#### Massey, Hopps put an end to speculations

Both President Massey and Provost and Senior Vice-President for Academic Affairs John Hopps deny rumors that Hopps will resign under duress at the semester's end. According to these rumors, certain administrators and



members of the board of trustees have e e n pressuring Dr. Massey to call Hopps' for resignation.

"Nobody is putting any pressure on me to force him [Hopps] to resign," said Massey.

In denying the rumors, Massey referred to his longstanding relationship with Hopps.


"We are friends," said Massey. "We were roommates at Morehouse. We worked together as physicists."

However, Hopps said that he is considering offers, from other institutions.

"There is a possibility that I won't be returning [next school year], but that will be my choice, said Hopps. "I've had calls from institutions with offers but I have not made any commitments."

Hopps declined to disclose the institutions and details of the offers that he has received.

Hopps joined the College's administration in January 1996, when Massey named him to the then newly established position of Provost and Senior Vice President for Academic Affairs. He has since served as the College's second most senior administrative officer after Massey.

#### Morehouse taking the bite out of the Y2K bug

pact to be caused by the onslaught of the Year 2000 millennium bug (Y2K). Most of the general public has been made aware of the expected computer malfunction to occur as the internal clocks of all automated, date sensitive systems input the date 1/1/00. However, few people are aware that 9/9/

# Morehouse student gives mother the gift of life

Last Christmas, Morehouse sophomore and Maryland native, Anthony Davis surprised his mother with a "Morehouse Mom" sweatshirt . "I really wanted to let her know how much I loved her and my father know how much I appreciated them getting me to Morehouse," said Davis. "I wanted her to somehow experience what I was feeling."

Davis outdid himself this year by giving his mother, suffering from kidney failure, his own kidney.


Tragedy struck the Davis household in the middle of 1997, when Beverly Davis, Anthony's mother, was diagnosed with kidney failure while undergoing a routine physical examination. According to Lynt Johnson, chief of transplant surgery at Georgetown University Medical Center, kidney failure can be undectectable by the victim until the latter stages of deterioration, as it did with Ms. Davis. In fact, her doctor is still unsure of the cause. "It is not until the kidney gets down to the last percent of function that a person could be (physically) ill." The kidney removes waste from the body and is an integral part of the body's waste management and digestive systems.

While the family dealt with his mother's illness, Anthony entered his freshman year at Morehouse. By January, Beverly Johnson's condition had deteriorated and she had already endured 11 operations and undergone dialysis.

The strain of dealing with his mother's illness took a noticeable toll on Anthony. "Thinking about

# Morehouse systems: Are they ready for 2000?

represent "forever." Much of the public's awareness on the Y2K issue has come from the mass media, which has shifted its stance of labeling the early proponents of Y2K readiness as 'doom and gloom' nay-sayer's, to accurately informing the public of the massive efforts being made by corporations around the globe. Despite the unpredictable nature of the effects that Y2K will have, we must realize that all date sensitive computers will be affected. "Will Morehouse College be ready?"

Until recently, the system of utilizing long lines to first clear financial aid, receive a permit to register, then enroll in a course, had not been compacted into an efficient, internet-based process. However, the Y2K bug threatens the security of such an efficient process. Furthermore, if Y2K impacts banks and Financial Aid sources as predicted, then

the results could be Imagine catastrophic. leaving Morehouse for Winter Break dependent on a loan to be transmitted electronically to your account and returning at the start of the semester to find that you cannot enroll due to a system error.

At the helm of the fight to protect Morehouse interests, is Dr. John Foster, Vice Provost for the Office Information of Technologies. Dr. Foster serves as the chairman for the Morehouse College Y2K Task Force, an organization comprised of 21 Morehouse officials. Each member serves a committee that the isolates various potential problems associated with Y2K.

In order to reach the June 1999 deadline, the Morehouse College Y2K Taskforce has compiled a six-month plan. The strategy is summarized as a plan two-level for categorizing and addressing Y2K readiness, as well as a contingency plan. Morehouse College constituency should be relieved to learn that the college is approximately 90% Y2K ready. Of the 10%, remaining approximately 5% of datesensitive systems are manufactured by vendors who claim to have a Y2K program that will be released in February or March. The remaining 5% the labeled are as The questionable. estimated \$20,000 budget set aside for this matter, is near nowhere the multibillion dollars investments of wealthy corporations, yet Morehouse stands to gain from their investments as a protected clientele. Of course, if by worst case scenario, the 8 million dollars of financial aid that Morehouse students receive by electronic transfer is unavailable for the Spring 2000 semester, Dr. Foster reports that the Y2K Taskforce plans to finance the students provided that the funds would become available at a later date. He also reports

that Y2K test programs have reassures. been successfully run on most campus systems.

