Observer Receives Honorable Mention At Institute

Lerone Bennett, Jr., senior editor of Ebony magazine, lashed out at the nation's print and broadcast media before an audience of student journalists at the concluding session of the 31st Southern Regional Press Institute.

"In the contest of a deepening national crisis ... American media

are part of the problem because they are white - oriented, property - oriented and place oriented," Bennett said.

The country's newspapers and television networks are hostile toward change and reluctant to put blacks in positions of authority in their organizations,

he said in a luncheon speech at the Downtowner Motor Inn Fri-

speaker, told the audience that "Reaganomics is a long - term program. It will probably improve, but long - term progress is short - term hardships." He believes that the program is moving in the right direction, but further progress is needed to reduce government spending. When asked what he thought the outlook for black colleges was, he said, "I've got to believe it's better." He stated that in talking with college officials, the biggest hardships to colleges is inflation, and if the inflation spiral is not stopped, the outlook will become worse.

Foster discussed the subject of the economy. He said that we have created an economy that is too complex and severely deep.

"Of all the money in the economy, 27% of it is cash. Nothing supports the economy but what the federal government created — which is an economy

based on a system," he said. Foster did add that Atlanta is not feeling the economic impact as strongly as other regions.

Levine summarized his opinion in one statement which was, "I believe it's going to work. It's taken us 20 years or more to get in the fix we're in, and we're not going to come out of it in a year."

Thompson discussed the topic of transferring social programs such as food stamps and Medicaid from the federal government to state and local government. He feels that if this transfer is completed, the state and local governments would be required to borrow more money, which would increase taxes. When asked if it was good for the states not to have control. he responded by saying, "The voice of the poor is more likely to be heard in the White House rather than the States."

One of the highlights was that asking freshmen not to wear jeans for a day was really asking too much when most of their wardrobe was mostly blue jeans anyway. Students say that at least they should notify them of the inconvenience through a letter from maybe Student Government. These students realize that a lot of the orientating tactics were to formulate some kind of self - discipline, but the Week was seemingly taken over and appeared to some groups with

undependable and disconcerned guides to be a pledge period.

On a larger scale, students seem to think that Morris Brown's college atmosphere lacks such things such as speakers that are internationally known like Stokely Carmichael or Nikki Giovanni, even individuals like Dick Gregory, Julian Bond, and others of the like, are very instrumental in bringing current political issues to light for the students. Students would also like to see more cultural events happen at the campus in the form of dance concerts, music concerts, and others. A scheduling of more programs emphasizing academics is always perpetual to a college atmosphere.

Dormitory Living

The general upkeep of the living facilities, as well as lounge areas and other places where students mingle is very poor. It must be agreed upon, however, that much of the destructiveness is due to the students themselves. Nevertheless, maintenance in regards to carpeting, chairs, draperies, and other furnishings are at a slack.

Capitalizing on dormitories, sanitation is a lot of times the fault of the students. Too, students should accept the fault of destroying the school's property and eating in their rooms. Food in the rooms attract others like mice who eventually if fed turn into rats. This needs to stop. Will it? ... Remember, it's a strike against making a change if students do things to strike back at the school out of spite. A lot of the conditions are bad because students make them worse than what they are. Sanitation is the key. Yet, Morris Brown adds luster to the fame when not keeping the general upkeep to par. Such things like painting the walls, waxing the floors more frequently, a constant extermination period, and just brushing up of the entire campus is needed to give it a better external look. The situation in the dorms could be less of the problem than it is if rules were enforced more by the directors. Maybe the administration should be more skillful in choosing the people to serve in this position.

Cafeteria Blues

In my opinion, and I've spent over 2 years here at Morris Brown, there has not been an efficient, adequate, clean, and constantly nutritious meal catering service as of yet. The variety of foods served at times is not constant enough, and sometimes more repetitious than ever.

Even now, some staffed personnel to the cafeteria do not even appear to be working with food. Appearance and cleaniness counts a whole lot when one is dealing with the service, and preparation of food. To see young ladies without hair nets on to prevent hair from getting into the food, or to see staff members walk around in the eating area dirty and sometimes with unmatched uniforms shows that there must be no or extremely linient rules in terms of how a cafeteria employee should look. Do you actually expect the students to praise such going ons.

The introduction of ice cream as a special treat to dinner was a good idea. However, when you see half - washed bowls, and splattered ice cream, broken dip - sticks, and absolutely no control of the ice - cream situation it appears also to be unsanitary. The salad bar started out good during Freshmen Orientation Week, but has readily lost its ground. Lettuce, tomatoes, and other other food items stay scattered across the floor where it is served. While we are on the subject of floor, the cafeteria needs to be waxed, mopped and even swept more often than it is. Cleaniness and sanitation are the keys to a better cafeteria scene. Tell me, is having to reach for your glass in crates off the floor sanitary.

