

Mission of the College

Morris Brown College, founded in 1881 by the African Methodist Episcopal Church, is a private, coeducational, liberal arts college engaged in teaching, research, and public service in the arts, humanities, education, professional programs, and social and natural sciences.

The primary mission of Morris Brown College is to provide educational opportunities in a Christian environment that will enable its students to become fully functional persons in society. In accomplishing this mission, the College prepares graduates to live meaningful and personally rewarding lives, therefore enabling them to make socially constructive and culturally relevant contributions to society. In fulfilling this mission, the College accepts the obligation to place events and points of view in the context of humanity's long intellectual history and to expose both to the light of humanity's best thinking. To that end, the College must maintain the distance that will permit engagement with contemporary events only to the extent that such a focus does not interfere with the ability to study with objectivity and to reflect upon such events dispassionately.

Morris Brown College, in its commitment to academic excellence, provides experiences that faster and enhance intellectual, personal, and interpersonal development for students who have demonstrated potential to complete a challenging undergraduate liberal arts program of study.

Moreover, since educational endeavors may not be circumscribed by the limitations that students bring with them to the institution, the College, in its commitment to a liberal admissions policy, provides access to personal development and intellectual growth for students who show potential for sustained study at the undergraduate level. The College recognizes that variables characterizing students admitted on this basis often reflect experiences that may not be indicators of capabilities of future accomplishments.

MBC Facts


Morris Brown College, founded in 1881 by the African Methodist Episcopal (A.M.E.) Church, is the only private, four-year, coeducational, residential liberal arts college in Georgia to be established by African Americans for the education of young African Americans. Today's enrollment reflects a diverse population of students from across the nation and around the world.

The College offers baccalaureate degree programs in more than 40 different areas, including business administration, mass communications, marketing, mathematics, art, accounting, paralegal studies, computer science, chemistry, biology, psychology, engineering, architecture, landscape architecture, hospitality administration, and therapeutic recreation. Morris Brown is unique in that it nurtures the talents and abilities of students with high intellectual capacities and meets the needs of all other students who show academic potential.


The student/faculty ratio of 20:1 ensures that each of Morris Brown's more than 2,000 students who come from more than 40 states and over 30 foreign countries has access to personalized assistance. There are approximately 20 students from foreign countries attending Morris Brown. Many are attracted to the institution through the hundreds of African Methodist Episcopal missions around the world.

Located on a 21-acre campus near downtown Atlanta, Morris Brown has eight academic buildings, six residence halls, a campus center, an athletic field and stadium complex, and a recreational complex and gymnasium. The Georgia capital boasts a world-class orchestra, ballet, art museum, and numerous galleries; it is the convention and visitors center of the Southeast; and it has four professional sports franchises. The College, which is part of the Atlanta University Historic District, is near the Martin Luther King Center and birthplace, and the historic Herndon Home built by the founder of the Atlanta Life Insurance Company - is adjacent to its campus. During the 1996 Summer Olympic Games, Morris Brown College's Herndon Stadium was replaced with a new stateof-the-art facility that hosted the Olympic field hockey competition.


Morris Brown is accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools. Morris Brown College is one of six institutions that make up the Atlanta University Center, the world's largest consortium of higher education institutions serving African Americans. The College is also a member of the Council for the Advancement and Support of Education; the National Association for Equal Opportunity in Higher Education; the Council of Independent Colleges; the United Negro College Fund; and many learned societies.



Morris Brown College First Building 1935, Boulevard and Houston Streets

The Morris Brown Story

n October 15, 1885, just 20 years after Abraham Lincoln signed the Emancipation Proclamation, 107 students and nine teachers walked into

a crude wooden structure at the corner of Boulevard and Houston Streets in Atlanta, Georgia, marking the formal opening of the first educational institution in Georgia under solely African-American patronage. That institution was Morris Brown College, named to honor the memory of the second consecrated bishop of the African Methodist Episcopal (AME) Church.

The circumstances that evoked the founding of Morris Brown are traditionally linked to a visit by a group of Clark College trustees to Big Bethel Church to interest the AME supporters in furnishing a room in their institution. In response to the proposition they presented, layman Steward Wiley said, "If we can furnish a room at Clark College, why can't we build a school of our own?" These words ignited a flame in the mind of the Reverend Wesley John Gaines. On January 5, 1881, during the North Georgia Annual Conference at Big Bethel, he introduced a resolution calling for the establishment in Atlanta of an institution for the moral, spiritual, and intellectual growth of Negro boys and girls. The steps between the


resolution and the opening were few and simple: The Georgia Conference was persuaded to join in the endeavor. As assembly of trustees from both conferences convened in Big Bethel Church and selected the Boulevard site as the school's home. In May of 1885, the State of Georgia granted a charter to Morris Brown College of the AME Church.