Grover Director of Administrative encourage Data Processing for the AUC, Inc. is chairman of the AUC Y2K taskforce. His role has been one of structural support for the Academic Computer Center housed within the Robert Woodruff Library. He also organized a preliminary meeting last October, which served the purpose of connecting the task force representatives of each individual AUC institution. This team will reconvene later this month to revisit the problems that each institution's technology may face in the year 2000.

"The AUC Y2K task force will act as a support for mechanism our institutions which may not be compliant as the deadline approaches. We expect a few problems, but not the massive terror that the preachers predict," Simmons

Continued from page 1 her disturbed the normal flow of thing," said Davis. "It became hard to concentrate on school and I felt separated from her and helpless." Morehouse Administrator and former Resident Director of Fair Street Dorms, M'Ronald Keith Tuck also noticed the stress Davis was going through. "He was thinking of pulling out of school,' said Tuck.

Administrators such as Tuck, as well as other students provided the emotional and psychological support Davis needed at such a trying time. "I remember one day I was just bawling on the phone. I couldn't stop crying, but some brothers came by, and instead of laughing at me, they talked to me. This is the kind of brotherhood I was looking for at when I came to Morehouse," said Davis. The support he received from his Morehouse brothers and his father, who insisted he stay in school convince d Davis to weather out the school year.

As time passed, and it became apparent that Ms. Davis would need a kidney, she remained adamant that none of her four children go through the ordeal of donating one of their

kidneys. "My initial thought was that I didn't want my children going through what

I was going through," said Beverly Davis. However, as her husband and numerous family members and friends were unable to provide a suitable kidney, Anthony secretly got involved.

Because finding matches for Black kidney patients can be difficult, Anthony contacted Georgetown to learn more about being a donor. While roughly half of all patients needing kidney transplants are black, only fifteen percent of donors are black. While interracial and inter-gender donations are not unheard of, according to Johnson, the doctor who performed the procedure, the chances of success are much better when donor and recipient are from a like group. As a rule, because of the shortage of suitable donors, Blacks are likely to wait longer for a transplant.

"I remember one day she got a letter telling her that one of her potential donors had failed to be a match," said Davis. "She started crying. That's when I decided that I was going to do it." Davis had passed the tissue match tests and approached his mother about going through with the transplant. She finally caved in to his unselfish offer, but only under the condition that all testing would be done during school breaks, and the operation would occur during Christmas break, so as not to interrupt Anthony's schoolwork.

This past break, ten days before Christmas, mother and son lay down for the operation, and under Dr. Johnson's watchful eye, the operation went smoothly. Both are making swift recoveries. "As soon as they put the kidney in her, it started working. She said it keeps her running o the bathroom, which is good, I guess," said Davis.

As Christmas approached, and the family began giving gifts, they can rest assured the greatest gift, that of life, had already been given. "We've always been close," said Ms. Davis, "and I'm sure we will be even closer now that I have a part of him inside me. It is the best Christmas gift I could have."

Robert Shaw, director of the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra Chorus and former director of the Atlanta Symphony, passed on January 25. His career in Atlanta linked him closely to the Morehouse College Glee Club, with which a relationship was forged that spanned over three decades.

"Robert Shaw's friendship with Wendell Whalum resulted in a long lasting relationship with the Morehouse College Glee Club," remarked Dr. David Morrow, director of the Glee Club. Shaw was one of four honorary members of the Glee Club.

The link between Morehouse College and Robert Shaw was formed in 1967 when Shaw, a then first-year conductor of the ASO invited the Glee Club (at the time, under the directorship of Wendell Whalum) to perform with the orchestra. In the years following, Shaw contributed to the musical history of the Glee Club many more times.

