southwest Atlanta. During the demonstration, Senator Langford was shot. Following this experience, he formed the United Youth-Adult Conference (UYAC). This organization continued to work in the community since its founding. In the 1980's, he and the UYAC organized weekly Saturday searches for Atlanta's missing and murdered children. He continued his work with this organization in the 1990's by searching for children and adults and by canvassing Atlanta peighborhoods for information about crimes.

He entered public life at the age of twenty-three when he was elected to the Atlanta City Council for the first time. He served the City of Atlanta for eight years representing the ninth district prior to being elected to the State Senate in 1984. During his tenure on the City Council, Senator Langford authored legislation to improve the quality of life for young people and senior citizens. During his tenure in the Senate, he served as chairman of the Fulton County Delegation and was named chairman of the Consumer Affairs Committee. In 1993, he served as Vice-Chairman of the Pleak Council of the Pleak Co man of the Black Caucus and was named chairman of the Senate Corrections Committee. He served as Pastor of Rush Memorial Congregational United Methodist from 1983 to 1988, and later as Associate Minister of West Hunter Street Baptist Church.

Johnny Ray Hill was lifted from this earth and entered into eternal rest and peace, with our Lord and Savior, on Saturday, March 26, 1994. Dr. Hill accepted Christ at an early age and was a member of Ben Hill United Methodist Church until his death.

He was born to the union of Simmie and Lueberth Hill on April 27, 1944 in Hot Springs, Arkansas. During his formative years, he received his education in the public schools of Miami, Florida and Hot Springs, Arkansas. Dr. Hill received his B.S. degree at Kentucky State College, Eraphfort Kentucky Master of Science at Frankfort, Kentucky; Master of Science at Western Kentucky State University, Bowling Green, Kentucky; and Doctorate of Philosophy at Miami University, Oxford,

On August 23, 1969, Johnny Hill entered into holy matrimony with Etta Jo (Rush) Hill and to this union, two children were born. Dr. Hill was an advocate for education and during his life he held numerous administrative positions. His most recent post was Assistant to the President of Morris Brown College, Atlanta, Georgia. His exemplary leadership catapulted advanced opportunities for many young scholars.

He was a member of numerous service organizations, in the world of academia, which included Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity, Inc., and Phi Beta Kappa. He was also a Presidential Appointee to the U.S. Office of Equity Commission.

THE MORRIS BROWN STORY

n October 15, 1885, just 22 years after Abraham Lincoln signed the Emancipation Proclamation, 107 students and nine teachers walked into a crude wooden structure at the corner of Boulevard and Houston Street in Atlanta, Georgia, marking the formal opening of the first educational institution in Georgia under solely Negro patronage. That institution was and is Morris Brown College, named to honor the memory of Second Consecrated Bishop of the African Methodist Episcopal Church.

The circumstances which evoked the founding of Morris Brown are traditionally linked to a visit by a group of Clark College trustees to Big Bethel Church to interest the A.M.E. supporters in furnishing a room in their institution. In response to the proposition which they presented, a layman, Stewart Wiley, reportedly observed, "If we can furnish room in Clark College, why can't we build a school of our own? These words ignited a flame in the mind of the Reverend Wesley John Gaines for on January 5, 1881, during the North Georgia Annual Conference at Big Bethel, he introduced a resolutions calling for the establishment in Atlanta of an institution for the moral, spiritual, and intellectual growth of Negro boys and girls. The steps between the resolution and the opening were few and simple: The Georgia Conference was persuaded to join in the endeavor, an assembly of trustees from both conferences convened in Big Bethel Church and selected the Boulevard site, and the State of Georgia granted a charter to Morris Brown College of the African Methodist Episcopal Church in May 1885.

The fact of its founding as a child of the Church not only determined the institution's philosophical thrust, but also created a system of support which functioned to channel its early energies toward developing programs to serve the needs of students from low socioeconomic backgrounds. For, finan-


cially dependent upon denomination whose constituency was, at that time, primarily unskilled, untrained and economically unstable, the College, in order to survive, had to absorb into its enrollment a large segment of underachieving students whose parents were loyal supporters of the Church that kept its door open.

