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

Election Day Amendments Unconstitutional?

n Monday, students went to the polls voting to elect their peers to positions within the Association. Also on the ballot were 15 proposed amendments to the Morehouse College Constitution that would affect the powers of that document and, in some cases, shape the political landscape of the college.

But according to a letter issued to the Elections Committee

by Senate President pro-tempore and SGA Vice Presidential-Elect, Melvin Colbert, several of the amendments that appeared on the ballot were not voted up by the Senate (a prerequisite to appearing on the election Student Government day ballot.) As they appeared, proposed amendments 1, 2, 3, 4, 15 were not included in an official list of amendments that were passed by the 79th session of the Senate by a majority vote of quorum senators two weeks ago

Franklin's Speech Cheered; Warns Against Fighting, Intolerance

C tudents, faculty and staff are **O**praising President Franklin's attempt to detail how the college community should respond to ongoing threats to the "Morehouse Mystique." Hundreds packed the Martin Luther King, Jr. International Chapel on Tuesday to hear Franklin, whose speech followed a Spring semester marked by multiple studenton-student fights and tension between some straight and gay students, among other issues.

"Today, our soul is sick and our mystique is threatened," Franklin said early in his special Town Hall Meeting. "Our soul is threatened by the presence of a few of our brothers who are spiritually ill and disoriented. Some are enrolled at Morehouse, and some work for Morehouse. Whatever their role, they have not joined the Brotherhood, and they are opposed to forming an academic and moral community."

Audience members applauded throughout the speech, but particularly when Franklin spoke directly to those individuals. "If you cannot follow the guidelines of a moral community, then leave. Change your behavior or separate from this college."

In the rest of his simultaneously blunt and carefully worded address,

women's clothing such as dresses and purses to "cease and desist" while on campus.

First, though, Franklin emphasized the importance of diversity and said that intolerance or mistreatment of gay students would not be tolerated.

"As an all male institution with the explicit mission of educating men with disciplined minds, perhaps the great challenge of this moment in history is our diversity of sexual orientation. This has been-and will always be—a community committed to respect and tolerance between heterosexual and homosexual men. Morehouse, like every other educational institution, has always had gay men in its student, staff and faculty ranks."

He added, "Morehouse is not a gay school, it is a great school."

Franklin announced that he has created a Diversity and Tolerance Committee to "review the effectiveness of what we have done and are currently doing." The President said that he expects the committee to report back in the Fall, but that whatever their recommendation, the underlying principles would be "safety and security" for gay and straight students, appreciation for diversity, and proper "decorum."

On the latter principle, Franklin said that sagging pants, wearing caps inside buildings, and wearing doo-rags in public would not be tolerated.

"[The conversation] was provoked by a campus crisis," Franklin said. "A few young men behaved out of character with the Morehouse mission. And a few young women behaved out of character with Spelman's mission. Sadly, very few Morehouse students took part violence free zone. New VP of Student Services Named

ate last week, school _administration announced that Dr. William Bynum has agreed to serve as the new Vice president of Student Affairs at Morehouse College. Bynum is no stranger to the AUC, having previously held the same position at Clark Atlanta University.

A native of North Carolina, he earned his bachelor of arts degree in sociology at Davidson College and his masters and Ph.D. in sociology from Duke University where he was an Endowment Fellow. Most recently, he worked as VP of Student Affairs at the historically Black Lincoln University in Pennsylvania where it was announced on April 6th that he would be resigning his position to begin work at Morehouse effective July 1st in the Office of Student Services.

Of his transition from Lincoln, Bynum stated in an interview with the Lincolnian,

"What I'll miss the most about Lincoln University is the mentorship by Dr. [lvory] Nelson. miss the pride and talent of the student body," later adding "Of all the five schools I've been to, Lincoln has the most artistically talented students I've ever seen"

The Office of Student Services is comprised of Athletics, Counseling, Housing, Student, Health, and Career Planning for Non-business Majors, among others. Over the course of the past year, Herman "Skip" Mason has served as the Interim VP of Student Services.

The announcement came as a surprise to many members of the Morehouse community who were not aware of the decision at the time that President Robert Franklin's office released a statement on Friday. In it, he welcomed Dr. Bynum saying,

"Morehouse is pleased that Dr. Bynum is joining us in the Office of Student Services. He is well versed in the culture of small liberal arts institutions like Morehouse, and he understands

the students who make up our population." With the recent issues surrounding altercations on campus and overall student conduct, the selection of Dr. Bynum is significant. The position of VP of Student Services will also be instrumental in settling I'll miss the awesome staff. I'll the issues surrounding the appropriation of student monies to organizations on campus in the next year.

Franklin offered "guidance and direction" on a variety of issues both big and small, including fighting, intolerance, relations between students and staff, academic performance, and littering.

Perhaps most notably, Franklin also broached the subject of relations between straight and gay students. The President encouraged straight students to be tolerant and to learn from their gay counterparts. He also spoke to gay students, promising them a safe and tolerant environment while also asking those who would wear

applauded when Franklin also waded into the increasingly controversial practice of male students wearing feminine clothing. "And to those who would experiment with wearing clothing associated with a woman's wardrobe-dresses, tunics, purses and pumps-I am directing that you not exhibit these items on the Morehouse campus.

