

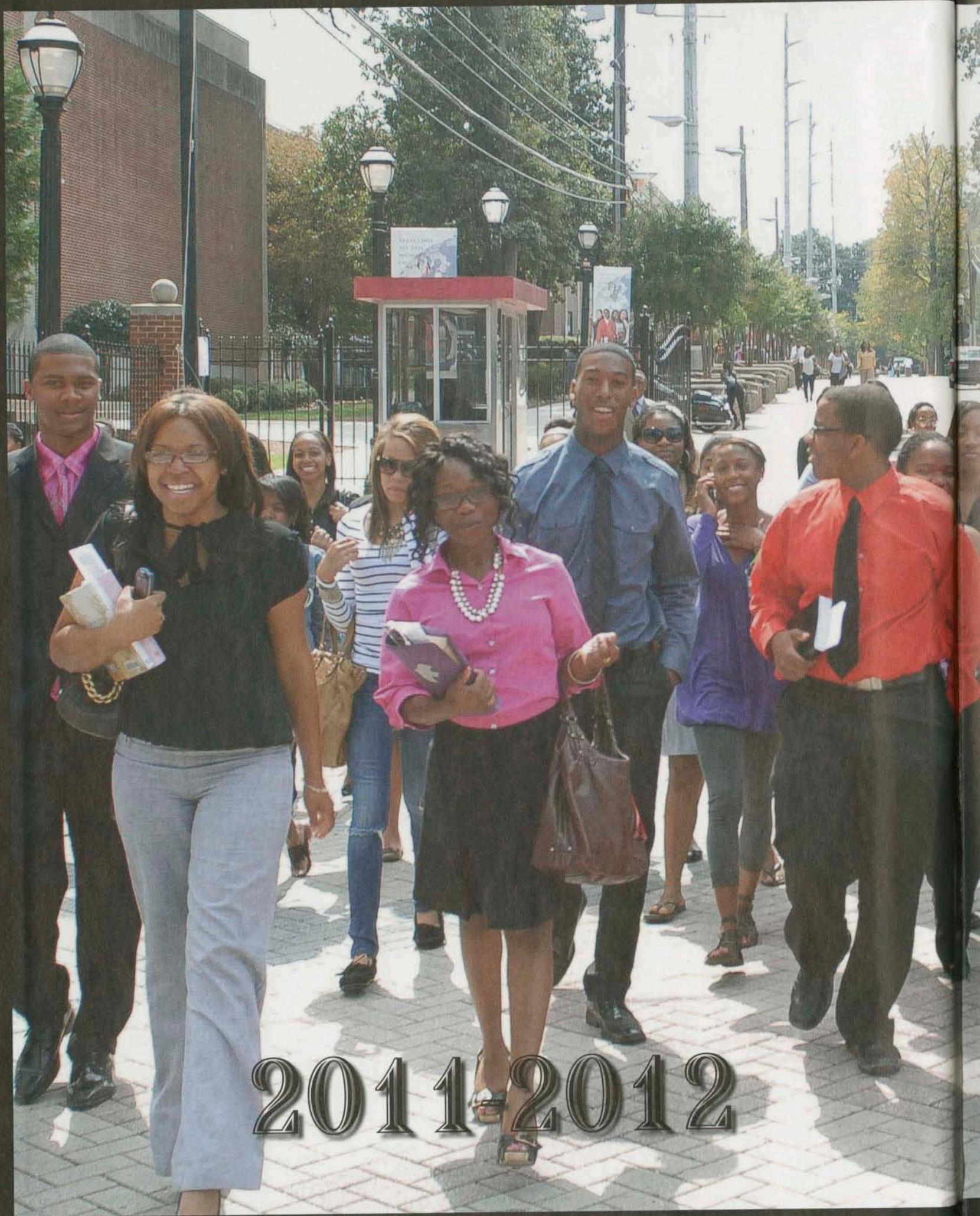

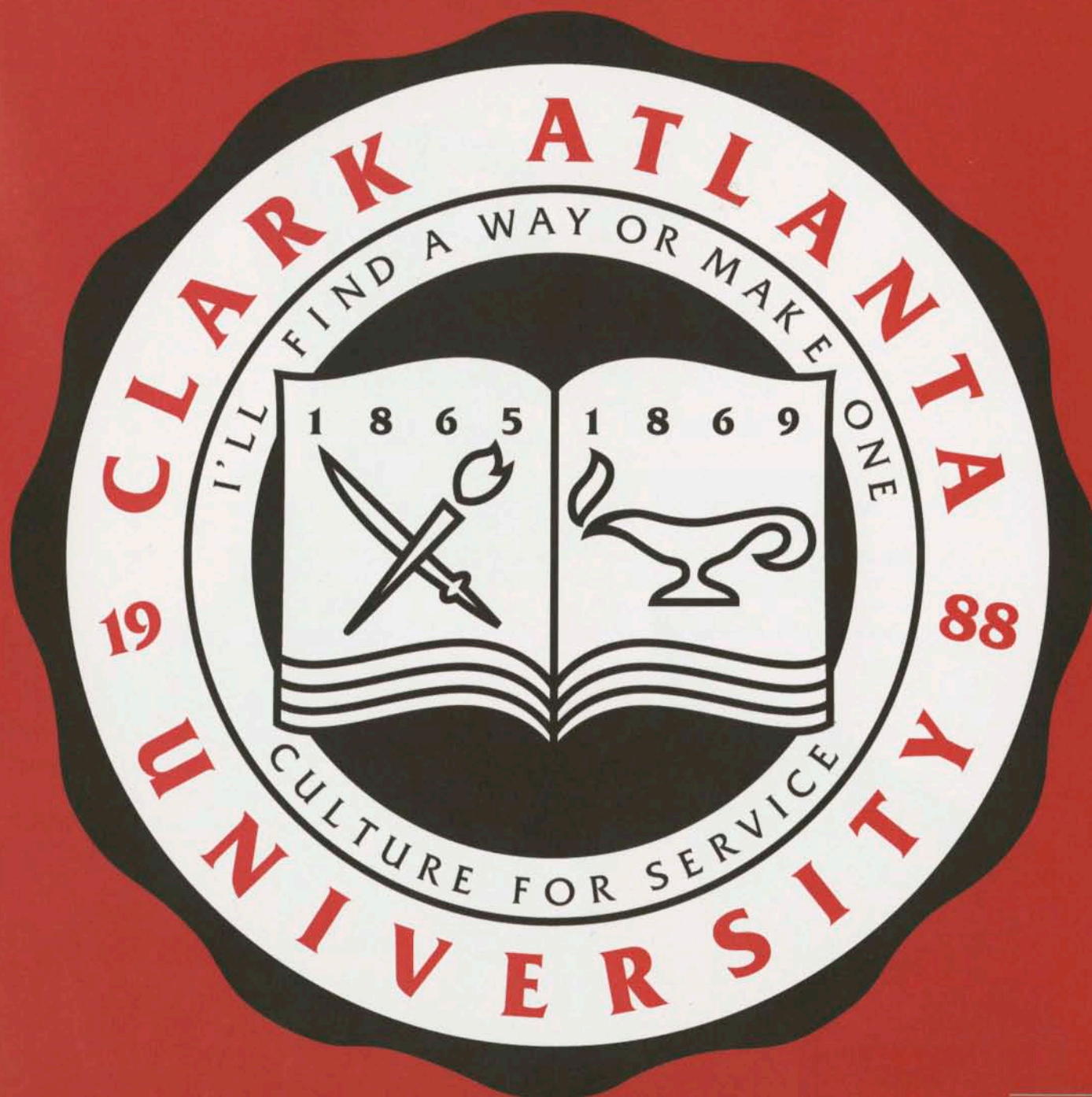

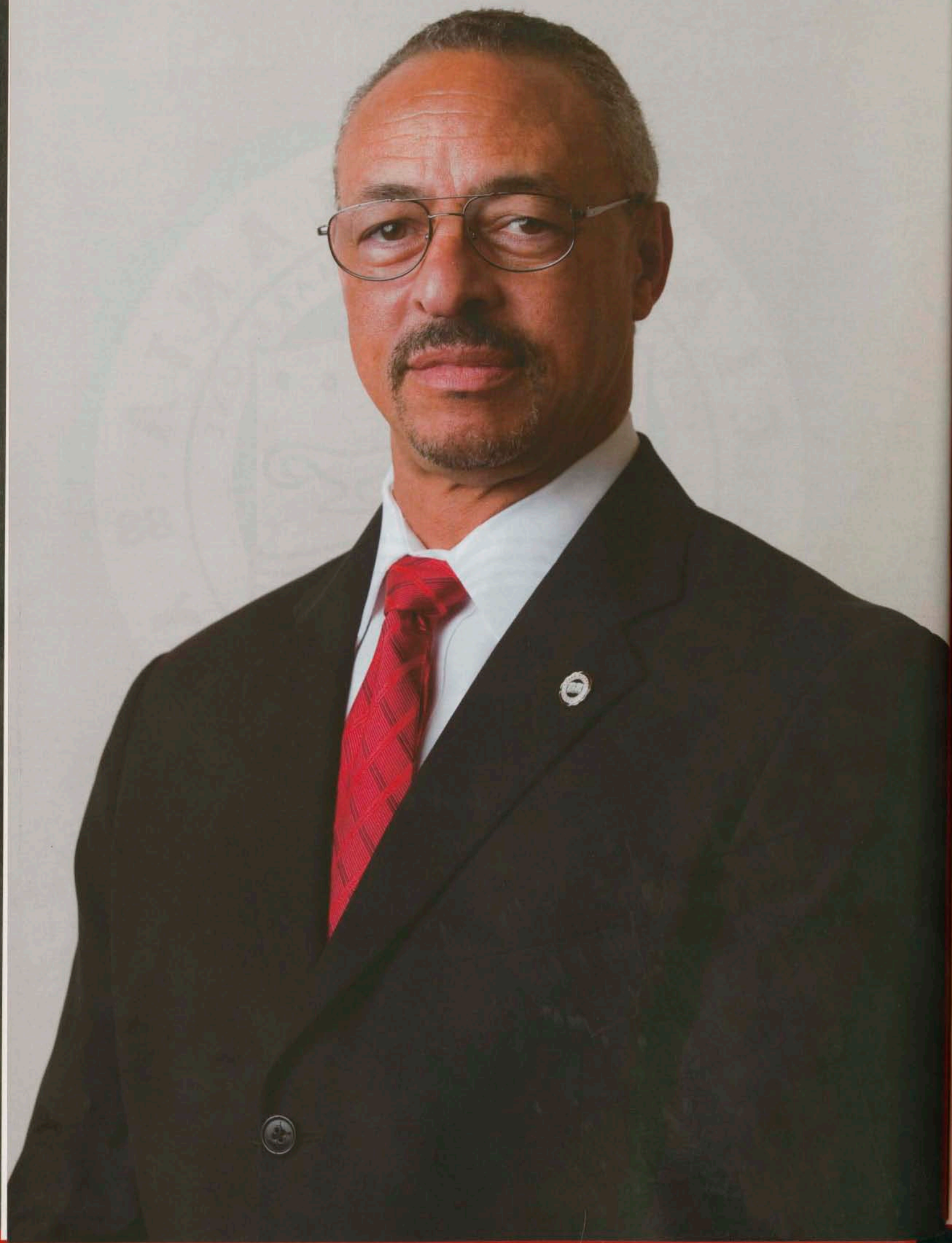

I have been blessed to serve in the higher education community throughout my career. 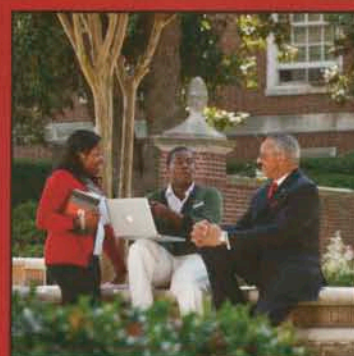
In 2007, my career afforded me the opportunity to join the Clark Atlanta University family as provost and executive vice president. The students here set my very first impression of the campus. In 40 years, I've not witnessed a more talented assemblage of young men and women. As I have grown to know and love this University, especially since my appointment as president in 2008, I have noted with tremendous delight the engagement of the student community around causes that are larger than their personal and professional aspirations. I have come to know CAU as a community of students engaged on purpose.

At colleges and universities around the globe, young scholars attend to their academic agendas one class, one semester at a time. Clark Atlanta is no different in this respect. I am heartened, however, by the degree to which students here have developed an esprit de corps that centers upon service to others. While many administrators might concede that their students attempt to out-do each other with regard to latest fashions and fads, I am increasingly aware of CAU students' efforts to out-serve each other, locally, nationally and internationally and to collaborate with and support each other in the process.

