











Marquis L. Harris Library





Former special assistant to the Governor, Carl Ware received a plaque from Clark College on Founder's Day for his important contributions to Clark and the community.





Clark College Christian Fellowship

Clark College Christian Fellowship began as a small Bible Study on Monday night, October 18, 1976, in the basement of Merner Hall with four students. This study was led by Alex Anderson and Tony Warner, staff workers for Inter-Varsity Christian Fellowship. Inter-Varsity is a national/international organization which helps start and build up Christian fellowships on various college and university campuses.

The fellowship became an officially chartered organization in the spring semester of 1978.

The purpose of Clark College Christian Fellowship is to proclaim Jesus Christ and to show and tell how He deals with all the needs of life.

Regular activities of the fellowship are: Monday night Bible study and Tuesday night Prayer meeting. Other activities have been male and female discipleship groups, a Friday night social in the Rec and a Come As You Are informal service.

Students Abroad

The Students Abroad Program affords Clarkites an opportunity to travel and study in foreign countries.

Students in this program exchange and share information and ideas with other students in such countries as Africa, France, England and the Bahamas.

In addition to learning about the social, economic and political systems of other countries, these students sometime form friendships and ties that are everlasting.

Women's Resource Center

The Women's Resource Center is a group of freshman, sophomore, junior and senior young women who are active in the community. The center is housed in the lower level of Merner Hall. 


The Chapparals warmed the large crowd with their exciting disco and soulful beats. All present anticipated and welcomed all the sounds coming at them.

Clark College Graduating Class







A MESSAGE TO THE STUDENTS OF CLARK COLLEGE

RE: STUDENT CHALLENGES FOR THE 80's

I begin this message with lines from Robert Browning:

"The year's at the spring
And day's at the morn;
Morning's at seven;
The hillside's dew-pearled;
The lark's on the wing;
The snail's on the thorn.
God's in his heaven—
All's right with the World."

The decade of the 80's is just beginning. You are still in the spring of life. God is in his heaven; but all is not right with the world. The first challenge is in your beginning with the first year of the decade; your being blessed with youth; and finally, there being so much to be accomplished in the ten years ahead.

The years of the 80's should be great years for you. This will be the age span approximately between 18 and 32. These are the years in which you will be challenged to realize your potentials and your limitations; to learn, and to develop your potentials and in some instances to turn limitations into assets. This is the time you will learn to work efficiently to produce, to achieve maximum self development, to live — to live wisely and well.

You will be challenged to make adjustments to changing demands in a changing society and expanding world. Along with changes and new demands in the traditional professions such as Law, Education, Ministry, Medicine, Social Work, Business, etc., there is

coming a whole new world of work and professionalism.

The airplane has made the whole world smaller and many American cities like Atlanta are rapidly becoming international. Our country (USA) is becoming one of the most international in the world. This imposes new language demands. Not only must English be mastered and used well and effectively, but because of our growing international character other languages must be learned for ordinary communication. New options for vocational and professional work will be enhanced or limited by lingual ability and accomplishment.

Travel will open new options, enhanced by increasing plane travel in America and across international lines. Places and people, once weeks apart in time, are now only hours apart. This new nearness is a new challenge for work and life-styles. In the 80's there will be new and increasing challenges in communications media, with new options in radio, television, journalism, and others, requiring mastery of speech, writing, drama, art, music, and human relations. The computer science is opening up new options in the area of mathematics. Here are opportunities that will be much less limited for Black people.

The years of the 80's will challenge you to make decisions. Some of the most important decisions of your life will be made; decisions relative to vocation, a profession of life work; decisions about marriage and personal relationships; decisions about where you will live; decisions about your religious life and affiliation; and many other decisions. Make all of your decisions with due deliberation and care, for in a large measure your decisions in the 80's will determine your future. Your decisions in the 80's will have much bearing upon your economic security. Be not deceived by false economy and fantastic ideas of riches. Whatever you do be honest in all your dealings and relationships; in proportion to what you make, SPEND SOME for your needs, GIVE SOME in support of worthy causes, and SAVE SOME for your security.

The decade of the 80's will challenge you to excellence. Nothing will be more important than your coming to grips with the quality of your performance, in your academic work, and in your profession. Success and satisfying achievements do not often come by chance, but by a self-possessed will and incessant efforts to achieve excellence, and by hard work.

In the decade of the 80's you will be challenged to examine your self

image. The values you hold and reflect in your image will greatly influence the person you may actually become. Racial identity is incidental. It does not PER SE determine one's ability, nor what one might achieve. The decade of the 80's, as all previous decades of Black history, will challenge your efforts and test the strength of your will and the flint of your soul as you strive to achieve and earn for yourself and your generation a new image in the American society. You will be challenged to free your mind of any notion that because you are Black the whole world is against you and that you do not have a chance; or conversely, because you are Black the world owes you everything. The world only owed you a fair and equal chance. You will be challenged to prove who you are and what you can do. We as Black people have been restricted far too long a time to one world - predominatly a Black world. The past three decades have brought revolutionary changes. The decade of the 80's will bring more changes of a revolutionary and liberating character. A new American culture is evolving. You will be challenged to help make the new culture. Your ability to meet this challenge will require a liberated mind and spirit; a new sensitivity to a broader view of human relations and a new concept of the worth of all human beings. While you will always be challenged to be mindful of and true to the Black American heritage, your survival and your advancement in the 80's and beyond, will depend upon your understanding of, your responsiveness to, and your involvement in a new and evolving seding all racial boundaries and limitations.

The decade of the 80's will challenge you to a new life mission and a new commitment to the highest and best in life. For you I have high hopes and high expectations. Do not disappoint yourself. Do not disappoint yourself. Do not disappoint those who expect much of you because of the opportunities you now have and will have in the years of the 80's.

"To thine own self be true, And it must follow, as The night the day, Thou canst not then be False to any man"

 And at the end of the 80's you will have no regrets.


Business Administration And Economics