Highlights include a performance during the premiere of Scott Joplin's




Shaw broadened the horizons of coral music

opera "Treemonisha" (directed by Shaw), and a performance at the Kennedy Center in 1991 when Shaw was honored there. The Glee Club has also consistently been featured in the annual "Christmas with Robert Shaw" series of concerts at Symphony Hall since 1987. LeSean Lewis, a senior music major and current student director of the Glee Club shared his thoughts on the loss of Robert Shaw.

"[Robert Shaw's] legacy to choral music is insurmountable," Lewis said. "His inclusion of the Glee Club in the performances at Symphony Hall came at a time when Blacks did not even have the opportunity to sit in the audience."

On the Friday after Shaw's death, the Morehouse College Glee Club was one of three featured choruses to perform at a memorial celebration in Symphony

Hall. The Glee Club, along with the ASO Chorus and the Robert Shaw Institute Singers, honored the late musical innovator through song. There could not have been a more fitting tribute to a man who meant so much to so many.



IOC to throw out six members in bribery scandal Olympic leaders want out throw out six members out of the International Olympic Committee (IOC) in a bid to clean up their ranks after the Salt lake City bribery scandal. The members are accused of taking \$600,000 worth of goods and services from Salt Lake before the U.S. city won a vote to stage the 2002 Winter Games in 1995. Under the IOC rules, members are not allowed to receive gifts worth more than \$150. IN announcing the decision, IOC president Juan Antonio Samaranch made it clear that the next Winter Games would go ahead in Salt Lake City and said he had no intention of resigning over the scandal.

#### Debit cards help small firms

Debit cards marketed especially for small businesses have only been available through MasterCard and visa for a couple of years, but their popularity is skyrocketing. While the business owner gets a convenient way to keep track of expenditures and other perks, card issuers gain entry into another lucrative market. Hibernia Bank's Meinecke says that with the debit card, companies don't need to worry about places that don't accept checks. It also eliminates check-handling fees, and companies can pre-set spending and cash-access limits for employees.

#### Last hold-out town closes for M.L. King Day

The only Connecticut town that did not give its workers paid time off for Martin Luther King Jr. Day observed the holiday for the first time. Mayor William Dickinson announced the decision to give an additional paid holiday in the face of mounting public and union pressure. "Self-interest, polarization, and confrontation threaten to undermine that values of justice and peace, which are so important to everyone. I will not allow Dr. King's message to be devalued," Dickinson said in a statement.

#### Calling card crooks

Law enforcement officials are investigating a new phone scam in which hackers electronically steal callingcard numbers from travelers. As he prepares to make a call, the victim hears a pay phone ring in an airport and answers, it only to find no one on the line. But when he dials his own call, the crooks tap in and swipe his card number.

# Postal Service issues Malcolm X stamp


Malcolm X, who was shadowed by the FBI because of his activism, was honored by the government Wednesday with a new commemorative stamp. Postal Service governor S. David Finemen unveiled the 33-cent stamp at the Apollo Theatre in the Harlem section of New York.

During the ceremony, Postal Service Governor S. David Fineman referred to Malcolm X as "a modern-day revolutionary who openly fought for the end of oppression and injustice. He was a visionary, a man who dreamed of a better world and dared to do something about it."

Family, friends and colleagues of Malcolm X (El-Hajj Malik El-Shabazz) came at New York's Apollo Theatre to celebrate the issuance of a U.S. postage stamp bearing his likeness. Guests at the presentation included Malcolm's daughters Attallah, Gamilah, Ilyasah, Malaak, Malikah, Oubilah and Shabazz.

Participating in the historic event were Malcolm X's eldest daughter, Attallah Shabazz; former Malcolm X Attorney Percy E. Sutton; actors Harry Belafonte, Ossie Davis and Ruby Dee; U.S. Representative Chaka Fattah; Randall Robinson, president of

TransAfrica Forum; with performances by the Boys Choir of Harlem and a special tribute by Mike Wallace, senior correspondent of "60



#### Minutes."

Malcolm Х, born Malcolm Little in Omaha Nebaraska, joined the nation of Islam in 1952 and emerged as a major spokesperson for African Americans. He was both a brilliant scholar and a fiery orator whose persuasive and passionate views are still felt today. He was often followed by government agents suspicious of his motives and provocative views toward whites

A 1964 falling out with Nation founder Elijah Muhummad led Malcolm to start a splinter group, the Organization of Afro-American unity, and to found a mosque in Harlem. He was assassinated February 21, 1965 at the Audubon Ballroom in New York. Three black Muslims were convicted of Malcolm's murder , which was witnessed by his family.