In 2010, a small group of students in an entrepreneurship class decided quite literally to effect change in Haiti. Their willingness to collect spare coins became a community-wide campaign that resulted in the funding of scholarships for 98 schoolchildren in the nation still ravaged by the effects of a major earthquake. In 2011, I watched as students—male and female—fully invested themselves in the crusade to end dating and domestic violence, not only during the University's annual week-long campaign against the crime, but throughout the school year. I also had occasion to form a partnership with Operation HOPE that will strategically combine education and community service in a unique manner, incorporating financial literacy training into CAU student recovery team efforts in communities impacted by natural and other disasters. These initiatives, of course, complement the myriad efforts by campus and fraternal organizations to improve the standard of living for others in ways large and small.

This unselfish impressment counts for more than an index of "goodness" or lines on one's co-curricular transcript. In an increasingly global society, true leaders and those considered "great" will distinguish themselves by their ability to anticipate and resolve global issues and concerns. That this has become a core aspect of the Clark Atlanta University experience is extremely gratifying. As a university president, this evokes immense pride. As one who hopes to reap from what your generation will sow into this world, it offers the assurance of greater peace, a sense of hope and great expectations for the days to come.

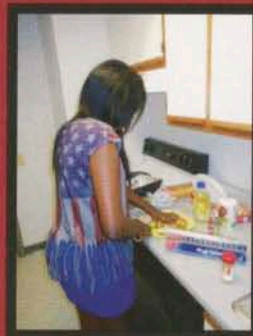


James P. Brawley Hall

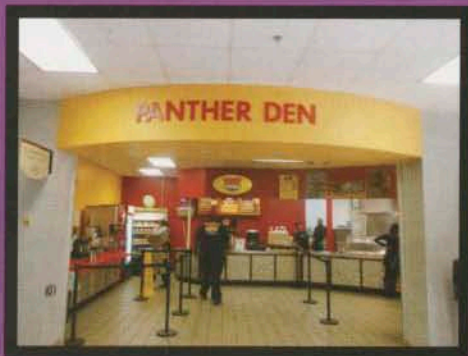

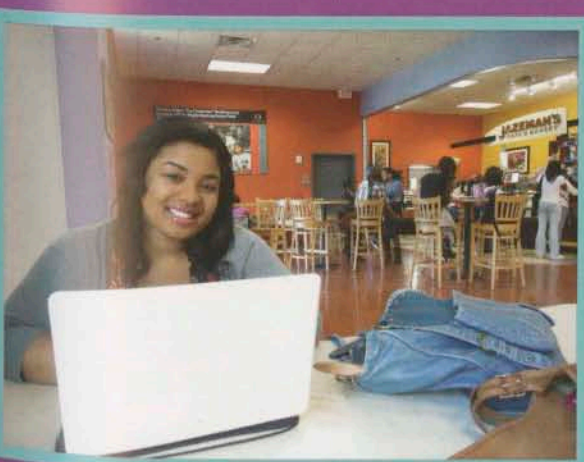

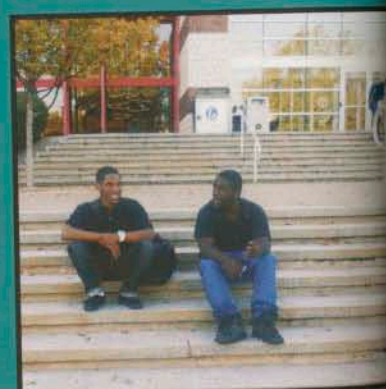
ROBERT W. WOODRUFF LIBRARY



Constructed in 1982, the Robert W. Woodruff Library provides a range of learning opportunities for the students of the Atlanta University Center. It is named in honor of Robert Winship Woodruff, former CEO of the Coca Cola Company. Nearly 100 trained librarians and support staff work to ensure that the Woodruff Library is a safe, efficient and effective learning environment. Holdings include: 352,000 print volumes; 53,000 electronic books; 31,000 bound journal volumes; 1,500 current journal subscriptions; 7,600 videos, DVDs and CDs; and more than 235 electronic databases. Electronic resources are accessible via the Library's 230 public workstations and remotely through its website, www.auctr.edu. The Archives Research Center is noted for its extensive holdings of materials for scholarly research on the African American experience, including the Morehouse College Martin Luther King Jr. Collection and the Tupac Amaru Shakur Collection.