What began as survival, strategy for Morris Brown in 1881 became the liberation cry for the Black masses and the country at large in the 1960's. At the point of higher education, that cry was heard in the institutions—Black and White, large and small, state and private—in the form of pressures to develop programs in tune with the needs of economically disadvantage youth, for Morris Brown, however, it was a matter of doing what came naturally—better and more effectively.

If there is a uniqueness about Morris Brown, it is perhaps a kind of institutional flexibility based on the assumption that a college can serve the needs of students with the educational handicaps of substandard environment without betraying the talents and abilities of those with high intellectual capacities. In a campus atmosphere conducive to a well balanced growth, and academic program consisting of course content, course requirements and teaching methods geared toward the preparation, motivation, and achievement levels of both types has not only inspired averaged and better than average students to great heights of achievements in competition, but has also transformed sensitive "High Risk" students into performers

far better than their credentials would suggest them capable.

Morris Brown College has maintained full and continuous accreditation by the Southern Associations of College and Schools for the past 47 years. Presidents of the college include two African Americans women and 14 African American men.




























Bureau of ATF Strikes Again for MBC!

fter competing against students from Morehouse, Fort Valley State College and Clark Atlanta University, chemistry major Sherrie Thomas was selected by the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco & Firearms to function as a Chemist Trainee in it's Atlanta Forensic Science Laboratory.

As a Chemist Trainee participating in the Cooperative Education Program, Sherrie will receive hands on experience and training while assisting two experienced chemist in the analysis of physical evidence in arson and explosives investigations using chemical, physical and instrumental techniques. The evidence will consist of explosives, fire debris, fibers, glass, plastics, tapes, metals, and other frequently encountered evidence associated with criminal cases.

"Chemists and Physical Scientists are the unsung heroes in law enforcement and the investigative process" Michael Lindsey, EEO Manager said. "The analysis that these individuals do in many instances establishes the connection between a criminal act and a specific individual(s)"

Marvin Renert, Chief of the Atlanta Laboratory, stated, "We are looking forward to Sherrie working with us. She will be a tremendous asset to our laboratory system upon graduating from Morris Brown College."

Over the years there has been constant interaction between the Bureau and Morris Brown's Criminal Justice Program. As an example, in 1990, Special Personal Act Agreement that resulted in Special Agents lecturing Criminal Justice majors in the classroom on the arson investigative initiatives of the Bureau. A major part of that exposure was a tour of the Atlanta Forensic Science Laboratory as well as lectures by Laboratory personnel on the lab's role in the investigative process.

A spin off from this Co-Op agreement and partnership with the Bureau has also resulted in the Bureau donating some \$9,000 in laboratory equipment and supplies to the Chemistry Department. "I can think of no better use for this equipment than to educate our young adults," Dr. Fultz said, "We will assure that our laboratory system throughout the country donate available equipment and supplies to Morris Brown College for this purpose,"

The specific Morris Brown project included:


• a set of banner designs to line Ralph Abernathy Blvd., leading to the Olympic stadium

This exhibition will be on display in the Bridge Gallery at Georgia Tech and open to the public through May 1. The exhibit will then make its way to the MBC campus through mid-May in the Presidential Dining Room of Scholars Restaurant.










MBC Professor Takes First Place At National Meeting


Dr. Kothapa defined marketing as "consumer orientation," advertising as "communication process," and the role of marketing in our society as consumer satisfaction.

Only 20 professors and 10 doctoral students from across the country were selected to attend the institute from the 200 applicants.



Alpha Lambda Chi Community Service Fraternity, Inc. Established 1992

lpha Lambda Chi was founded on the campus of Morris Brown College on September 16, 1992 by 11 men determined to make a difference in the communities from which they came. Seeing the need for a greater bond among African American males in particular, these eleven individuals decided to establish an organization that would unite in a fraternal bond, men for a purpose. This purpose was defined as the betterment of themselves and the surrounding communities through community service activities and to found, what would be the first, Community Service Fraternity in the Atlanta University Center. Inadvertently, Alpha Lambda Chi would also go on to become the first official Alpha Chapter greek letter organization on the campus of Morris Brown College. It was during this year that these 11 men went on to further define what kind of men/workers/leaders they wanted to attract.

