Message from the Dean

From the establishment of the School of Library Service at Atlanta University in 1941, we have based our program on the education of professionals who understand the basic principles and ethics of the field, and are committed to the provision of service to all segments of society, especially those to whom access to information has been less than desirable in a democratic society. In 2002, as we face a slowing economy, a widening digital divide and the impact of September 11, these principles and ethics, and the commitment to service, become even more important.

Continuation of accreditation for the education program is essential if the School is to carry on the legacy begun in 1941. To that end, activities in the School during 2001-2002 have been focused on preparing for a reaccreditation visit by an External Review Panel of the American Library Association Committee on Accreditation scheduled for April 8-9, 2002. Faculty, staff, students, alumni, University administrators and employers have worked together over the course of the academic year to produce a Program Presentation Document that outlines the School's strengths and challenges for the future, and plans for continuous growth and improvement. I will have the pleasure of representing the School before the Committee on Accreditation during the 2002 Annual Conference. The support offered by President Thomas W. Cole, Jr. and Provost Winfred Harris, and the commitment of the faculty, students and staff to the education program, help to ensure a positive response from the Committee on Accreditation.

When I am asked how things are going in the SLIS, I get a chance to brag about the improvements to the School's technology infrastructure and the resources that are available to aid instruction. You can read about these and other program developments in this issue of *CAU/SLIS NEWSLETTER*. I'd simply like to take this opportunity to invite alumni and friends to visit the School to see first-hand the changes that have taken place. A Complete Technology Renovation

The School of Library and Information Studies has experienced a complete change in its technology infrastructure since the start of the 2001-2002 academic year. Wiring has been upgraded to the three-prong grounded standard, and Cat 5e cable has been installed in all faculty offices, labs and classrooms. These upgrades help to move the School into the mainstream of technological development within the University.

Some of the latest desktop technology is now available in the Cataloging and Computer Lab and in the School Media Lab. The same technology is available in faculty and staff offices, and in the work areas used by Graduate Research Assistants and Work Study student workers. Other upgrades include USB memory keys, new LCD projectors, and document and digital cameras. Faculty members have been issued laptop computers to use for in classroom presentations and lectures and in their scholarly endeavors, while other machines are available for students to borrow to complete their assignments, presentations and research projects. Future upgrades being considered include establishing a wireless network and teleconferencing capabilities.

Faculty members are working with the University's Distant Learning Instruction Teaching Education (DLITE) Center learning how to use technology to prepare courses for on-line delivery. Kenneth Chong, a doctoral student in the University's Biology Department, is one of four Graduate Research Assistants and is responsible for maintaining the Labs and assisting faculty members in adjusting to new equipment and software.

Smart-Board Training

Great, I say, because of the excellence of the things themselves, because of their newness, unheard of through the ages, and also because of the instrument with the benefit of which they make themselves. - Siderus Nuncius

These words appropriately describe the two electronic smart-boards that have been added to the list of hardware now available in the SLIS. This technology allows the instructor or a student presenter to demonstrate navigation of a Web site for a class, add notes to lesson plans, write over PowerPoint presentations, and engage class members in discovery and sharing. Assistant Professor R. Bernard Welmaker conducted training sessions in using the smart-boards for faculty and staff members.

School Media: A Viable and Active Program

Following up on a recommendation made by the School Media Program Task Force, the SLIS has established an aggressive plan to recruit, admit, educate, and graduate increased numbers of professionals to help eliminate the shortage of school media specialists in Metropolitan Atlanta, and throughout the State of Georgia and the Nation.

Dr. R. Bernard Welmaker and Dr. Anita O'Neal serve as advisors to students specializing in school media management center services, and they teach the school media and other appropriate literature courses. Together they bring to students more that fifty years of library/media experience. Welmaker and O'Neal are involved in establishing and maintaining close working relationships with media coordinators locally and across the state. They also provide workshops for practitioners and for others who serve in para-professional roles. Dr. O'Neal is the Internship coordinator and oversees placement of student intern efforts to satisfy the practical experience requirement.

Fifteen master's-level and nine specialist-level students are enrolled for 2001-2002. Four SLIS students sat for the Praxis Examination at the end of Fall Semester 2001, and all received

passing scores. The Praxis is a national examination that qualifies applicants for state certification. Financial aid is available to all qualifying students who are pursuing a school media specialist career.

A School Media Lab was established in 1996 to address the special needs of the school media curriculum. The Lab houses digital still and video cameras, traditional media production tools, computers, and other digital media tools specifically designed to integrate the new technologies into student learning experiences.

President's Budget Includes \$10 Million To Recruit New Librarians

President Bush's FY 2003 budget contains an increase over last year of \$15.8 million for the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS), \$10 million of which is earmarked for a new initiative to recruit and train a new generation of librarians. Based on census data, more than one-quarter of all librarians with master's degrees will reach retirement age before 2009. This does not take into account early retirement, death, or other reasons for leaving the profession before the age of 65.

