W.A.U.C. the Voice of the A.U. Center

Radio station WAUC is coming to the Atlanta University Center. What type of radio station should it be? What kind of radio station do we need in the center? Many people say we certainly don't need another WIGO or WAOK for our college community. Some say we need a Black radio station. What is a Black radio station? Is there really such a medium?

There is practically no such thing as a Black owned radio station. Of the nation's 7,000 radio stations only nine are owned by Blacks, and James Brown owns three of them (James Brown Broadcasting, Ltd.).

Most Black orientated stations (WIGO and WAOK) that we listen to are owned and operated by whites (whites with black masks). These stations reap enormous profits from the Black community by directing commercial, musical, non-controversial soul programming that keeps black people dumb and ignorant to their (whiteman) game. By listening to these types of stations we keep be-bopping, finger-popping, and jiving to the tune of Black genocide.

WAUC must be that first Black radio station. It should recognize the fact that we are an African people and that African people are a colonized people. When talking about recognizing this fact, WAUC should not be dealing in rhetoric but with issues, policy and programs that effect the lives of Black people.

WAUC should raise the level of consciousness of Black students in the center so that when they leave this complex they will be more concerned with the liberation of Black people than fattening up their pockets to the tune of suppressing their own people.

We can blame the sad shape of our college community on the lack of effective communications between each school in the center. WAUC must be that medium in the center for students to get the information and the energy they need to achieve their purposes when they are in the interest of Black people.

WAUC must not be a new white radio station, it must be political, social, and relevant. Is it asking too much of our college radio station to be reactionary in the cause of Black people.

The disc jockeys at WAUC should be educators, transformers and activists and not entertainers, jive-masters and rapid rappers. WAUC mustn't imitate white (soul) stations because they are

among the worst when dealing with content. WAUC's programs should be one of motivating students in the center to read, write and study relevant subjects which are within the perspective of liberation of Black people. WAUC should create a black radical audience to be able to deal from a black radical perspective.

WAUC should take stands instead of trying to avoid them. If WAUC's role in the center is one of leadership, it should take the initiative of orientating students to Blackness and their roles in the struggle of Black people.

WAUC's news department should deal with the news around the world that we are supposed to be a part of, giving black interpretations and analysis as they relate to Black people.

WAUC should be that medium dealing in the education of our people and not dealing with the avenues of escape. It should help students to develop their minds and bodies to the greatest possible extent mentally and physically.

Some people feel that WAUC shouldn't be moving in any particular direction especially in the direction of educating and liberating Black people. These people fail to realize that all communication media have some definite direction that they are moving towards whether it be maintaining and reinforcing the powers of the United States of America or protecting the interests and values of the rich and super rich, who oppress poor people.

These directions are not in the better interests of the masses of Black people since they cannot be Senators, Governors, rich and the super rich. Therefore if we continue to move in the same directions as these stations we will continue to oppress our own people.

We must move in the direction of what is best for the masses of Black people. Anything in conflict with this movement should be against our college radio station.