Students Don't Help Situation

A great percentage of problems in the cafeteria comes from you, the students. They can be faulted for stealing silverware, glasses, and getting three to four glasses at a time not being considerate for the person coming late. Bringing larger glasses than what the cafeteria provides causes the juice and drink run out. In the case of the ice cream and salad bar, and even though there's no staff control it would seem that college students would conduct themselves in any orderly fashion of getting things freely from these stations. Spilled ketchup, mayonnaise, salad spread, lettuce, and all other food shows immaturity and poor etiquette on the student's part.

Administration Don't Help Situation

Through a little research it was discovered that the reason for long lines when maybe chicken or fish is friend is because of out dated and obsolete machinery. There have been attempts to explain to the administration that new and usable machines are needed to wash those glasses, plates, and trays, but to no avail. The business office say they do not have the funds out of a \$9 million dollar yearly budget. Sure the budget is divided, but exactly where is it going? I just hope it is not being wasted.

A Professional's Attitude

Some of the attitudes in the various offices of the Administration building are simply unprofessional. A lot of students have been turned off by their encounters with staff personnel who supposedly have tact in dealing with the public. Do they know that we, the students, are to them the public? Evidently not when you see individuals storming out of the building in rage. This is very poor tact in dealing with students who may be worried whether he or she has enough money even to stay in school. It is the way most students are treated that bothers them. There has been several reports of rudeness and outright impoliteness of employees. For these reasons, others speculate that if whites were more visible there would be a complete atmospheric change. With this statement a question arises; can blacks work among themselves professionally?

Academic Stress

We crave about "The Marching Wolverines," and the "Mighty, Mighty Wolverines," and I am not saying that we don't have the greatest "band in the land" or that the Wolverines are not SIAC champions, but these organizations are more extra curricular than academic. A stressing of more academics is mandatory in order to develop intellect among the student body. Without this intellect we lose our college atmosphere people expect.

We cannot begin to stress the importance of academics without the support of the instructors. There are enough doctorate degrees and master degrees among the faculty to strengthen tremendously the academics here at Morris Brown. This is by no means to say that

During a short press conference, Mrs. King told of the dream of Dr. King. The dream is


still alive in America.

Dick Gregory Lashes Out At America

Student Government The Association of Clark College presented comedian and civil rights activist Dick Gregory in concert. A standing room only crowd packed into Davage Auditorium on Friday, March 19 at 7:00 p.m. to observe the man who has been called "a propher of his people."

Gregory's commentary ran the gamut of topics - everything from weather to Reagan." Even though the audience was often consumed in hysterical laughter, many minds were opened by some of the shocking and enlightening statements made

by the comedian.

Gregory said that the biggest problem he was having in America was America. He claims black folks act like we have always had everything we ever wanted, and now Reagan is going to take it all away. But he maintains we ain't never had nothing!

The day all of America goes to the polls and votes for the lesser of two evils - we deserve to have that evil appear. One thing Gregory observeds is that black folks have been doing so much complaining, that the white folks can't see what he's going to do

with them.

On the subject of the media, Gregory stated that the press manipulates us from sun up to sun down. Hollywood and television are used as weapons of an oppressive system to manipulate our minds. Gregory stresses that we need to stop letting them tell us what we are seeing and hearing. He urges us to use our God - given intelligence and think things out for ourselves. A prime example of the way the press slants issues is: When the USA likes you and you are trying to liberate yourselves — the press calls you

"freedom fighters." But if the USA doesn't like you, and you are trying to liberate yourself, the press calls you "guerillas."

Black fraternities and sororities were another topic Gregory discussed. He stated that anytime someone wanted to humiliate someone else, they were ungodly. Anyone who takes that humiliation is crazy. You can not build nations by humiliating each other, therefore the criteria for pledging should be changed. Gregory would recommend an extensive knowledge of black history as a major criteria for pledging a Greek letter society. Iniation, says Gregory, should build pride not tear down the soul.

In regards to blacks marching and lobbying to get Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.'s birthday made into a national holiday, Gregory asks a bitter question. "Why go to the people who killed and buried Martin to make his birthday a holiday? We should declare it a holiday ourselves and take a week instead of a day!"

One of the most shocking theories Gregory expounded was that the Atlanta Center for Disease Control might have been responsible for the Atlanta child murders. His reasoning is thus: black males have an overabundance of white blood cells, and these cells are needed to make Interferon (a supposed cure for cancer) —which sells for \$23 billion a pint.

The parents of Wayne Williams were present and were greeted with a standing ovation. Gregory exhorted them to stay strong because decent folks all over the world are watching them.

Gregory vows that from March 20, the first day of spring, until the day the Atlanta child murders are solved and Wayne Williams is proven innocent he will not eat a solid bite of







March 25 proved to be a rather special day as the John H. Lewis Complex was filled with the talents of guest speakers and a most inspiring choir.

Bishop Vinton R. Anderson, guest speaker for this occasion, addressed the modest crowd in

terms of "From History to Hope."

