Dr. Cynthia Hale, senior pastor at the Ray of Hope Christian Church in Decatur, Georgia** reported that the FUSE Young Adult Ministry has made a special point of keeping in touch through a GroupME that has 67 members. They have held a ZOOM meeting with 10 to check in with one another, as an occasion for joking and laughter, affirming love for one another, sharing new happening in their lives, and ways could work together.

CREATE OCCASIONS FOR ENCOURAGEMENT:

In another location, young adult leader **Dionne Allen, who heads the Compass Ministry at Temple of Faith Church of God in Christ in Atlanta, Georgia**, initiated weekly 15 minutes morning prayer conference calls where different individuals lead the prayer. 



Know that our church family has you in our prayers daily; and we want to remind you that God's love is still infinite – even in these times.

Explore with me 1 Thessalonians 5:16-18

As we navigate through this season of well-placed concerns about work and health, homeschooling for our children and ourselves, and the thought of what employment, normalcy, and simply being looks like in the coming days, I want to encourage you to be encouraged. In the book of 1 Thessalonians, the apostle Paul encouraged the church in Thessalonica to rejoice, pray unceasingly, and remain thankful to God as they waited for God to move in a time of amazing uncertainty (1 Thessalonians 5:16-18). His message was intended to inspire hope in those who were waiting for certain prayers to be answered and certain situations to change – but the change had been long in coming. It was meant to inspire people to be sensitive to how they all might be answers to someone's prayers, as well as, find joy and hope in being part of the beloved community of God. Be on the lookout for ways we will be connecting virtually through online studies over the next several weeks as we explore God's word together.



TIPS TO TRIUMPH OVER TROUBLE.

L.I.F.E. Ministry at Central UMC set forth 10 Tips to Triumph Over Trouble:

- Adhere to the faith and wisdom of God.
- Be patient with your members as everyone is processing the pandemic differently.
- Stay in touch with those connected to ministry via text, telephone, Zoom, Google Meets.
- Make plans for gathering with anticipated post-pandemic dates.
- Engage weekly as a Hub.
- Think of fun and engaging ways to reach those in your ministry as well as the church as a whole (e.g., challenges, Zoom parties, etc.).
- Be honest with your feelings and reach out for help if you need it.
- Do not overwhelm your members with multiple tasks.
- Make provisions to be a financial blessing to members experiencing grief or celebrations during this time.
- Stay home and go out only when necessary.