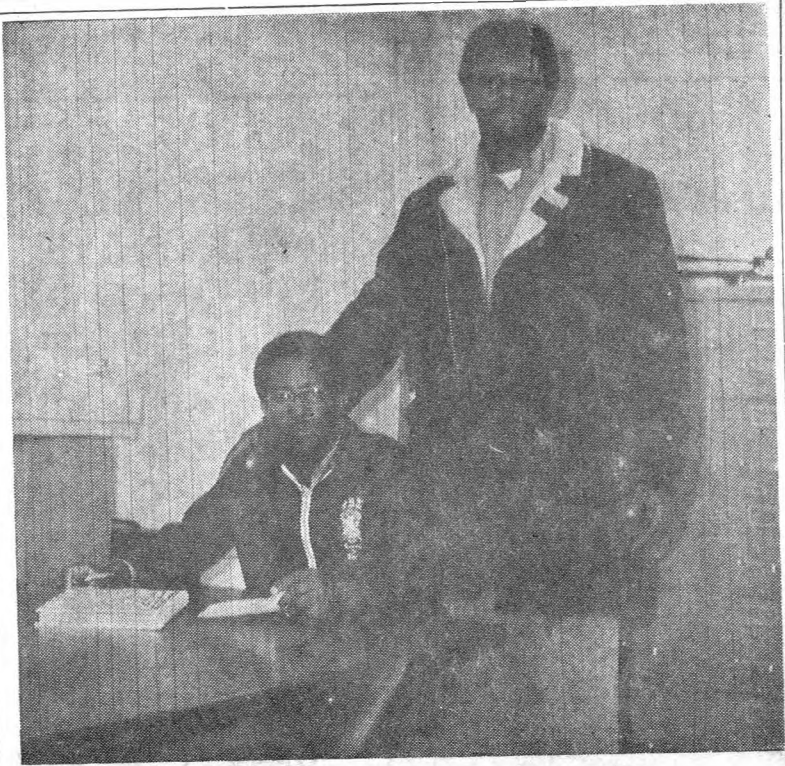

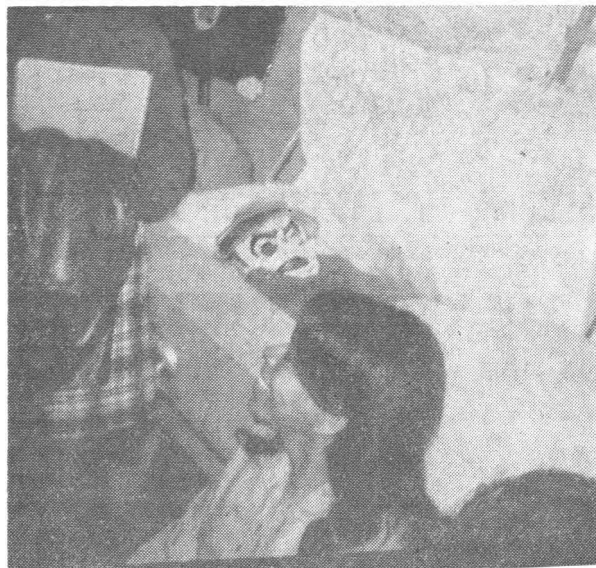
What We Are About

Contraceptives Today

As times come and go things change and people gather new ideas about fashions, morals and beliefs. Today the problem that seems to have a lot of us worried is overpopulation and unwanted pregnancies. Now due to modern techniques and medical advances this does not have to be true, because of different methods of birth control.

There are many types of contraceptives on the market; the Pill, IUDs, diaphragms, jellies, foams, creams and condoms. With some, a doctor's advice is necessary but for others the nearest drug store can supply you with them.

The Pill has close to a 100 per cent record of preventing pregnancies. An internal examination by a doctor is advised because usually what's good for one woman may cause terrible side effects on another.

The IUDs—Intrauterine devices are small metal or plastic devices which are inserted inside a woman's uterus. This device can be worn for a year or more without change. The IUD is not 100 per cent effective but it is one of the

best methods of birth control known today.

The Diaphragm — a thin sheet of soft rubber stretches over a flexible metal ring. This device is placed in the birth canal. A doctor will examine the patient for the size of diaphragm to be used. Also he will explain the proper insertion and use of the device. Diaphragms have proven to be very effective.

Condoms, foams, creams and jellies are common methods of contraception found in any drug store and can be taken and used without a doctor's prescription.

Another type of birth control to be used is the rhythm method. This requires no devices but may be advisable to consult a physician. This requires the determining of the safe period (7-21 days) of the month for women. A doctor can help calculate these days.

An unwanted pregnancy can be avoided. Also an unwanted pregnancy can hurt your future. Birth control keeps you from getting hurt emotionally, physically, socially and financially. Birth control is safe, and it works when properly used.