All of the planning of the previous year went into effect during the fall semester of 1993. Seven new members were brought into the organization already having deep convictions about their communities. It was known by these and all members, that neither the mission bestowed upon them nor the convictions indoctrinated in them by the founders of this fraternity did not begin nor will they end with Alpha Lambda Chi. They are the responsibilities of all males — especially black males who ever wish to call themselves Men. On the flipside of this coin, it is also the responsibility of the women of our communities to unite and give back to them. Therefore, a few of the founders of Alpha Lambda Chi in conjunction with the new members established a sister organization known as Sapphires. Understand, it doesn't take greek letters to do what all Africans in America should do, but a united front is an unconquerable one. Understand also, What has been accomplished by other greek letter organizations cannot be ignored, therefore we give honor to their unity through our existence.

As a non profit organization, Alpha Lambda Chi has done a great deal of work with the children in the Vine City area through the B.O.Y.S. program in accordance with the Catalyst program. Alpha Lambda Chi has also been involved with feeding the homeless, providing carnivals and entertainment for homeless children, providing tutorial services for local high schools, and elementary schools. We are also in the process of providing recycling bins on the yard of Morris Brown College's campus. Currently, Alpha Lambda Chi is in the process of establishing ties with other larger organizations in order to expand its reach. We have established ties with the Coca Cola Foundation, Kroger's, and have future plans to work with 100 Black Men of Atlanta, as well as Sisterlove, Volunteer Atlanta and many other volunteer help groups

On Offense, the line must mature in a hurry if quarterback Fred Gartrell, 6'2, 215 lbs., Junior from Atlanta, Georgia and Tyrone Morgan, 6'3, 200 lbs., Senior from Miami, Florida are expected to have success going airborne to a talented group of receivers as Gerald Cambridge, 6'0, 165 lbs., Senior from Miami, Florida, 28 receptions, 441 yards and three touchdowns; Mel Johnson, 6'1, 190 lbs., Senior from Atlanta, Georgia 20 receptions, 261 yards and 1 touchdown; Maceo Heard, Junior, 6'0, 205 lbs., Senior from Atlanta, Georgia 10 receptions, 82 yards and All-SIAC receiver Corry Withers, 6', 190 lbs., Junior from Atlanta, Georgia who was red-shirted last season.

Center, Derrick Avery, 6'0, 225 lbs., Senior from Atlanta, Georgia; Guard Thomas Oglesby, 6'0, 260 lbs. and Danny Freeman, 6-5, 220 lbs., Tight End, Newton County are the only veterans returning from last season. The Wolverines are looking for someone to replace two time All-SIAC Tackle, Reinard McGruder and 2nd Team All-Conference Tackle, Kerry Galloway. Ladon Love, 6'1, 260 lbs., Senior from Lewisburg, Tennessee is expected to get the nod at one of the tackle slots.

The running game which improved tremendously during the 1993 season should be even better. Assisting Carter Eve will be our most improved player fullback Byron Hutcherson 5'10, 205 lbs., Junior from College Park, Georgia and the Wolverines 1993 Rookie of the Year, Cedric Marshall, 5'10, 205 lbs., Sophomore from Woodland, Georgia.

On Defense, the Wolverines must find an entire unit in the secondary decimated by graduation. Red-shirt sophomore William Blair, 5'10, 180 lbs., from Loudon, Tennessee, is the lone returning player with experience. Reginald Lane, 6'0, 200 lbs., Senior, Valdosta, Georgia, 104 tackles, 4 QB sacks; Kevin Bailey, 6'2, 230 lbs., Senior from Athens, Georgia, 61 tackles, 1 QB sack; Gari Jackson, 6'2, 235 lbs. sophomore from Mobile, Alabama 49 tackles, 2 QB sacks and David Trollinger, 6'0, 215 lbs., Junior, Shelbyville, Tennessee, 49 tackles, 9 QB sacks.

