Morris Brown College-Who Are We?

Founded in 1881, Morris Brown College is a privately operated institution with a current enrollment of approximately 1,500 students. It is Georgia's largest predominantly Black private college, a co-

educational and primarily fulltime institution with 50 percent of its students living on campus. Through the Atlanta University Center Program, the college offers baccalaureate degrees in some 30 fields of study. It is fully

accrediated by the Georgia Department of Education, the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools, and the American Association of Colleges. The mission of the College is to provide oppor-

tunities for moral, spiritual, and intellectual growth. Organized under the sponsorship of the African Methodist Episcopal Church, Morris Brown follows the philosophy of "education for all" regardless of race or creed.

Since Morris Brown is the only institution of higher learning in this area which was founded, developed, and is now mainly supported through Black leadership, its growth and ex-

Cooperative Education-What Is It?

Cooperative Education: What is it?, and how does it work for the students?

Cooperative Education, a plan whereby students blend theory and practice by working on paid training assignments in their areas of professional interest, has had a tremendous growth in recent years Cooperative Education will stimulate the growth of the college as well as broaden the student's total college carrer.

How does Co-op work? The student will alternate specific periods of on-campus study with equal periods of off-campus employment in an assignment related to his academic major. The student is paid for services by the co-op employer. Salaries vary, depending upon the discipline which is being studied and the amount of academic credit and work experience the student has accumulated.

One of the great strenghts of cooperative education is its

flexibility. In some institutions it is a compulsory program for all students, however, Morris Brown College will offer an elective program.

The structure of a cooperative experience may vary, but the underlying philosophy always remains the same. The students job is an essential and integral part of his education, affording him the opportunity to relate classroom abstractions to the concrete realities of the work-aday world.

pansion are aptly described in terms of "self-help". This is an illustration of self-reliance and freedom at their best within a minority group which is working for a better society. The philosophy of self-help, self-respect, and personal dignity, then, is a distinctive contribution of the college.

Morris Brown is also unique because of its emphasis on religion. Religious life at the College is the result of a conscious effort to enrich the spiritual experience of every student. The college holds that intellectual achievement alone is inadequate - that an understanding of Christian truth and an effort to live that truth every day are likewise essential. Christian emphasis is one of Morris Brown's valuable contributions to the total development of her students.

Morris Brown College from the first has offered equal opportunities to men and women. Its charter provides that religious opinion shall not effect the admission of students or the engagement of instructors. It has fostered from the beginning, simple relations of mutual respect between its teachers and its students. In its internal administration it has placed its reliance not wholly on rules and regulations but on the good taste, good judgement, and good will of its members. In its aims, whether liberal or vocational, it has greatest concern for high standards of scholarship and of personal character. Its deeper purpose is the advancement of public welfare through wider knowledge, finer skill, and broader appreciation of human

Situated in the City of Atlanta, Morris Brown College enjoys many advantages that contribute to the development of an educational institution. 

Personality Profile Dr. Roy L. Hill

The Wolverine Observer staff takes pride in featuring in its freshman edition a man of many talents, and a true gift from God to our campus; Dr. Roy L. Hill.

Intelligent, witty and intriguing, merely describe Morris Brown's newly appointed member to the English Department, Dr. Roy L. Hill.

Dr. Hill is a gifted international poet and a renowned contemporary black rhetorian. His educational background is too impressive as we call the roll of his most outstanding achievements. Dr. Hill earned his Bachelor of Science from North Carolina A&T, in Greenboro, N.C., an M.S. in Journalism from Boston University, an M.A. from Michigan State University, East Lansing, and a doctorate degree in English from Rutgers University in New Brunswick, New Jersey. He has studied creative writing at the University of Minnesota, psychology at N.Y.U. and he has also studied fiction and poetry at Middleburg College in Middleburg, Vermont where Robert Frost and John

Ciardi were his teachers.

Before joining the English Department at the State University College at Brockport in New York, Dr. Hill held the prominent position as chairman of Black Studies and Assistant Professor of English at Rutgers in Newark, New Jersey from 1969 to 1974.

A born native of Laurens, South Carolina Dr. Hill became an orphan when only two months old. At an early age he was sent northward and lived for a time in the household of a family of Pennsylvania Quakers.