The Malcolm X (El-Hajj Malik El-Shabazz) commemorative stamp is the 22nd stamp in the Postal

Service's Black Heritage series which is a highly respected roster of African Americans whose individual achievements have made significant contributions to American history and culture.

Other honorees include: Harriet Tubman (1978); Martin Luther King, Jr. (1979); Mary McLeod Bethune (1985); Ernest E. Just (1996); and W.E.B. DuBois (1992).

In a new edition of "The Autobiography of Malcolm Χ″ (Random House/ Ballantine) due out this spring, Attallah Shabazz states, "the United States postal stamp with the image of El-Hajj Malik El-Shabazz known to the world as Malcolm X - and fondly loved by myself and my five sisters as Daddy, will provide a source of continual pride to his children."

One-hundred million Malcolm X commemorative stamps have been printed. They are now on sale nationwide at your local post office.

# President Clinton announces 2000 budget

WASHINGTON

(Reuters) - President Clinton put forward a \$1.77 trillion 2000 budget

Monday that raises spending on defense and education, predicts huge surpluses for the

future and ignores Republican calls for a broad tax cut.

The budget, which covers the year beginning on Oct. 1, sets the stage for a battle with the

Republicans over what to do with surpluses that are expected to total \$117.3 billion in 2000

and a massive \$2.41 trillion over the next decade.

The president's spending plan brushes aside Republican calls for an U.S. economy now enjoying across-the-board tax cut, preferring to offer targeted tax relief to help, among others, people caring for elderly and sick relatives and stay-at-home parents.

In a blend of scandal and substance that has come seem normal in to Washington, Clinton presented the budget at the White House Monday

morning as Monica Lewinsky sat down to give a closed-door deposition to lawyers on both sides of the Senate impeachment trial weighing his removal from office.

If the 2000 budget meets its targets, it will be the third year in a row that government has the achieved a surplus after 28 years of deficits. The government returned to the black in 1998 with a surplus of \$69.2 billion and it expects one of \$79.3 billion in 1999, surging to \$393.1 billion in 2009.

The long stream of anticipated surpluses is the result of deficit-cutting packages passed in 1990, 1993 and 1997, the robust its longest peacetime expansion in history and a surge in tax revenues.

If we manage the surplus right, we can uphold our responsibility to future generations ... by dedicating the lion's share of the surplus to saving Social Security and Medicare and paying down the national debt," Clinton

#### said.

We have a rare opportunity that comes around once in a blue moon," he added, pointing with glee at a chart showing the national debt shrinking to its lowest level as a share of the economy since World War One if his long-term plan is enacted.

In his State of the Union speech on Jan. 19, the president laid out a detailed program for how to use the \$4.47 trillion in surpluses the government expects over the next 15 years.

The bulk, 62 percent, would shore up Social Security, 15 percent would bolster the Medicare health care program, 12 percent would fund "universal savings accounts" and 11 percent would fund priorities like education, research and defense.

While the Republicans have embraced the idea of using most of the surpluses for Social Security, they are also arguing for sweeping 10 percent tax cuts.

The next great debate will center on one simple premise: should we give tax

relief to working people when we have the largest surplus in American history?," asked Republican House Speaker Dennis Hastert. "The president says no, while we say yes."

Clinton has put forward a much more targeted program, offering a \$1,000 tax credit for people caring for elderly or sick relatives, \$500 for stayat-home parents and incentives to spur corporate investment in poor rural and urban areas.

It would pay for these chiefly by cracking down on corporate tax loopholes.

The budget also counts on \$8 billion from boosting the tax on cigarettes by 55 cents per pack, on accelerating a 15-cent per pack rise that was due in 2002, and on obtaining \$18.9 billion over the 2001-2004 period from last year's \$206 billion

settlement between tobacco companies and the states.

The president's budget would spend an extra \$12.6 billion on defense in 2000

and \$112 billion through 2005, giving the military the biggest pay raise in a generation and paying for high-tech weapons and a ballistic missile defense program.