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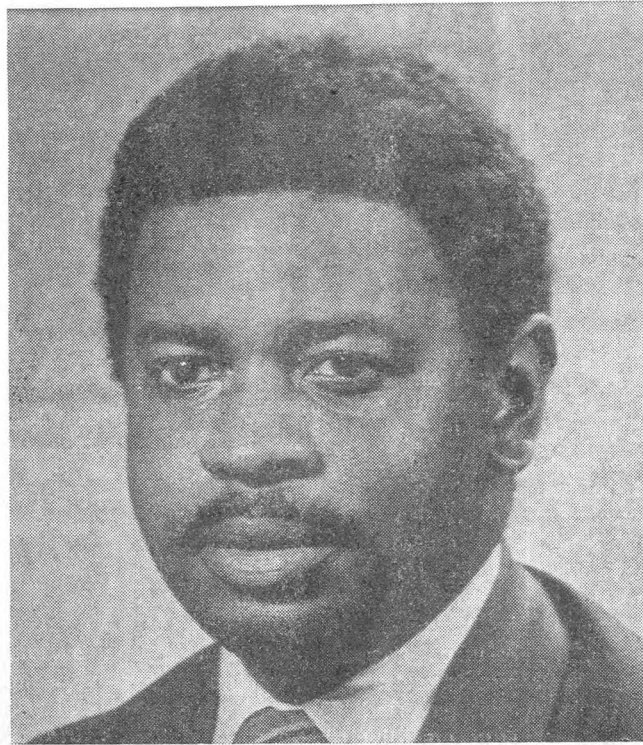

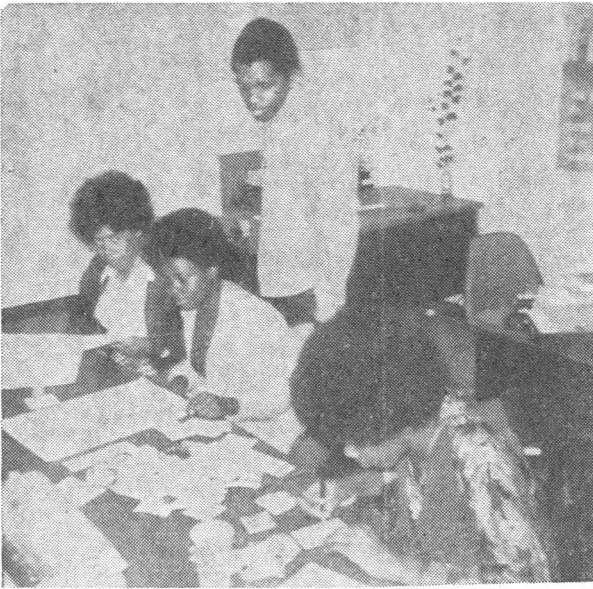

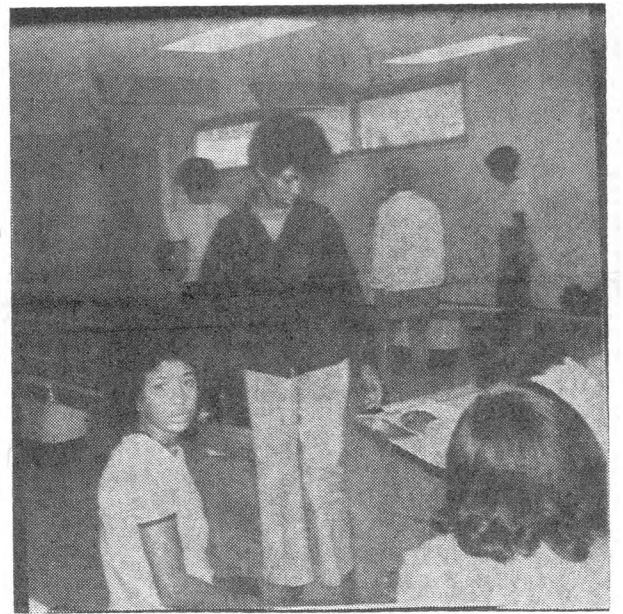

Florida A&M Upset By M.B.C. 28-22, Before Homecoming Crowd

The alumni came back to Morris Brown to celebrate homecoming, and to celebrate they did, as they watched Morris Brown defeat Florida A&M 28-22.

The time and place was just great for Morris Brown to upset Florida because the Wolverines hadn't defeated a Florida team since 1951. It took 19 long years, but success finally returned along with some of the men who played on the 1951 team, who came back to an old-timers homecoming celebration.