At this point in his lifetime, Dr. Hill could have ignored his God given talent of writing because of an unstable childhood. Instead, Roy L. Hill's writing talents developed under the influence of distinguished writers and poets. He was first encouraged to write by the late Dr. Leslie Pinckney Hill, of Harvard University, a 1903 Phi Beta Kappa, poet, and President of Cheyney State College, Pennsylvania. His second major encouragement came from Langston Hughes of Harlem. Later, he studied under

Robert Frost, John Ciardi, Howard Nemerov and John Frederick Nims at Middleberg College, Vermont. Also he studied under William Dickey, a Yale vounger poet, at Antioch College, Yellow Springs, Ohio. At the Pennsylvania State University poetry workshop he studied under the noted poet, Joseph Leonard Grucci. At the University of Minnesota, he studied with Louis Cox, Robert Penn Warren and Morgan Blum. While studying at Boston University, he was referred to as a "gifted young writer" Dorothy Speare, Hollywood scenario writer and novelist, a rival of novelist F. Scott Fitzgerald.

In 1964, he met for the first time and participated in a poetry workshop with Gwendolyn Brooks, James Baldwin and (Leori Jones) Imamu Amiri Baraka. That conference was entitled "Negro Writers in the United States" and was held at the University of California.

He was a student of Dr. Phillip Young, an Ernest Hemingway scholar at Pennsylvania State University and also was a student of Dr. Stuart James, of The University of Denver, in a William Faulkner and Ernest Hemingway seminar.

Roy Hill has also spent time learning about oriental poetry with Japanese poet, Atsuhiro Sawai of Kyoti, Japan.

In 1969, he read poetry in the U.S.S.R. where he met and discussed poetry with Yeugeney Yevtushenko and Andrei Nognesensky. Arna Bontemps and Sterling A. Brown shared some of the Harlem Reneissance moments with Roy Hill.

Theatrically, Dr. Hill had trained under Max Fischer formerly of Germany now with the American Theatre Wing in New York City. American Theatre goers will remember Hill in the role of Lacey in Tennessee Williams' "Cat on a Hot Tin Roof," and "Three Men and a Horse."

He spends a good amount of time traveling, lecturing, reading poetry and writing. He has lectured or read peotry in forty-five of the fifty states, to Jamaica in the West Indies where he lectured and toured in 1961. He has toured Canada, the Carribbean, Great Britian, lecturing and reading poetry in more than 300 churches, theatres, colleges, and universities. These traveling experiences have provided Poet Hill with good background materials for use in his writings.

"I did not come to Morris Brown College to be in a popularity contest, I came to do a job." Remember, "one either knows or he does not know. The only substitute for not knowing is to know. The only remedy is to learn," he says so often.

Dr. Hill is a member of Kappa Alpha Psi and in 1971 he was named Outstanding Educator of America

In the summer of 1970 Dr. Hill ended his educational journey with a Doctorate Degree from Rutgers University, New Brunswick, New Jersey, giving him something in common with Paul Robeson.

Student Advisor to both the

Wolverine Observer and the Brownite (both student publications of Morris Brown) Hill says, "I have been through too many things to find pettiness important."

Dr. Hill emphasized what interests him most now in growth. "I want you to grow instead of just growing old," he explains.

The Student Publications Department is honored to have such a person of Dr. Hill's caliber and expertise to advise our staff.

In his final statements, Dr. Hill comments, "I didn't pick my place at the table. It was picked for me, and who am I to argue with God?"



New Cuts In Federal Student Assistance Planned

Federal student aid was cut for the 1981-82 school year. But you ain't seen nothing yet. The Education Department is working on further reductions for the 1982-83 school year that will make it noticeably harder for students to get help.

"The tightened requirements for the 1982-83 student aid were virtually ready for publication last month," said Robert Leider, a student-aid expert. "But then President Reagan let it be known that he would not reduce military spending very much, so all the non - defense agencies had to go back to the drawing boards and cut their budgets some more." To meet the president's budget targets, student loans and grants will have to be sliced even further in 1984.

State aid is generally linked to federal aid, so you cannot count on state education grants to take up the slack. The plain truth is that students and their parents will have to pay a steadily higher percentage of their own college costs.