The fact of its founding as a child of the church not only determined the institution's philosophical thrust, but also created a system of support which functioned to channel its early energies toward developing programs to serve the needs of students from low socioeconomic backgrounds. The College, at that time, was largely dependent upon a denomination whose constituency was primarily unskilled, untrained, and economically unstable. In order to survive, the College had to absorb into its enrollment a large segment of underachieving students whose parents were loyal supporters of the Church that kept its doors open. What began as survival strategy of Morris Brown in 1881 became the liberation cry for Black masses and the country at large in the 1960s. At that point of higher education, that cry was heard in all colleges - Black and White, large and small, state and private ---in the form of pressures to develop programs

in tune with the needs of economically disadvantaged youth. For Morris Brown, however, it was a matter of doing what came naturally — better and more effectively.

If there is uniqueness about Morris Brown, it is perhaps a kind of institutional flexibility, based on the assumption that a college can serve the needs of all students with the desire and the potential to earn a college degree. In a campus atmosphere conducive to well-balanced growth, and an academic program consisting of course content, course requirements, and teaching methods geared toward the preparation, motivation and achievement levels of both types - the College not only has inspired average and better-than-average students to great heights of achievement in competition, but has also transformed sensitive "high risk" students into performers far better than their credentials suggest them capable.

Morris Brown College now stands as a thriving institution, fully accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools, with majors offered in more then 30 acres of study, including Business Sciences, Computer Science, Chemistry, Biology and Hospitality Administration. The College currently is under the capable leadership of President Dolores E. Cross, Ph.D.

ver stop to wonder just what it is that sustains the momentum that Morris Brown College is so well known for? Has it ever occurred to you that Morris Brown College always managed to pull another miracle out of its hat just when things seem darkest? Morris Brown College is famous for its ability to prove itself capable of conquering insurmountable odds, and surviving under the most trying of circumstances. MICHAEL THURMOND Keynote Speaker

Mathematical Thurmond was born in rural Clarke County to the late Sidney and Vanilla Thurmond. The youngest of nine children, Michael distinguished himself academically in the public schools. He graduated Cum Laude with a B.A. in Philosophy and Religion from Paine College in 1975 and later earned a degree from the University of South Carolina of Law. In 1991, he completed the prestigious political executives program at the John F. Kennedy School of Government at Harvard University.

In 1978, he returned to Athens to practice law and took an active role in that city's civic and political affairs. In 1986, he became te first African-American elected to the Georgia General Assembly from Clarke County since reconstruction. During his legislative tenure, he was the only African-American legislator elected from a majority white district. While serving in the General Assembly, Representative Thurmond was elected chairman of the Georgia Legislative Black Caucus and authored major legislation that has provided over \$100 million in tax refunds to Georgia's low-income working families.

In 1994, Governor Zell Miller selected Michael to direct Geotgia's historic transition from welfare to work as head of the 9,000-employee Division of Family and Children's Services (DFACS).


Mr. Thurmond created the innovative "workfirst" program. Workfirst has helped 67,000 welfare-dependent Georgia families move into the workforce, saving Georgia taxpayers over \$200 million. These savings have been reinvested in childcare, training and other support services.

In 1997, he left DFACS to become the distinguished lecturer at the University of Georgia's Carl Vinson Institute of Government. On November 3, 1998, Michael Thurmond again made history by becoming the first African-American to be elected Georgia Labot Commissioner. Mr. Thurmond is the author of A Story Untold—



Black Men and Women in Athens History and serves on the Board of Curators of the Georgia Historical Society. He is a member of the Ebenezer Baptist Church in Athens. Mr. Thurmond and his wife Zola are the proud parents of a daughter, Mikava.




The Inauguration of the Fifteenth

The Honorable Jennifer M. Smith, JP, MP Doctor of Humane Letters

The Honorable Jennifer M. Smith has achieved an outstanding number of firsts in her career, including becoming the first elected female Premier of Bermuda in November 1998. Her extraordinary skills in effecting a political consensus made her a popular choice by the people to be Premier of Bermuda. In April 1999, Premier Smith gave up the portfolio as the first Progressive Labour Party Minister of Education to better concentrate on her role as Premier.


