## First Black Circle Of National Honor Society At Morris Brown

The Morris Brown College Circle of Omicron Delta Kappa, a national leadership honor society, was the first Black Collegiate Chapter founded.

Omicron Delta Kappa, founded in 1914 at Washington and Lee University, hoped to recognize those who have attained a high standard of efficiency in collegiate activities and to inspire others to strive for attainments along similar lines. The society also hoped to bring together the most representative students in all phases of collegiate life, thus creating an organization to help mold the sentiment of the institution on questions of local and intercollegiate interest. Its efforts were also directed toward bringing together members of the faculty and student body of the institution on a basis of mutual interest and understanding.

The Morris Brown College Chapter of Omicron Delta Kappa in its endeavors to carry out the

objectives of ODK have set objectives to stimulate members into active participation by the organization of extra-curricular programs, initiate no less than 50 new members this year with 3.00 averages or better, serve the community by sponsoring community activities, stimulate members and non-members into oratorical debate relative to pertinent controversial issues and to organize excursions that will generate valuable learning experiences and periods of enjoyment.

The Reverend Robert Eckert has been elected to serve as president of ODK for the 1978-79. After outlining the objectives for this coming year Rev. 
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Atlanta University Dance Theatre with Pearl Primus, Nov. 5, 1978 at Read Hall - Spelman College

## MBC Oust "The House"

MBC Downed Morehouse College 13-0 Saturday at Lakewood Stadium on a day made for football.

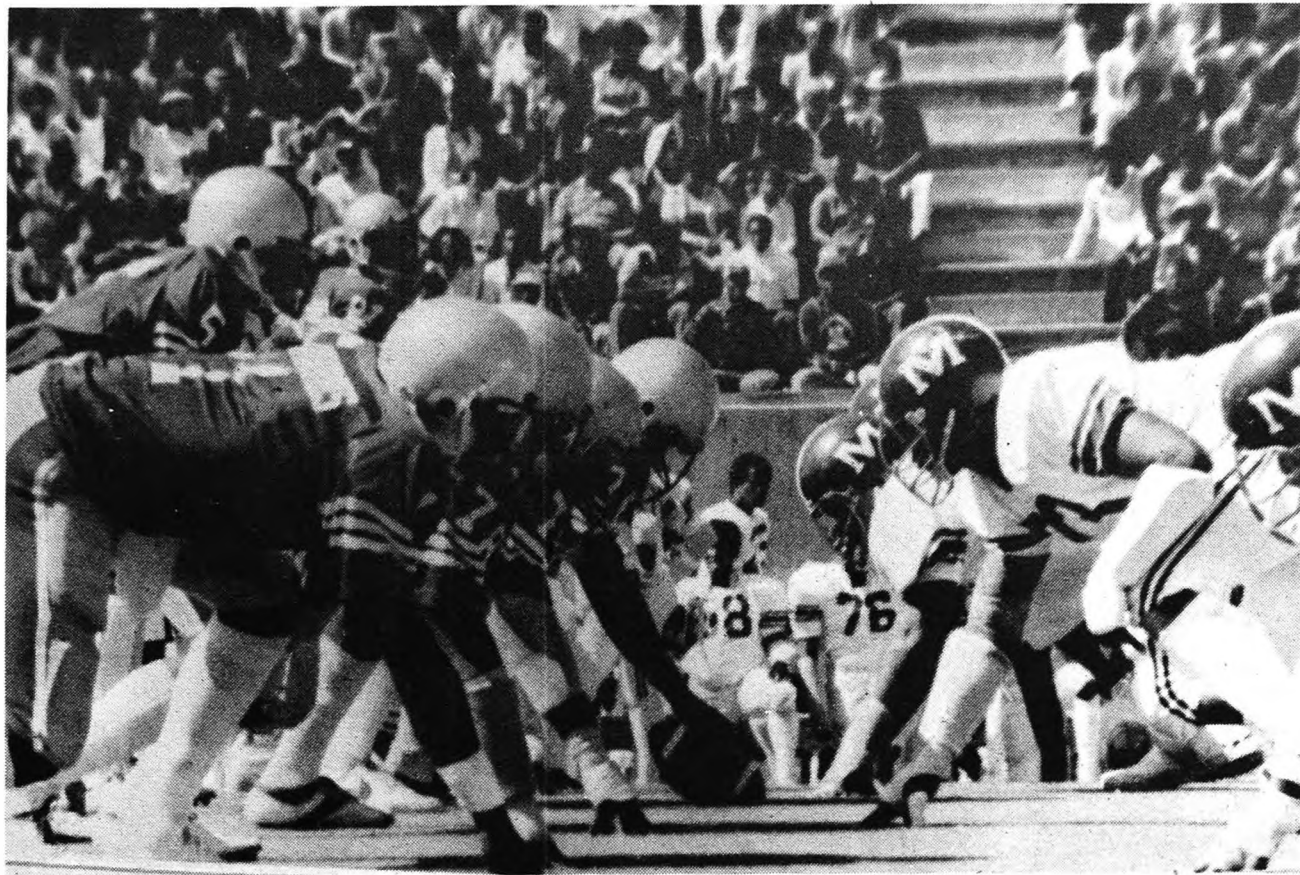
A capacity crowd witnessed the A.U.C. rivals, MBC and Morehouse. Both teams were coming off victories.