Morris Brown has survived one hundred and one years of struggle and strife, and through the grace of God she has done just this.

According to Anderson, "hope and optimism" for the years to come are the keys to the future for not only Morris Brown, but for any black institution.

Anderson, of the third

Episcopal District of the African Methodist Episcopal Church used his dynamic voice to give the entire Morris Brown family and friends courage to forge ahead into the next years, despite Reaganism. Another special event that took place was the special musical presentation entitled, "Struggle for Freedom." This piece, written by Curtis, combined old Negro spirituals with narration expertly performed by Glynn Hasley,

director of the college choir.

"Struggle for Freedom" was commissioned by the college for performance on the occasion of its Centennial year and Founder's Day Convocation 1982. The presentation drew a standing ovation from the audience.

After the recognition of guests, Bishop Frederick Talbot, of the sixth Episcopal District offered the closing remarks which drew great response from

South African Teach In Comes to MBC

On March 19, more than 400 students, faculty and staff partic-pated in a Teach - In on South Africa. The program was the product of a joint effort by Morris Brown's Department of Political Science and the Atlanta South Africa Support Committee. Organizers of the event were pleased with the turn out of Morris Brown students.

The Teach - In on South Africa was part of a series of workshops

throughout the Atlanta University Center. Programs were at Clark College, Spelman, and Morehouse Colleges also. Atlanta University also hosted a workshop.

The purpose of the programs was to acquaint students, faculty and staff in the center with the critical nature of the South African problem and to examine the role of the United States in

this area of the world.

Organizers of the event pointed out that the Teach - Ins were part of a larger effort by the United Nations to educate more people about the consequences of United States involvement in South Africa.

At Morris Brown College the program consisted of a morning session and an afternoon session. Both sessions were hosted by Morris Brown's Professor T. L.

Muckenge. The morning session included presentations by Professor R. S. Mkhize on "The Nature of the Apartheid State." Betty Mokgoatsane spoke on "Black Resistence in South Africa," and Claude Barnes on "United States Foreign Policy towards South Africa."

The afternoon session included the same persons as the morning session with the exception that Dr. Mack Jones of

Atlanta University gave the presentation on U. S. Foreign Policy.

Both sessions were well attended and extensive dialogue was generated.

Most importantly, organizers of the event credited with the success of the Teach - In here at Morris Brown College to the cooperation and participation of the administration, faculty, and staff.





Boston, Massachusetts and is a native of Jacksonville, Florida.

Dr. Fisher's academic credits include a B.A. degree in Speech, drama, English and Public

Relations from Florida A&M University. A Master's degree in Guidance and Counseling from FAMU, also.

She was the first black person

to be appointed to Administrative Support Services, the functions of which were preparing and defending the budget, designing the policy information on child abuse and neglect and coordinating the end of the year report for the city of Boston.

Fisher also represented Boston school system at local, national and international conferences. She was media specialist for the school system, and now manager of Education and Psychology Departments for Morris Brown college.

She also conducted numerous workshops over the United States and has written articles and films. Some of her publication materials include, "Top Level Administrative Strategies," and "Classroom Management of Emotionally Disturbed Children." Membership in various organizations included are Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Inc., Vogue XIII, and Woman of

the Distinction from Phi Delta in 1979.

Fisher's special interest and talents are writing, art, song composing, and playwriting among others.

Student Personality Is National Pre-Alumni Council President

This month's Student Personality is the newly elected president of The National Pre-Alumni Council, Brian A. Hart. A well travelled native of Chester, Pennsylvania, Brian is a senior Public Relations major here at Morris Brown.

Brian explains the main purpose of the Pre - Alumni Council as giving support to The United Negro College Fund (UNCF) through various fundraising drives. He firmly believes that now, more than ever, is the time for the Pre - Alumni Council to be at its strongest. He stresses that these days students can not

wait on funds to be given to them, we have to make the effort to attain them ourselves.

As the national president of the Pre - Alumni COUNCIL£ Brian represents over 50,000 students. He is their voice to the UNCF and wherever he goes. Hart states, "I'm going to enjoy what I do, I'm not going to let it be a burden." He feels that being elected to this position is a blessing and is truly humbling because he represents so many students, who have so much faith in him. He admits that God has been very good to him.

Brian was elected to his national position on February 14, 1982 in Columbia, S.C. at the annual national Pre - Alumni Council convention. When he left Morris Brown as a delegate, he had no intention of running - but he was nominated at the convention, and accepted the nomination. 

Art Exhibit On Review




My name is Linda Renee Fountain. I am the 21 year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Mathew Fountain of Bainbridge, Georgia.

Personal: He is born under the sign of Aquarius. He enjoys people and is very sociable. Lambert wants to get married and raise a family.


Hobbies: swimming, magic tricks, music, women, dancing,

Brown. Dominique Wilkins of the University of Georgia shares the title with Janet Harris, also of the University of Georgia.