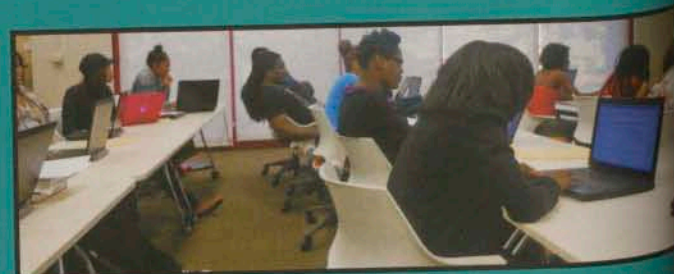

Awareness is Empowerment

Clark Atlanta University's students participated in commemorating 21 years of walking/running. The AIDS Walk Atlanta and 5K Run was held at Piedmont Park on Sunday, October 16, 2011. The walk continues to raise the much needed funds for organizations throughout the metro-Atlanta area. These organizations provide essential programs and services to men, women and children who are infected with or affected by HIV/AIDS.



AIDS Walk Atlanta & 5K Run is the largest AIDS related fundraising event in the Southeastern United States.

Breast Cancer Awareness

Fact: Today, approximately 1 in almost every 8 women will develop breast cancer in her lifetime.

National Breast Cancer Awareness Month (NBCAM) is an annual international health campaign organized by major breast cancer charities every October to increase awareness of the disease and to raise funds for research into its cause, prevention, diagnosis, treatment and cure.

Over the past 20 years, great progress has been made in the early detection and treatment of breast cancer. As a result, the number of breast cancer survivors continues to rise. In fact, there are more than 2.5 million survivors in the U.S. today.



Fact: Breast cancer is the most common cancer among American women, after skin cancer.

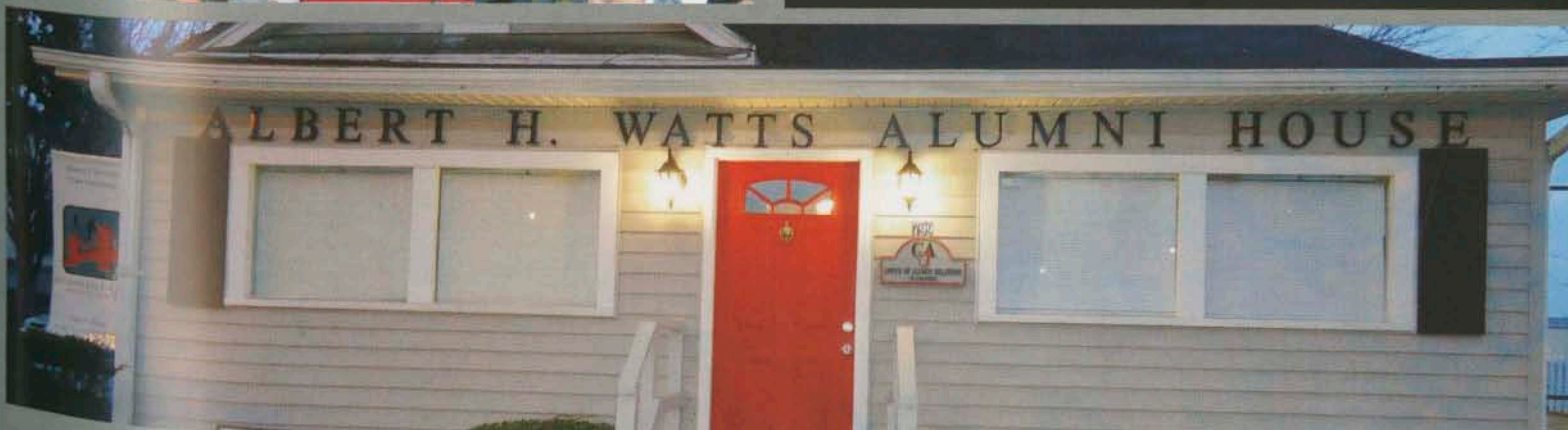
What was your most memorable moment at CAU?

THE FIGHT FOR JUSTICE CONTINUES . . .

ON THE MORNING OF SEPTEMBER 21, 2011, THE BUTTS COUNTY SUPERIOR COURT DENIED DAVIS'S REQUEST TO HALT HIS EXECUTION. THE GEORGIA SUPREME COURT ALSO DENIED HIS APPEAL. DAVIS WAS SET TO BE EXECUTED AT 7 PM ET.

