## Mrs. McDuffie Urges Third Term for F.D.

A third term for President Roosevelt was advocated by Mrs. Elizabeth McDuffie, White House attendant, at a banquet in the Whitelaw Hotel, Saturday, given in honor of Dr. Frank O. Williston, chairman, by the Washington branch of the Colored National Democratic League.

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Mrs. McDuffie, who gained prominence in the recent Presidential campaign as a speaker, termed Roosevelt the emancipator of the colored race. After four years of his regime, she said, there is no longer a "forgotten man."

"President Roosevelt," she continued, "drove the mighty from power and erased the menace of privilege."

The White House attendant gave sketches of her campaign speaking tour and emphasized the need of more co-operation in the colored race.