While student aid is going down, annual college costs are going up. The average four - year private college costs \$6,885 this year, according to The College Board, up 13 percent from last year. A few

schools cost as much as \$12,000. The average public college costs \$3,873, up 14

The only good news is that, when you get out of college, the government will help you consolidate your student loans and stretch out payments over longer terms. You may still be paying off a student loan when your own children are ready for college, but inflation will have wiped away the burden of that loan.

The future shape of federal aid looks something like this:

* Free grants. Students now getting free federal grants will receive less. All Pell grants (formerly called Basic Educational Opportunity Grants) were cut recently by \$80. That put the maximum award for low - income students at \$1,670 for the 1981-82 school year, compared with \$1,750 last year. A revised eligibility schedule dropped many students out of the program entirely, most of them from families in the \$20,000 to \$25,000 range.

The total money available for Pell grants is supposed to rise a bit next year. But if the number of applicants goes up, the grant per person could decline again.

No extra money is budgeted at all for

most other federal - aid programs — direct loans and grants for the very neediest students, or work - study programs for the middle class. The value of these grants will decline steadily from now through 1984.

The object of all this is to reduce student access to government grants and force them to take out loans, instead.

* Government-subsidized student loans. Students from families making less than \$30,000 still qualify for the maximum student loan — up to \$2,500 for undergraduates, at 9 percent interest. But families making more than \$30,000 now have to submit a financial statement. Depending on their income and other factors, they may receive a full student loan, a reduced loan, or no loan at all.

The object is to push students out of the 9 percent loan program and force them to borrow at higher interest rates.

* Auxiliary loans. When you're denied a student loan, here is where you end up. The new, federal auxiliary - loan program will provide education loans at 14 percent — to parents, to graduate students, and to some independent students who are paying for their own education. You may

borrow up to \$3,000 a year. But you have to start repaying right away. Student loans, by contrast, needn't be repaid until the student leaves school.


So far, auxiliary loans are available only in a handful of states, which isn't much help to struggling students denied other forms of aid. Ask you bank when, and if, it plans to offer auxiliary loans.

* Loan consolidation. After cutting its aid budget up front, the government will come around and rescue you from behind. Once out of school, you will soon be able to turn to the Student Loan Marketing Association to consolidate or refinance your various tax - subsidized student loans.


SLMA will be offering lower monthly payments, stretched out over 10 to 20 years. You'll pay 7 percent interest on your older loans and, probably, 9 percent on the new ones.

Because this program is still in the pilot stage, nothing will be done for you if you write for help now. I'll be telling you how to take advantage of a SMLA loan consolidation when the program is fully open for business — probably within a few months.

Ninth Grader Places First In Georgia Science Fair With Psychological Research Completed At Morris Brown College



Fourteen year old Ms. Java Ware, a ninth grader at Charles Lincoln Harper highschool, placed first in the Georgia Science and Engineering Fair with an animal research project completed at Morris Brown College under the direction of Dr. Jeanne Stahl. The project titled "Effects of antihistamine and caffeine on the activity of the rat" involved the daily testing of 10 laboratory rats over a three month period. Ms. Ware received a first place ribbon, certificate and gold key for placing first for research in the area of medicine and health. She also received a special award patch and certificate of honor for most outstanding in the field of medicine and health research from the United States Air Force in the city competition. Ms. Ware is the daughter of Joseph and Mary Ware. Although her favorite subjects are in the science areas, she also excels in the German language and spent 9 days in Germany recently sponsored by the Atlanta Board of Education Foreign Language Department. In addition, she has been selected to participate in the Emory career preparation in biomedicine program on Saturdays for the next four years. Ms. Ware is presently beginning a second science fair project in the Morris Brown College Psychology laboratory.

Herschel Walker, a runningback for Georgia had his second straight day rushing for more than 160 yards. His longest run was 21 yards against California and he caught two passes for just five yards.

Art Schlichter who is the quarterback for Ohio State accounted for two touchdowns on a four-yard run and 16 yards with one interception. His longest completion was 49 yards and he rushed for 33 yards on nine carries.

Jim McMahon, the quarter-

back for BYU, recovered from a bout with the flu and was doubtful of the game against the Air Force. However the senior quarterback threw for four (4) touchdowns, although it was the first time in 12 games he passed for less than 300 yards.
