
ADMINISTRATION BUILDING

LIBRARY



"a tale told by an idiot..."

In September of 1934, there came out of promenading high school classes an expedition of green, awkward men, seeking to ascertain the veracity of "et facta est lux."

First days on the campus were made interesting by the presence of a vociferous, all-knowing individual who had dubbed himself "the mighty tyrannical Czar." The class fell prone to its first bit of unorthodox organization as a result of his efforts when barricades were constructed on the third floor of Graves Hall to withstand the attacks of the Sophomores who felt that the way to instill "spirit" in a freshman class was through the "board of education." The battle raged: the freshmen were defeated. The Class of '38 emerged sore, but happy.

Having brought with them their "foibles, idiosyncracies, versatility, taste for originality and love for democracy," the Class of '38 immediately began to assert itself as a definite motivating force in the life of the institution. Members of the class found their ways into the Maroon Tiger, Chi Delta Sigma, Y. M. C. A., Glee Club and Orchestra, University Players, and the many other varying campus activities.

The challenge of the "spirit" of the upperclassmen was accepted and members of the class locked arms with them as they strolled about the campus serenading the stars. By the time June, 1935, rolled around the bond of fellowship had grown so strong among the members of the entire student body that parting tears were suppressed only by a gritting of teeth.

Among the archives of the class were placed such memorable names as "Sonny" Kirtley, "Kat" Harris, "Czar" Huffman, "Br'er" Johnson, "Deacon" Satchell, "Geech" Moore, "Tota" Pierro, "Bill" Thomas, "Flash" Tubbs, "Wonderful" Hill, "Fairy Queen," "Hill-billy" Dawson, "Jimmy" Nix, "Tarzan" Brown, and many others too numerous to record, all of whom had distinguished themselves in some commendable manner.

When "ol' faithful" in the tower of Graves Hall tolled the knell of a new year in September. 1935, the class reassembled to have another try at "knowledge is light." The receding effects of the much-talked-of and more-severely-felt depression took its toll and among those who failed to answer the roll call was the "Czar." His absence was mourned at a meeting over which "Deacon" Satchell presided.

Being sophomores, acting sophomorically, struggling amazedly with our first taste of *real* college studies, the class fought a valiant battle to maintain itself in the presence of the new freshman class. In the class room, athletics, debating, fraternities, and other activities, the men of "38 began to hue to the line: the quips were of little consequence.

The opening of the school year 1936-37 found the class again suffering telling losses. Many found it necessary to meet the wolf without benefit of the cherished A. B. Several fell victim to ignorance---of various sorts. The irreparable losses were appeased only by the arrival of the Bethune-Cookman delegation that brought the crooning twins, Ernest "Peanut" Ponder and Edward "Cuffe* Strickland and the inimitable Bernard Milton Jones. "Tubby" Washington and "Chippy" Swain joined the ranks along with Roland (not the famed tenor) Hayes and "Ike" Meadows, who came from eastern universities to lend their talents to the success of the Class of '38.

"....signifying nothing"

In the middle of a series of activities that were resounded by the then popular "music goes 'round and 'round." the class and the entire University System was stilled in its tracks by the very untimely death of our leader, benefactor and friend. Dr. John Hope. The class paid its meager tribute in a floral offering to "our fallen Captain" and accepted the daily routine dazed by the vast proportions of the irreparable loss the nation had suffered.

Like all graduating classes, this class has talents of which it is proud. Among its accomplishments the class records: a twice-selected All-American football player. a host of honor students, three champion basketball players, two founders of a national society, a champion tennis player and innumerable other outstanding characters who have proved their mettle in trying situations.

The group of men who came four years ago to obtain the knowledge that is light now stand on the threshold of a venture into a new world and a new life.

"Profound knowledge we have yet to gain." but we have gained experiences, contacts and conventions that will make us stronger."

We, the Class of 1938, feel that in time to come we may be able to do our bit toward relieving all this suffering and heartache in our country. "We are no prophets, but we expect to become the end of that prophecy that speaks of outstanding careers!"

As the day of commencement draws near, the members of the class stand about the campus scarcely able to realize that the four years have passed and the work is done. But, of one thing we are fully cognizant: that we have a great heritage to observe, and each members of the class has pledged himself to think on't, bearing in mind:

"There is a tide in the affairs of men. Which, taken at the flood, leads on to fortune; Omitted, all the voyage of their life Is bound in shallows, and in miseries. On such a full sea are we now afloat; And we must take the current when it serves. Or lose our ventures."




Mrs. J. B. Stewart Hostess

challenge that is handed to them in the great heritage of the institution.




Ki-Yi Club