On education, the budget would also spend an extra \$4.98 billion in 2000 on a variety of training and education initiatives, including hiring more teachers and building more schools to hold down on class room size.

It also boosts spending on a host of initiatives, putting forward large sums for mass transit and smaller amounts for everything from conserving land in national parks and Civil battlefields to War Pacific protecting Northwest salmon.

# **ASK VIVI**

Dear ViVi,

I am serious student here at Morehouse but lately I haven't been able to concentrate on my studies. My girlfriend (who will remain nameless) recently told me that she has a yeast infection and I'm wondering if I there is anyway I can catch it. If so, what will it do to me?

#### Curious George.

#### George,

First of all, yeast is nothing to lose sleep over (as long as it was diagnosed by a doctor and she is sure her symptoms are not being caused by an STD). A yeast infection is simply the result of an overgrowth of a fungus normally found in the vagina. It is caused by several things such as the use of antibiotics or some feminine hygiene product and is very easily treated. However, it can be transmitted sexually (and this includes oral-vaginal intercourse) to the infected women's partner (e.g. YOU). To prevent this, an infected woman should stop having sex until she has completed treatment.

If by chance you do pick up the infection (if you had any type of unprotected sex while she was infected), you will not show any symptoms but you will carry it and can reinfect her or others and you should also be treated. # **As Justice Dies**

If we remain quiet long enough, we may hear the last, futile gasps of breath that Justice draws before passing into the distant, peaceful beyond. Centuries have seen Him sustain himself despite the polluted airs of hypocrisy and broken promises of our nation, relying on respirators of hope and faith and progress. But an doleful hour has befallen us. Some are determined once again to expose Justice to the toxic atmosphere of our duplicity. They are either confident that He can survive in spite of contamination by the worst kind of wrong, or they are content that His death can be masked and business can continue without Him.

As Mumia Abu-Jamal sits on death row in a Philadelphia penitentiary, most Americans sit oblivious to -he facts in his case. To them, he is just some political dissident who allowed his beliefs to get him in trouble. For those who are familiar with the proceedings in his case, it seems impossible that could this have happened. There is no way that a justice systemour justice system-could have let those atrocities occur: evidence lost and with; tampered intimidation of witnesses; perjured testimony by police in a court of law. Besides, no judge would tell a defendant that he is guilty, not because of the evidence, but because of a "gut" feeling.

Yet, these are just some of the toxins to which both Mumia and Justice have been exposed. Witnesses have come forth and admitted



that they were coerced. The Philadelphia police department has since been found guilty in other cases of planting evidence. Even the bullet itself is a case for redress: forensics reports show that Mumia's gun, had it been fired, was too small caliber to have а launched the fatal missile. Still, Mumia has been denied a retrial in light of all of this new evidence.

When forced to wonder why Mumia would be targeted like this, it is enough to look at his background. He was a founding member of the Black Panther Party in Philadelphia, but his major transgression was his pen. Mumia used position as a his prominent radio journalist to uncover police abuse in Philadelphia. Through writings and his broadcasts, he brought attention to a serious endeavor-only silenceproblem Philadelphia's police listen as justice dies. departments. One of his most notable complaints was against the 1985 bombing of the MOVE Organization in Philadelphia by the police which killed 11

members (5 children) and destroyed 60 homes.

Mumia has already exhausted all of his appeals in our legal system. He stands now with a final appeal to the Conscience of this nation. Α blatant disregard for due process and decency has brought Mumia and our country to this point. This case is not just about a man's life or even about corruption. It is about the integrity of our legal system. The message endorsed by this case is that you don't have to be guilty to be punished; it is enough to be different-it is enough to speak out for right. There are some who intend to make an example out of Mumia, regardless of how it might injure Justice. They have made it known that they do not need approval or assistance in this in only for us to sit and



# Blood is Thicker Than ...

James Mcbride's book discusses family, love and racial seperation.

Long before Tiger Woods wrestled with his multicultural heritiage, James McBride was busy unearthening the rich legacy of his ancestry.

McBride, the son of a Baptist minister, always knew his mother was different but could never pin point it. Years later, he would find the woman he called mother — Ruth McBride Jordan — was actually Ruchel Dwajra Zylska, the daughter of Jews who immigrated from Poland.