Her background, both by training and experience, is business, the arts, journalism, and a wide spectrum of cultural and community projects. Currently, the Premier is a member of the Bermuda Society of Arts; the Bermuda Business and Professional Women's Club; Richard Allen African Methodist Episcopal (AME) Church and Gospel Choir; Bermuda Zoological Society; Bermuda Heritage Association; Amnesty International; and Bermuda Debate Society. She is a member of the Board of Trustees of Bermuda National Gallery, the Bermuda Biological Station, and the St. David's Relief Fund. Her own personal activities and interests have found expression in her painting and in



dance.

Among the many awards Premier Smith has received are: Outstanding Woman in Journalism; Outstanding Community Achievement Award by Richard Allen AME Church; Ambitious Associates Role Model Award; Black Family Productions Inaugural Black Achievement Award; and a Citation for Significant Accomplishments from the late Pennsylvania State Representative David P. Richardson. She is a graduate of Harvard University's John F. Kennedy School of Government's Program for Senior Executives in State and Local Government.

Premier Smith is gained a wealth of experience from 18 years as a Parliamentarian and more than 25 years in politics. She has dedicated her life to Bermuda and few people doubt that she will cap her career as an outstanding Premier. She brings dignity and distinction to the House of Assembly, dedication and diplomacy to her constituency, and hope and optimism to Bermuda.

the organization are elected from the undergraduate and alumnae membership.



Morris Brown College Laptop Media Day A Success

ATLANTA—Black Entertainment Television (BET) and three of the major network local affiliates (WXIA, WGCL and WSB) covered Morris Brown College's "Laptop Media Day" held in Cunningham Auditorium. As the first historically black college or university (HBCU) and one of the few institutions of higher learning in the nation to have a mandatory laptop requirement, Morris Brown completed its second and final week of student laptop training and dissemination on Friday, October 6.

Morris Brown College President Dolores E. Cross, along with several other senior administrators, were on hand to discuss the merits of the College's mandatory laptop requirement. The new requirement paves the way for students to acquire technological adeptness and probelm-solving skills.

"We are extremely pleased with the response we received from the media," said Morris Brown College President, Dolores E. Cross. "I believe it is a manifestation of our excitement about this initiative and an acknowledgement of our willingness to take bold steps toward helping our students use technology as a means to becoming creative, critical thinkers and problem solvers in our community."

Key partners, including Prosys Information Systems and Cisco Systems, were available to discuss the impact of the mandatory laptop initiative with media. Prosys negotiated with Toshiba to enable Morris Brown to receive 2,750 laptops with significant specifications at half the cost students would pay if they purchased the same laptop on their own. Cisco Systems provided the wireless Internet cards, which enable students to access the Internet remotely (without wire connections) from any location on the campus. This capability is made possible via high-speed data drops strategically located throughout the campus. Dr. Reginald Lindsey, Vice Provost for Strategic Planning and Technology, addressed the role of Convene.com, providers of the software package called Academe, and online teaching and learning application.


Eddie Ellis is an an active director and a wellrespected music leader. He has received numerous



















MBC COMES UP SHORT IN DIVISION I SEASON OPENER BY: MARK LITTLES

Gardnet-Webb and Morris Brown put on a great show the entire cortest, but Gardnet-Webb held on to win by a score of 24-19. 





Atlanta University Saturday night because the Wolverines delivered a complete onslaught to a simply tired and bewildered CAU football team.



Lindsey and his wife Dr. Helena Mitchell enjoy a host of athletic pursuits and are passionate about mentoring youth.























In Loving Memory James 7. Abrams "Abe" Former Head Football Coach

Principal, Assistant Principal, Tea-Cher/ Coach in the Fulton County Public School System and former Head Football Coach at Morris Brown College, succumbed April 4, 2000 after a recurring illness.

He was born in Shellman, Georgia to the late Lonnie Abrams and Pheobe Majors Abrams Shead. The family later relocated to Jacksonville, Florida. Mr. Abrams received his early education in Jacksonville, Florida and graduated from the Old Stanton High School in Jacksonville. After graduation, he attended Morris Brown College in Atlanta, Georgia on a football scholarship, where he earned the nickname "Abe" or "Big Abe." This term was

frequently and affectionately used among the players at Morris Brown. After receiving his B.S. Degree from Morris Brown College, his first teaching/coaching position was at South Fulton High School in East Point, Georgia under the principalship of the late Frank McClarin. He served as Head Basketball Coach and Assistant Football Coach. Mr. Abrams earned his Master's Degree from New York University in New York City and has received his Administrative Certification from Georgia State University in Atlanta, Georgia.