"Wear what you wish to offcampus. But while you are here on the ground where Mays and Martin and Maynard walked, those items are off limits. A man in women's clothing on campus participated.

cannot be a Man of Morehousethe college of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.—and engage in fighting or threatening behavior."


Regarding gender relations, Franklin stressed the importance of women to the Morehouse community and called on students to treat their female counterparts at Spelman and Clark Atlanta University with respect. He also mentioned his efforts to start a "conversation" with Spelman President Beverly Tatum about the male-female relations, but lamented that Morehouse few students


between the two student bodies. Again, remember, you were not obligated to enroll in these institutions. So if you choose to be a member of this community, you implicitly consent to being an active member of the community."

Franklin also touched on three elements of his now well-known Renaissance Man, encouraging students to read whenever they have time, to improve their writing skills, and to make use of tutors, if needed.

"Some tutors complain that they sit at the assigned time and

that are in question is substantial with Proposed Amendment 1 effectively deciding whether or not a created position of SGA Executive Secretary should serve as a liaison between CASA and SGA. When guestioned about amendment, SGA Vice the President and President of the 79th Senate Session, Jared Green said,

"Proposed Amendment 1 involved the creation of the SGA Executive Secretary Position, who would serve as a liaison between the SGA, CASA, and the Council of Presidents. The creation of this new and necessary position was brought before the Senate and passed." He also noted in a letter to The Maroon Tiger that the creation of the position was one of the 79th Senate's, "major accomplishments of the spring semester."

Although "proposed amendments" 2 and 3 appeared

on the ballots and were voted on by the student body as such, according to Green, they were merely "survey questions." The focus of the two amendments is whether or not candidates for President and Vice President should be required to run together on a joint ticket either for the Executive Board of SGA or class councils. Green acknowledged that,

"When brought before the Senate, the actual amendment was voted down, but not by unanimous vote. At this time, Senators who were actually opposed to the amendment suggested that we put the question on the ballot to let the student body decide.

According to Green, if students voted yes to the two questions, next year's 80th session of the Senate would be obliged to create the amendments but because due to the unclear nature of the items, they will be voted on again in the run-off elections. However, in an email to Elections Committee Chairman Reginald Cleaver dated April 8th, Green described the items as, "15 proposed Constitutional Amendments that must be voted on individually" not as survey items.

Amendment 15 is the most controversial issue of all. It appears as the 17th proposed amendment in Colbert's letter to the Elections Committee but in both the ballot and proposal form it states that,

"A candidate for SGA Vice President must have at least one year of experience in Student Senate as either a Senator and/or Senate Staff." Of the amendment, outgoing VP, Jared Green has stated that,

"It was included in the amendments passed by the Senate, and received no objection from Senators," A claim that conflicts with the those of VP-Elect Melvin Colbert who stated that the amendment

was, "not passed by the Senate, though it is on the ballot, it is an unconstitutional amendment and therefore will not be enacted the following year."


In all, of the proposed 17 amendments made by the 79th session of the Senate, 5 did not appear on the actual ballot voted on by students. Of the 15 amendments that did appear on the ballot, 4 either were not voted on by the Senate or were voted down prior to their appearing on the ballot.

In regard to a resolution, Chairman of the Senate Ethics Committee. Scott Damen offered,

"The results that were posted today should be nullified. It looks very unethical and shady that things were put on the ballot that were actually voted down by the Senate. I think that the results should be scratched and restated tomorrow [for the run-off elections] in their correct form."

Students Elect New SGA Leaders; Colbert Wins VP

Adam McFarland and Kawasi Weston must compete in a Wednesday run-off election for SGA president, the SGA Elections Committee announced today. McFarland won 44% of the initial vote and Weston won 25%, leaving both students short of immediate victory. Meanwhile, junior Melvin Colbert won the vice presidential election outright, garnering just over 50% of the vote.



place and no one

shows up," Franklin said. "Meanwhile, we have several students on academic

probation. We must dismantle the myth that seeking tutorial help is a cause for shame orembarrassment."Headdedthat the school may require students who are failing a course to "work with tutors and professors to redeem the time, the money and the opportunity for learning."

Franklin also praised students for being polite and helpful to visitors, but said that he still hears too much profanity on campus. "Strive to have something valuable to say,

and be in possession of elegant words and phrases that allow you to effectively communicate complex emotions and ideas. Profanity does not reflect your verbal grace and style. It suggests a lazy mind and is contrary to the Morehouse ideal. So if you need to, go to the Woodruff Library and borrow a vocabulary."

On the matter of customer service, Franklin sought to express his understanding of both students who have complained about the treatment of school officials and officials who have criticized the behavior of students as disrespectful.

