The Occasion

Hampton Institute is honored to have as its special guests the alumni of the Library School (1925-1939), who have served with distinction in the development of library services for Blacks throughout the nation. The merits of these librarians will be extolled generations hence through the youth they have inspired and through the people they have served.

The rapid growth of the profession during the period 1925-1939 can be attributed to Miss Florence Rising Curtis, director and founder of the school, and to its selective faculty. This first Library School for Blacks that issued a degree in Library Science, founded in 1925 and accredited by the Board of Education for Librarianship of the American Library Association, has held an important place in the development of libraries in the United States.

Hampton Institute was significantly honored at the Centennial Conference of the American Library Association held in Chicago, Illinois, July 18-24, 1976, when two graduates of the Library School were honored for outstanding contributions to librarianship. Mr. Wallace Van Jackson was presented the Special Centennial Citation and Dr. Virginia Lacy Jones was the recipient of the highest award of ALA "Honorary Membership."

We acclaim the Library School graduates for their contributions, leadership, achievements and impressive records. The Hampton Institute Library School will forever live through these illustrious graduates and "Pioneers in Librarianship."