Mr. Abrams married Blanche Woods (Abrams) in 1954 and to this union were born two (2) sons, James Tyrone Abrams (Corky) and Wayne Cedric Abrams. They were married for 46 years.

In the late 1960's, Mr. Abrams left the Fulton County Public School System to become Head Football Coach at his Alma Mater, Morris Brown College. He coached at Morris Brown College for three years before returning to the Fulton County Public School System. There, he served as Teacher/Coach, Assistant Principal at Russell High School and Principal of Woodland High School and Camp Creek Middle School, where he retired in 1989.

DITH WHITE MING was the extraordinarily gifted orator, vocalist, pianist, organist, conductor, and internationally respected church leader who, in partnership with her husband of 43 years, Bishop Donald George Kenneth Ming, tirelessly dedicated her many gifts and talents in the service of her Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.

Born February 12, 1932 in Sheridan, Pennsylvania, Mrs. Ming was the youngest of five children born to William M. White and Cristabelle Williams. She graduated with honors from the Millcreek Township High School. She then went on to attend Temple University Teachers College-School of Music, where she further refined her musical talent while earning a Bachelor of Science degree.


On July 3, 1957, Edith married Donald George Kenneth Ming at Jones Tabernacle African Methodist Episcopal Church in Philadelphia, beginning a partnership of matrimony and ministry that would send them in service to God's people in South Africa, the Caribbean, parts of South America, Louisiana, Mississippi, and Georgia. Along the way, the "Ming Team" distinguished themselves throughout African Methodism and the global faith community at large.

In addition to her role as the supportive and gracious wife of the Bishop, Mrs. Ming ascended to heights of individual notoriety and personal achievement. She was a member of many organizations, including Church Women United; the NAACP; the Association of University Women; Women for Morris Brown; and Delta Sigma Theta, Inc. She served as Vice Chairperson of the Family Life Committee of the World Methodist Church; a board member of Georgia Health Decisions; and a board member of Prison Ministries with Women; and she was a charter member of the National Museum of Women in the Arts. As a member of the Commission on Worship and Liturgy of the African Methodist Epsicopal Church, Mrs. Ming made invaluable contributions to the AMEC Bicentennial Hymn Book. Mrs. Ming was the first African American elected president of the World Federation of Methodist Women and served in that capacity for five years.

Mrs. Ming received many honors and awards, including the Excellence With Courage Award from Edward Waters College in Jacksonville, Florida; the Women's Missionary Award of Merit; the prestigious Sarah Allen Award for exceptional leadership; the Women for Morris Brown Award; The Georgia Coalition for Black Women's Award, and many others.





One would expect to have seen a sea of black families like five years prior. That was not the case. The call was to the entire human family so that did not exclude any race. The march was very multicultural and it seemed to me that no matter what race you were there was a representative from your community. This representative spoke onstage about the thing that plagued their community. From the Native Americans to Hispanic Americans and Asian Americans every ethnic group present asked for unity, changes, and advancement in their community.

During the march there was a feeling of pride knowing that you were making history and doing something good with your family. There were a great number of speakers all with educational information that even the smallest child understand. When Minister Louis Farrakhan spoke it was a message not like his other. He spoke to all of the people. No matter your nationality he was speaking to you which made you feel close to the person you were next to. No one would ever think there could be too much love being shared but it was. At the end of Minister Farrakhan's lecture a mass wedding took place. The wedding was held for every religion so everyone was included. Along with the wedding Minister Farrakhan asked the married couples in the audience to renew their yows. To be able to love being shared to me was very spiritual. My only wish is to have the unity and love shared on October 16, 2000 continues throughout the community.



The 22-year-old student from Decatur, Georgia will go down in history for his victorious win of two gold medals for the USA in the 400meter hurdles and 4x4 relay at his first Olympics. He won his spot on the team by clocking a person-

al best time of 47.62 seconds at the 2000 U.S. Olympic Trials, the fastest time in the world this year.

Taylor describes himself as being, "tenacious, funny and modest." He has many goals that he is forging forth to achieve including making it to the 2004 Olympics.





O dearest, what beauty is to be compared to thee.