ON SEPTEMBER 21, 2011, CLARK ATLANTA UNIVERSITY STUDENTS, JOINED TOGETHER AND MARCHED TO THE STATE CAPITOL BUILDING. ALONG THE WAY, STUDENTS RECEIVED SUPPORT AND WERE JOINED BY MANY.

TROY DAVIS, 42, DIED AT 11:08 P.M. ET, ACCORDING TO A GEORGIA DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTIONS OFFICIAL. HIS DEATH BY LETHAL INJECTION CAME AFTER A FOUR-HOUR DELAY FOR LEGAL REVIEW. HIS FUNERAL WAS ATTENDED BY OVER 1,000 PEOPLE IN SAVANNAH, GEORGIA, ON OCTOBER 1, 2011.



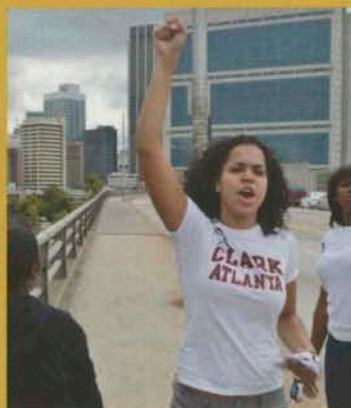

Lady Panthers Headed to Regional Championship

Atlanta, GA- After capturing the 2011 Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Conference (SIAC) women's cross country championship, the Clark Atlanta University Lady Panthers earned their second consecutive trip to the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) Division I Regional Championships hosted by the University of Tampa Saturday, November 5th, in Tampa, Florida.

"We are definitely more focused and motivated, and we know what to expect this time around," said team captain Nekesha Whitaker.

The Lady Panthers ran a total time of 1:46:00.49 and an average time of 21:12.10 at the conference championship which was just enough to hold off defending champion Albany State University, who finished second with a time of 1:46:20.96. Clark Atlanta, which had four of the top 10 finishers in the meet, was led by sophomore Brittany Robinson, who finished third overall with a time of 20:56.58.

Sophomore Markeshia Woodson, who is a four-time SIAC runner of the week, crossed the finish line in fifth place (21:00.05) while Ariel Lomax, Breya Davis, Comer and Whitaker all gave a valiant effort and recorded personal bests for the season. Lomax finished sixth with a time of 21:04.61, Davis rounded out the 10th spot at 21:12.28, Comer captured 12th place (21:46.96) and Whitaker came in 18th at 22:17.52.

For the regular season, Clark Atlanta swept the individual, coach and team awards as Robinson was also named East Division Runner of the Year. Head Coach Pamela Page was named East Division Coach of the Year, and the Lady Panthers were named East Division Team of the Year. Lomax, a business management major, was named to the conference All-Academic Team with a 3.80 grade point average.

"We had a hard season this year and nobody deserved this conference championship and another opportunity to run for a regional championship more than us," said Comer.

To add to their accolades for the season, The Lady Panthers won three of their seven cross country meets hosted by Oglethorpe University, Morehouse College and Tuskegee University during the regular season.

"This is what I expect them to do as ambassadors, students and champions," said Director of Athletics Dr. Tamica Smith-Jones. "I am thrilled for Coach Page and her staff who have done a remarkable job winning the program's second conference championship in three years."

But nobody is more proud of the Lady Panthers than Page because "they all gave 110 percent on the course and exemplified the meaning of team," she said. "Everyone will know who Clark Atlanta is after the regional championships this weekend."

Since its founding on December 4, 1906, Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity, Inc. has supplied voice and vision to the struggle of African-Americans and people of color around the world.

Alpha Phi Alpha, the first intercollegiate Greek-letter fraternity established for African-Americans, was founded at Cornell University in Ithaca, New York by seven college men who recognized the need for a strong bond of Brotherhood among African descendants in this country. The visionary founders, known as the "Jewels" of the Fraternity, are Henry Arthur Callis, Charles Henry Chapman, Eugene Kinckle Jones, George Biddle Kelley, Nathaniel Allison Murray, Robert Harold Ogle, and Vertner Woodson Tandy.

The Fraternity initially served as a study and support group for minority students who faced racial prejudice, both educationally and socially, at Cornell. The Jewel founders and early leaders of the Fraternity succeeded in laying a firm foundation for Alpha Phi Alpha's principles of scholarship, fellowship, good character, and the uplifting of humanity.