The Wolverines playing behind the homecoming day theme "A Ball of Confusion," confused the previously undefeated Rattlers from Florida all afternoon.

Morris Brown broke the ice and scored early in the first quarter when quarterback Ronald Lawrence threw a 19 yd. touchdown pass to his big tight end Sylvester Hickson. Florida then scored on a 5 yd. run in the second quarter, the point after failed and Brown led at halftime 7-6. There was no scoring in the third stanza for either team. In the final quarter Florida drew first blood when they scored on a 13 yd. pass from Scruggs to Sykes, the two points conversion was good and Florida led for the first time all afternoon. Morris Brown determined not to be counted short this game came right back and scored on a 90 yd. kick-off return by speedster Alfred Jenkins, the point after failed and Morris Brown only trailed by one.

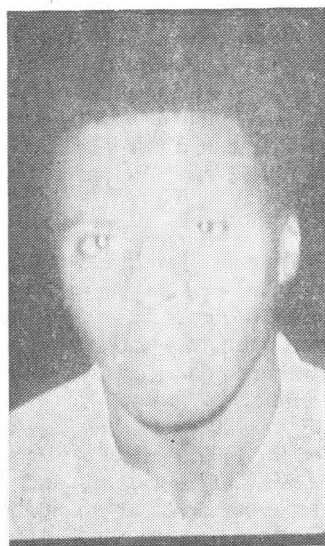
James Townsend, a 6-3, 208 lbs. senior end who prefers to play offense but who found himself playing defense due to a rash of injuries to the Wolverines, expressed himself as he intercepted a Scruggs Pass raced 31 yds. to set the stage for another touchdown. Morris Brown then scored on a 1 yd. run by the old-reliable Levi Golphin, the Wolverines workhorse all afternoon. The two point conversion was good and Brown led 21-14. Then "the purple people eaters" as the Brown defense unit calls themselves forced the Rattlers offense into a punting situation but the attempt was blocked by Michael McBride, a big, tough freshman and picked up by his playmate Sylvester Canady, who ran 9 yds. for Morris Brown's final touchdown, the point after was good and Morris Brown fans were already sensing an upset in the making. Florida scored again but that was not enough as the damage had been done. Morris Brown had upset Florida A&M. The only thing which seemed to go wrong for Brown was the score board which was not operating, but the score board was not important for everyone knew that Morris Brown had upset Florida 28-22.

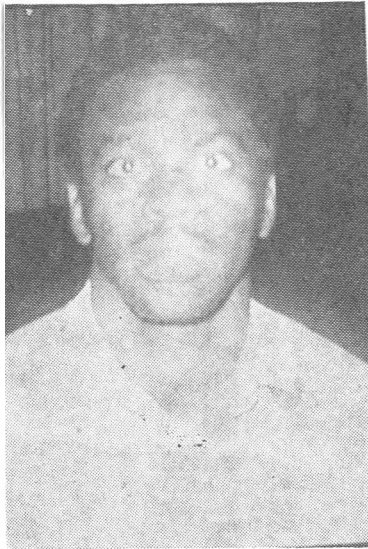

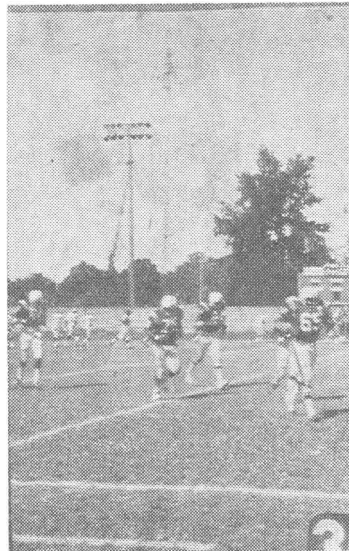

This is referring to none other than the filthy hog, the pig, the swine. Khan means I see and zien means fowl. "I see the foulest animal." In spite of this warning the Christians are the largest consumers of pork.

The hog eats nothing but F-I-L-T-H.