The kicking game once again will be on the capable foot of two time All-SIAC kicker *Alex Campbell*, 6'0, 180 lbs., Junior *Defuniak Springs*, Florida 58 punts, 2199 yards, 13-16 extra points, 6-15 field goals. In 1993 Alex had a 80 yard punt against Hampton University.





Unknown and Unrecognized: Twins— An Untapped Resource

uman nature, intricate concept that it is, has tended to baffle even the most meticulous observers, the most detailed of on-lookers, the most tedious-minded experts. The likes and dislikes, flaws and multi-colored personalities that has claimed as its' nature forms an incongruous mass that can not be explained any more than it can be

duplicated. Researchers — psychologists, philosophers, counselors, etc.
— have dedicated decades to the study of man and his patterns in an

attempt to draw a comprehensive conclusion.

Though no concise definition of man's inherent qualities had of yet been determined, certain rules of thumb have been developed. Using these, societies (indirectly and directly) have formed rules of conduct, laws, etiquette systems, and general patterns of social behavior deemed to be acceptable — or not. Following these guidelines as a basis, any deviations from the "norm" are given the strictest of attention. Perhaps stemming from the need to explain the inexplicable, or exploit the uncommon, social aberrants are often treated as transgressions. However, there are conditions in which abnormal occurrences are celebrated because of the positive nature of their deviation. Such is the case with twins.

Society's fascination with multiple births probably originated further back than can be conceivable described. The miracle of life itself, duplicated into more than one individual simultaneously has baffled experts. Even today, when science has graciously explained the splitting process of the newly converged sperm and egg, twins still baffle most people. The closeness of a pair that have spent even their pre-natal moments in close vicinity intrigues the average individual. Society has even stipulated that certain unspoken rituals, such as dressing the twins in the same clothing as children be adhered to. Practices such as these belie society's fascination with the physical appearance of identical twins in particular, as well as its' attempt to convince them to emulate each other in behavioral aspects as well.

In most cases, however, people of multiple birth tend to develop individual characteristics that drive them towards individual tastes and activities. Towards adulthood, most twins begin to forego the above-said unspoken rules, and start to appreciate themselves as a unique person unto themselves. Ironically, it is during this period in twins lives that the

bond between them strengthens. While separate qualities are discovered and explored, the similarities between the two are all the more appreciated. Further, it seems that the positive characteristics of each twin are focused in different directions — giving to the world the same intelligence, the same intuitiveness, and the same insights in different fields and areas — double the productivity.

Closer to home, African-Americans are still in a constant battle to attain its' rightful place in a society that still refutes them. As scholars, young Blacks are forced scholars, young Blacks are forced to be twice as acute, twice as ingenuous, and twice as industrious as



their White counterparts. In this light, twins from a solid background with varying interests can be a tremendous asset to the community. It has often been said that one twin is in need of attention is the lack of unity in the Black community. Obviously a pair whose entire essence is permeated with unity — even more-so than average siblings — is a plus. Morris Brown College has recognized the pricelessness of twins for a long time. Most students who matriculate at the institution are aware of their inborn duty as African-American citizens of higher learning to promote aspects of the Black community. In terms of assets, twins with this mind-set whose interests lay in different areas are indeed incomparable. To the college, they are an insurmountable plus. To the world, they are **Double Trouble!**

Bureau of ATF Strikes Again for MBC!

After competing against students from Morehouse, Fort Valley State College and Clark Atlanta University, chemistry major Sherrie Thomas was selected by the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco & Firearms to function as a Chemist Trainee in it's Atlanta Forensic Science Laboratory.

As a Chemist Trainee participating in the Cooperative Education Program, Sherrie will receive hands on experience and training while assisting two experienced chemist in the analysis of physical evidence in arson and explosives investigations using chemical, physical and in mental techniques. The evidence consist of explosives fire debris fit

mental techniques. The evidence consist of explosives, fire debris, fit glass, plastics, tapes, metals, and defrequently encountered evidence as ated with criminal cases.

"Chemists and Physical Scientists the unsung heroes in law enforcer and the investigative process" Mic Lindsey, EEO Manager said. "The arsis that these individuals do in n instances establishes the connection between a criminal act and a specific individual(s)."