Founded on the campus of Howard University in Washington, DC in 1908, Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority is the oldest Greek-letter organization established by African American college-trained women. The small group of women who organized the Sorority was conscious of a privileged position as college-trained women of color, just one generation removed from slavery. They were resolute that their college experiences should be as meaningful and productive as possible. Alpha Kappa Alpha was founded to apply that determination.

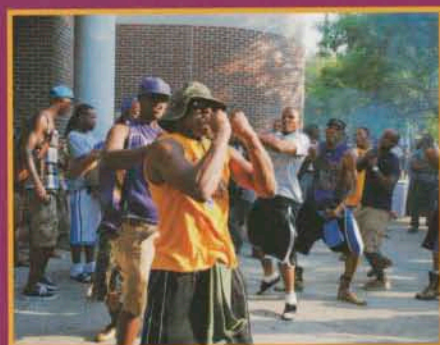
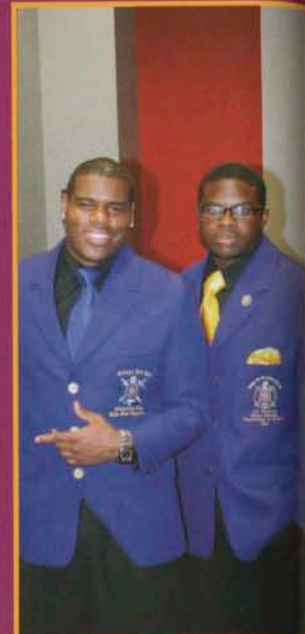
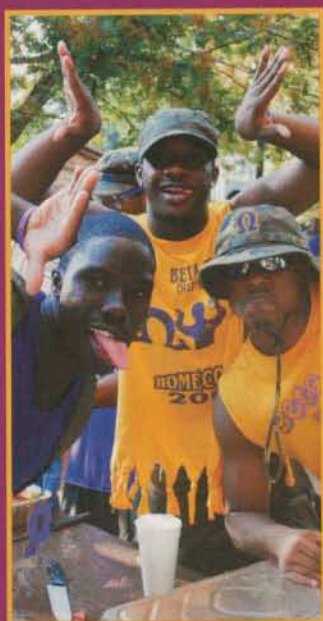

The year was 1920. It was the start of the decade, shortly after World War One, a time of great prosperity for the country. During this time women were politically and socially oppressed and racial tensions were high. The worst and longest economic recession to ever hit the United States would define the end of the decade – The Great Depression. It was within this environment that Zeta Phi Beta Sorority, Incorporated was founded.

Zeta Phi Beta Sorority, Inc. was founded on the simple belief that sorority elitism and socializing should not overshadow the real mission for progressive organizations but should address societal ills, prejudices, poverty, and health concerns of today. Founded January, 16, 1920, Zeta Phi Beta began as an idea conceived by five coeds at Howard University in Washington D.C. – Arizona Cleaver, Myrtle Tyler, Viola Tyler, Fannie Pettie and Pearl Neal. These five women, also known as our Five Pearls, dared to depart from the traditional coalitions for black women and sought to establish a new organization predicated on the precepts of Scholarship, Service, Sisterly Love, and Finer Womanhood. It was the ideal of our founders that the sorority would reach college women in all parts of the country who were sorority minded and desired to follow the founding principles of the organization.

“Sexy Prolific” Psi Chapter was founded on the campus of Clark College in 1931 and chartered at Clark Atlanta University in 1988. For 81 years, Psi Chapter has prided themselves on quality over quantity; a value that is still continued in the organization today.

2. What subject do you teach? How long have you been working at the University?

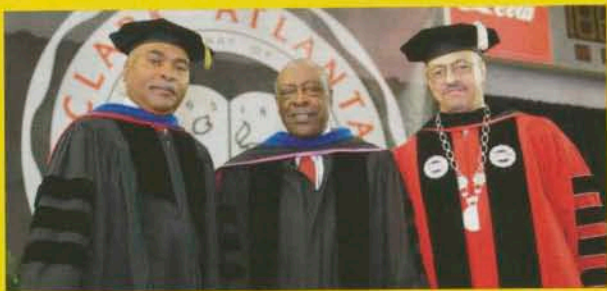