Morehouse won the toss and elected to receive. But MBC's defense forced the Maroon Tigers to punt from their 5yd-line. Morehouse's Richard Doughtry's blocked punt went into the waiting arms of MBC's B. J. LaMarr who took it in for the first touchdown. Carlton Johnson's successful extra point made the score 7-0 in the first quarter.

In the second quarter MBC started at Morehouse's 42 yd line. With quarterback Gary Session at the helm the Wolverines were on the move. Session hitting Michael Scott for 12 yards and Larry Powers for another 8, gave the Wolverines the momentum needed for a touchdown. Michael Scott pulled in an 18 yard touchdown pass from Session. Carlton Johnson's attempt for the extra point was a bit wide but MBC lead 13-0.

The defense, which in the past few games specialized in drag down tackles, hit with some authority this game as they made Morehouse's offense look miserable. The Tigers attempted 11 passes completing only two for 16 yards while the Wolverines completed passes for 61 yards.

This upset left MBC with 4 wins and 1 loss.

FAMU scored again and took a 21-0 lead into the locker room.

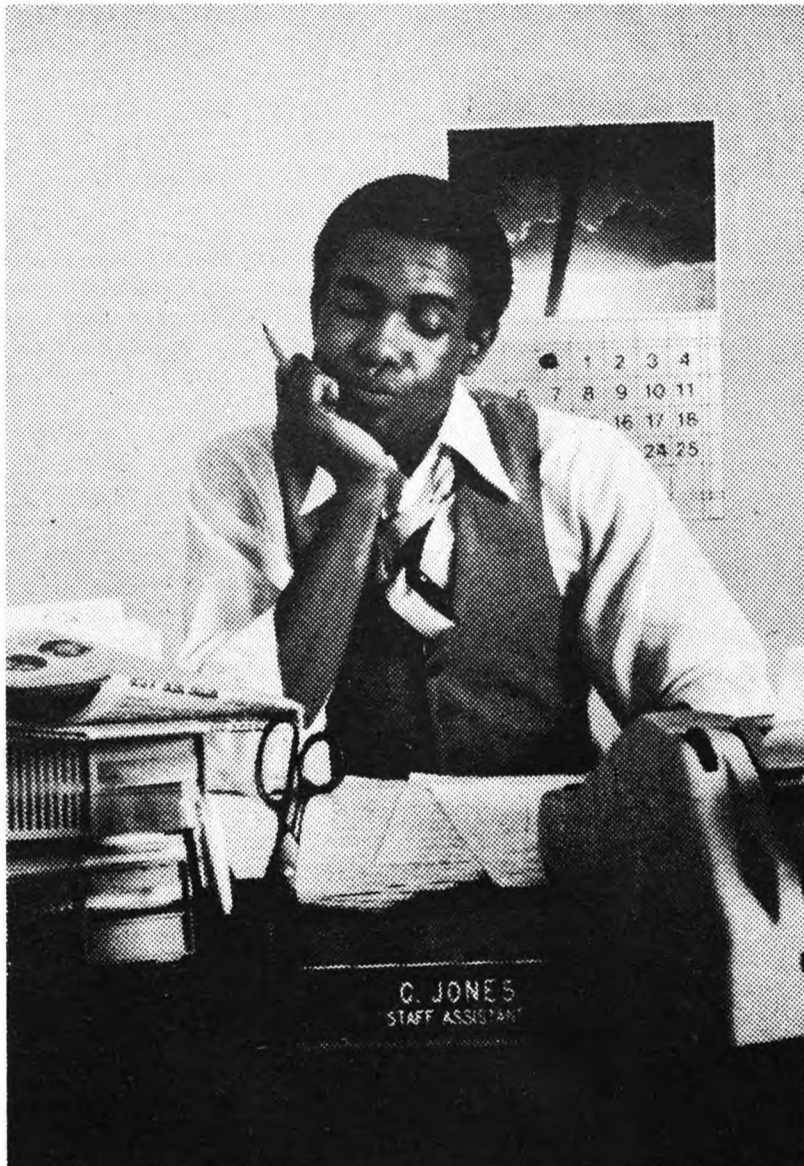
The second half proved to be a continuation of the nightmare with FAMU scoring 35 more points to bury the Wolverines 56-0.