The IMLS initiative, 21st Century Librarians, will provide

scholarships and fellowships in support of master's programs; doctoral students, who will be the professors teaching the next generation of librarians; distance learning technology to support training programs for librarians in underserved rural areas; and recruitment of a diverse and skilled workforce, including librarians with diverse language skills and up-to-date technical knowledge.

SLIS Graduates Returning to Receive Specialist Degrees

The SLIS has witnessed an increase in the number of practitioners holding the M.S.L.S. degree who are returning to pursue the Specialist in Library Service degree. The Specialist program was initiated in 1971, and was designed as a formal continuing education experience for persons who hold the master's degree in library/information studies. This sixth-year program of study is planned with students in terms of their individual career goals and provides opportunities for updating knowledge and skills, strengthening areas of specialization and redirecting career goals. Courses are selected and the research project is carried out in consultation with a faculty advisor appointed by the Dean of the School. Students may complete the Specialist degree program in two years. All requirements for this degree must be satisfied within six (6) years of the date of matriculation in the Program. CAU/Cobb County Cohort Program

A cohort program involving the SLIS and the Cobb County Public Library was launched at the start of the 2001-2002 academic year. The program allows students to complete most if not all of their courses within a two-year framework. Gone are the days when students had to fight Atlanta's dreaded rush-hour traffic to make classes scheduled for 5:30 on campus. Classes are offered on-site for Cobb County Public Library employees and others who live and work in the area beginning at 6:00 p.m. Plans call for students to complete 18 credit hours at the Library and 18 credit hours on campus, primarily on Saturdays. The brainchild of Gale Rogers and Donnie Griffin, Cobb County's director and assistant director, the program was initiated in an attempt to increase the pool of qualified practitioners from the Library's para-professional ranks. Future plans call for similar programs to be started in other parts of the Atlanta metro area.





In Memoriam Lucretia P. Parker (1917-2002)

It is with sadness that we share with you news of the passing of Mrs. Lucretia J. Pettiford Parker, class of 1954 alumna and former Librarian of the School of Library Service at Atlanta University under the deanship of Dr. Virginia Lacy Jones. Mrs. Parker died of a heart attack at her home in Atlanta on Sunday, February 24, 2002. Graveside services were held on March 1, 2002, at the Greenlawn Cemetery in Portsmouth, Ohio, where she was buried with her husband.

Mrs. Parker was born in Springfield, Ohio, to Dana and Edith Pettiford. After graduating from high school, she attended Wilberforce University in Wilberforce, Ohio, where she graduated with a B.A. degree. While there, she met Lloyd Andrew Parker from Portsmouth, Ohio. They dated throughout college and married soon after graduation. Mr. Parker entered the Army and held the rank of Lieutenant Colonel at the time of his death at age 34 in 1951. Soon after, Mrs. Parker moved to Atlanta and entered the Atlanta University School of Library Service and earned the M.S. in L.S. degree. Upon graduation, she accepted the position of Librarian for the School of Library Service where she served until her retirement on July 31, 1976.

She was a member of the American Library Association and of the American Library Association Discussion Group of Library School Librarians. She was a member of the Metropolitan Atlanta Library Association. She served as a resource person for elementary and high schools, and she served as a consultant for two special libraries, North Carolina Central University, and the Urban Affairs Center at Michigan State University. Mrs. Parker assisted in developing a course on the use of the library and library materials specifically designed for minority group students.

In a letter written to Dr. Thomas D. Jarrett, President of Atlanta University, Mrs. Parker wrote, "I hope that my years of service have proven in some measure as beneficial to the University as they have to me. May I express my appreciation to you that it was during your administration that policies were adopted which recognized the contribution which librarians make toward the academic program of Atlanta University.

Mrs. Parker is survived by her daughter, Cheryl R. Parker Robinson, and her son-in-law Dr. Willie C. Robinson. The family has established the Lloyd and Lucretia Parker Class of 1939 Endowment Scholarship Fund at Wilberforce University for the benefit of a bright and needy student each year. Ms. Ella Yates '51 and Dr. Charles Churchwell '53 were recognized by SLIS and the CAU Alumni Association as outstanding alums, and were recipients of the 2001 Alumni Service Award. The award is given to a distinguished alumna/alumnus in the following categories: Art/ Entertainment, Business and Industry, Education, Science/ Medicine, Religion, Social Work, Service to the Alumni Association, and Service to the University.

Ms. Yates was the first black female librarian appointed by the Governor of the State of Virginia and the first black to be named director of the Atlanta Public Library, where she supervised the building of the present Atlanta-Fulton County Public Library central facility.

Dr. Churchwell was the first black male to head a major research library in the United States; Dean of Library Services, Washington University, St. Louis. He served in leadership positions at the University of Illinois, Houston, Miami, and Clark Atlanta University.

Barbara Shelvin '95 served as the indexer for Judge Horace Ward's book titled Desegregation of the University of Georgia, Civil Rights Advocacy, and Jurisprudence (2001, Clark Atlanta Univ. Press). Judge Ward's wife, Ruth LeFlore Ward, was a 1963 graduate of the SLIS.