In The Color of Water: A Black Man's Tribute to His White Mother, McBride combines the techniques of a memoirist and oral historian to tell a funny, frank and fierce story about love and family. He unabashedly tells the story of a twicewidowed, self-defined "light-skinned" woman raising twelve children in the economically challenged Red Hook, Brooklyn community.

McBride reveals many intimate and personal details about his childhood and family that many wouldn't dare share with the public. From his battle with drugs during his youth, to his sister's out of wedlock pregnancy, his eloquent usage of language brings the reader into the story, allowing them to experience life as James did.

The Color of Water ... 's true strengh, though, is McBride's ability to give voice to Ruth and, most importantly, Ruchel. Although one, Ruth and Ruchel have two distincly different stories. And so it is of great signifacance that the book opens with Ruchel proclaiming that "I been dead to them for fifty years. . . My family mourned me when I married your father. They said kaddished and sat shiva."

So a loving mother finds herself recanting a painful and abusive past because central to McBride's self discovery is Ruth's ability to honor that other woman named Ruchel.

In the end, McBride's tribute to his mother becomes a shining example of a mother's unyielding love and devotion to a child. The Color of Water ... transcends race and touches a place deep down inside of all us the human spirit. I stuck around Suffolk awhile longer, and then I left for good sometime in 1941. I can't remember the exact time of all this because it was a bad time. It was bad. I left over Mameh's objections too. She said, "You can have a good life here," but I said, "I can't live here, Mameh," and she didn't bring it up ever again or ask me to stay longer. There was no life in Suffolk for me. I packed what few things I wanted and tried to talk to Dee-Dee before I left, but she wouldn't talk to me. "You promised you wouldn't go," she said, and she walked away from me. As I left the store to walk downtown to the bus station, Mameh handed me a bag lunch and kissed me and I was out the door and gone. I never saw her or Dee-Dee ever again. Tateh didn't say a word to me as I walked out.

The Greyhound bus station was across from the Suffolk Hotel in those days. I was standing ther waiting there for the bus to cme, when Tateh pulled up in his car. He kept a big V-8 Ford. He got out and took his hands out of his pockets and started pacing. He said, "You should stay."

I said, "I can't." I was nervous. He always made me nervous. "I'll get you a route," he said. "You can have your own route, selling apples to farmers in the country. You'll make a bundle. Or you can geta job in Norfolk. You can move there." I said no.

"You want to go to college? I'll send you to college in Norfolk. Or business school, whatever you want, but you have to stay."

"I can't do that."

"I'm telling you to stay," he said. Hear me? I need you to run the store. And your mother needs you."

I began to yell at him and we argued. Here he was having divorced Mameh and he was still using her against me. The he said, "I know you're gonna marry a shvarste. You're making a mistake." That stopped me cold, because I didn't know how he learned it. To this day I don't know. He said, "If you marry a nigger, don't ever come home agian. Don't come back."


# The Original Big Bad Voodoo Daddy

There was a time when our musical heroes were frightening reclusive geniuses who cared not for normality or mainstream so much as the incessant pull of the muse. Regardless of where their spirit took them, they went and demanded that the populous follow, or live the rest of their lives in a drab past, blind to the way of tomorrow.

Miles Davis was one of those geniuses, falling into a Howard Hughes-like state in

the mid-70'3, but not until unleashing upon the world what would be a cornerstone in music history. Miles had been talking of change, big change.

Wu-Tang Clan rapper posts bail

NEW YORK (AP) — Rapper ODB posted \$150,000 cash bail Friday after spending a week in jail for allegedly firing a gun during an encounter with undercover police.

The 29-year-old Wu-Tang Clan rapper, whose real name is Russell Jones, is charged with attempted murder in the first degree, attempted murder in the second degree and criminal weapons possession. The principal charge carries a maximum penalty of 25 years to life.

Police say Jones fired at undercover officers after they stopped his sport utility vehicle for a routine traffic violation Jan. 15. The officers fired four or five shots back, but no one was hurt.


Police have yet to comment on whether they found the gun allegedly used to fire at the officers. Jones' attorney, Peter Frankel, did



Oh Baby Jesus: ODB in trouble again.


not return a telephone call regarding the results of a paraffin test — used to detect gunpowder residue on a suspect's hands. Jones took the test last weekend.