Marvin Renert, Chief of the Atlanta Laboratory, stated, "We are looking forward to Sherrie working with us. She will be a tremendous asset to our laboratory system upon graduating from Morris Brown College."

Interviewed by the Inquirer several weeks ago, Campbell was asked when he planned to name a new police chief and the mayor responded, "When I feel the time is appropriate.

Turning down the Reno appointment, Campbell pointed out, "said a lot about Harvard's dedication to the city of Atlanta.

Surrounded by family and friends Harvard said in her acceptance speech, "Today is one of the proudest days of my life and certainly the proudest moment of my 21-year career as a police officer.

The battle against violent crime will be her first priority, said Harvard, who plans to form partnerships with businesses and organizations outside the police fields.

"It's not an issue for the police, the chief of police or the police department to address alone," she said.

Applauding the mayor's choice of Harvard to head the department's 1,693 sworn officers, was U.S. Attorney Kent Alexander, who said that Campbell couldn't have picked a better person for the job.

"We already had a partnership with the Atlanta Police Department and now it's going to be that much



It saddens me to hear that people are sayin that," Morris Brown students write in crayon." Nevertheless, it does not break my spirit. For you see, my foremothers and fathers listened to the white man tell them that they could be nothing more than field hands and house servants, but today I stand before you a junior majoring in accounting with a 3.7 GPA. I am just one of the many students at

Morris Brown College who are fulfilling the dreams of their foremothers and fathers. That is why I do not get discouraged when my classmates throughout the Atlanta University Center defame my institution. I just draw from the strength of my ancestors who withstood slavery to put me where I am today.

Morris Brown has cultivated many of my realized talents while pushing me to explore new abilities. I have grown mentally, physically and spiritually while attending MBC. In fact, I accepted my call into the ministry here, and I am now a licensed minister in the African Methodist Episcopal (A ME) Church. So, no one can tell me that Morris Brown does not produce viable citizens in a variety of areas; because although I am seeking a degree in accounting, my education here reaches far beyound the classroom.

As for my brothers and sisters at other institutions throughout the AUC. I simply say to stay encouraged. The struggle is not easy, and although it seems that I am at a disadvantage because I attend MBC, when we enter the work force it all comes down to the black and white (and you know what side you are on).

We need to be united as a people and stop being divided by petty matters. At every university, there are those who work hard and those who slack off, and there are teachers who are easier than others. We are all after the same basic dream, to be the teachers, doctors, lawyers, accountaits and entrepreneurs of the next century. It would be so much easier if we worked in harmony.

MORRIS BROWN TRIO PROGRAMS RATED AMONG THE TOP IN THE NATION

PWARD BOUND is designed to reach low-income high school students who have potential for successfully completing a post-secondary education program; but who due to inadequate preparation or lack of motivation, are prevented from seeking higher education or from meeting conventional criteria for admission to a college, university, or technical institute. Through the use of individualized instruction, exposure to new or altered curricula, tutoring, cultural enrichment, and counseling, the program is designed to generate in such individuals the skills and motivation necessary to enter and successfully complete post secondary education. During the summer, UPWARD BOUND students typically reside on a college, university, or secondary school campus for an extensive six to eight week session, taking courses in the basic skill areas, attending cultural and social events, and receiving counseling. In the academic year, students attend Saturday classes, periodic tutorial/counseling sessions, and participate in cultural enrichment activities. During their junior and senior years of high school, they receive guidance in exploring options for post-secondary preparation and the program best suited to their needs.


The primary goals of the Morris Brown Project are to provide a program of service which will help students from low income families (1) understand and appreciate the importance of education; (2) develop self-confidence and self-discipline; (3) acquire the fundamental skills which are necessary for success in post-secondary institutions; (4) improve their ability to relate meaningfully to people and situations; and (5) enhance their cultural awareness. The project seeks to create an environment which motivates participants to pursue post-secondary training, and stimulates them to become intelligent, functioning citizens pursing satisfying and lucrative work goal.







There was singing by Satchmo and crooning by Cole,



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

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
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<u>Eisenhower Graduate Fellowships</u>: To enable students to pursue Masters Degrees or Doctorates in transportation-related fields.

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
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
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
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
