Clark College is honored to pay tribute to Bishop John Wesley Edward Bowen, Jr., in the dedication of the 1960 Yearbook, in grateful recognition of his outstanding leadership in The Methodist Church and his untiring efforts in the advancement of Christian education.

His interest in Clark College stems

His interest in Clark College stems from elementary school days to the present. Indeed, two of the most memorable events in his illustrious career occurred in our College chapel—his elevation to the Episcopacy in 1948, and his receiving in 1959 the degree Doctor of Letters (Litt. D.). Particularly noteworthy is the excellent administrative ability that he has shown over the years as President of the Clark College Board of Trustees.

Bishop Bowen is a native of Baltimore, a graduate of Wesleyan University, of Harvard University and of Gammon Theological Seminary. His career

has been highlighted by excellent service as a college teacher, as an editor of the Central Christian Advocate, as a pastor, as a district superintendent, and as an episcopal leader. More than just giving his exceptional talent and ability, he has brought to our College a "not holier than thou attitude," but an indomitable heart, sincerity and friendliness. He is down to earth, approachable, and steadfast in his relationship with faculty and students.




President of the College

Clark students went over the top in their 1960 United Negro College Fund Campaign in March by raising \$1,995.84—nearly a thousand dollars over the goal set by Campaign Director Dr. William H. Hale and his committee, of which Dr. Wiley S. Bolden was co-chairman.

With classes competing for the honor of electing Clark's "Miss UNCF," the Juniors reported \$493.86 for a per-capita gift of \$4.41. This enabled them to select their classmate, Rosa Jean Robinson, for the title.

Mr. John Hall led the top sub-group, with Mrs. Gladys Cothran's group running a close second. Nurse Chandler and Mr. James J. Green again took laurels for their role as advisors of the winning class.


"Priority Problems" was the Theme of Religious Emphasis Week



The 1959 Clark Col

In 1928 a Clark College football team romped through the season with only one defeat. It took thirty-one years for another Clark squad to duplicate that season—or at least come pletty close to duplicating it. For while the 1928 squad lost one and tied one, the 1959 squad ended the season with two ties and one defeat.

Perhaps the biggest reason for not going undefeated this year was the lack of experience. Like too many Clark teams of recent years, the Panthers this year found themselves distressingly short on know-how plus experience. Twenty-seven men on Coach Epps' thirty-nine-man squad were freshmen.

The season was filled with thrills from start to finish. Such ingredients as converting a fumble into a touchdown, snaring a deflected pass for another touchdown, tying a ball

game on the final play, scoring on the first play from scrimmage, made the season certainly the most interesting one seen by this generation of Clarkites.

Success this year was, as Coach Epps put it, "a result of team effort and a strong desire to win." It goes without saying, however, that there was a lot of talent on the '59 squad, and much of it—most of it—will be back when the season opens next fall, since only four players will graduate this June.

Departing will be Arthur Clay, Becton Donaldson, Arthur Williams and Arthur Carter, all of whom have worn the Cardinal and Black colors well during their four years with the Panthers.

The season opened with the Panthers at Orangeburg, South Carolina, to play Claflin for the first time in recent years. Following came a contest against Fort Valley. Victories in both these games brought forth considerable comment, as did the 6-6 tie with Tuskegee (then unbeaten).


The subsequent tie with Alabama State set the Panthers back somewhat but the fact that the team came from behind to tie the score on the final play of the game kept the living room quarterbacks talking.


In the next game the Panthers registered a 16-14 win over then-unbeaten Morehouse and set themselves up as "the team to beat." A week later the Clarkites had to come from behind again in New Orleans to outscore Xavier at homecoming for a 32-28 victory.

Coming to grips with Savannah State next in a non-conference tilt, the high-flying Panthers piled up their greatest margin of victory in a 28-12 win over the Tigers.

The season's sole setback came on Thanksgiving before a record crowd in Herndon Stadium. The fast-charging Wolverines piled up a 25-0 lead at halftime and went on to earn a 38-0 win that was not as easily gained as the score might indicate.

The highlight of this game for the Panthers was a firstquarter goal-line stand which saw the Panther line hold for four downs with the ball resting only inches from their goal line. Football Captains Becton Donaldson (Co-Capt.), Arthur Carter (Capt.) and Arthur Williams (Co-Capt.)








It was the first time Clark had won a conference opening game since they beat the Wildcats last



The Panthers cashed in their second score on a play which started at the ten yard line, but actually covered thirty-five yards. Quarterback Jones handed off to Spearman, who was hit and separated from the ball behind the line of scrimmage.

The ball bounced back to the thirty-five yard line before Raymond Hughes scooped it up, got a key block from Jimmy Hurt and went all the way for the






That was one of Hughes' two touchdowns in this game. Fullback Arthur Williams also scored twice and carried for one conversion.