"I have heard your call for improved customer service. It is outrageous to learn that occasionally a faculty or staff member has behaved in ways that fall below Morehouse standards. We will not tolerate this. But at the same time, we expect every one of you to show respect to all faculty and staff."

In the end, it was clear that campus violence was one of the most important—if not the most important-issue on the President's agenda. He returned to the topic in his conclusion.

"A final memo to those who would commit crimes and violate school policy. To those who would harm women or gay or straight members of this community. To those who would take advantage of innocent and trusting students, I say clearly:

You will not find safe haven at Morehouse. You will be detected, and you will be dismissed. If you willingly harm my students, you are declaring war on Morehouse College, and you will not win that war."

As of now, it is unclear what effect the well-received speech will have on the wider student body. President Franklin's office has posted the speech on the Morehouse website and the President is encouraging students who heard the speech to spread his message.



But there are websites out there that provide more than a socially connected community. Take for instance, Unspoken Secrets.com. This website allows those to speak about fetishes, fantasies and confessions.





"Most of the people that post secrets are teenage girls who have lost their 'true love," Keith Cardin stated, founder and creator of the site.

But on a more serious note, Cardin explained that he has also received secrets from those who suffer from verbal or physical abuse.

This, in turn, has drawn Cardin to a greater aspirations for Unspoken Secrets.

ind yourself taking your time to get to that 9:00 a.m. class because you know your professor won't make it there until 9:10 a.m.?

Wonder why you haven't received a grade for that assignment you turned in two months ago? While its obvious that, in terms of rank, professors and students do not fall under the same regulations, issues like arriving on time to class have caused students to wonder if their professors should share some of their classroom responsibilities.

"Both the professor and students need to put a 110% effort into the course,"Morehouse freshman Derric Studamire said.

"Just as students should come to class prepared to learn, professors also need to come prepared to teach for the day. The bottom line, however, is that clear communication, between professors and their students, is key to a successful semester and, furthermore, college career!

"You learn by doing," said that little girl who became the Associate Vice President of Academic Affairs Dr. Anne Watts. "Speak as much as you can whether it is a bible study or a group of kids on a Saturday morning to gain the facilities for public speaking."

Watts, whose father was a Baptist minister, was taught the simple principle that one must learn by doing by her mother, who often thrust her into speaking before large audiences.

President Robert Franklin is determined that all Men of Morehouse be well-spoken. Watts stated that even in class discussions students must delve in and do it to build upon the oratory skills.

Although she is an administrator who is well-known for her dynamic public speaking skills, she once dreamed of an entirely different profession.

"I took French in high school and I fell in love with the language," said Watts. "I had dreams of being an international interpreter."

Watts' love for French led her to Atlanta University, where she took courses in French literature and taught part-time. After completing her studies, she was offered a job at Morris Brown.

"The day before I replied to the job offer at Morris Brown a letter came from Morehouse College offering me a position in the English Department," said Watts. "I had very little time to consider but I accepted the position at Morehouse."

Watts' recalled that she first became familiar with Morehouse while at home in Grambling, La when the school appeared in the layout of an Ebony Magazine. The impression that Morehouse was indeed a wonderful place grew on her from that article.

"I was quite reluctant to become an administrator because they were sort of out of touch with the students," Watts said.

she accepted the class dean position, a position that is now known as the freshman class dean. Watts saw her position as class dean as a way to advocate for students. She recalled incidents where white teachers were not aware of the relationships in the Black family and roles that students played in their families.

"I remember one student in particular who was affected by his grandmother's illness and a white teacher did not understand why his studies were being affected," Watts said. "As class Dean, I was able to inform her that the student's grandmother might have reared the student and that her illness may have affected his concentration on his studies."

Class deans, whose offices were first located in Frederick Douglass Hall, assisted students with the development of their four year plans and academic advisement. Watts stated that the efforts of the class Deans In the more than 35 years she gradually increased the number

"Just last week it happened," said Watts. "A young man came in and told me that he had to leave because he has no funding."

Watts explained that some of her most difficult days are those where she has to say goodbye to promising young men.

"This tears me up and strikes at the core," said Watts.

Watts is also well-known for coaching 10 young men every year to become forceful and vibrant presenters for the college's well-attended Candle in the Dark Gala. She described her coaching style as tough and demanding.

"I started a finishing school to work with young ladies who had not mastered the social graces, Watts said. The finishing school is still going on under the new leadership of her sorority sisters.

Watts has also held workshops on communications with various workforces and agencies. Some workshops have been held for religious organizations on forgiveness. Besides the professional scene, there is also time for fun.

"I enjoy going to movies and bowling," Watts said. "Although it has been about a year, since I have bowled." Theatre is also a major part of her hobbies. Watts is also the creator of the play "Modern Joe", which has been staged in the Martin Luther King, Jr. International Chapel and other venues.

Throughout her career, she has been tapped several times to consider becoming a college president.

"I was among the three finalists to become president of Grambling State University," said Watts.

She recalled when the search committee came to Morehouse and spent an entire day interviewing her colleagues, students and staff members. She was also asked by national search committees to apply for the presidency of Dillard University, Bethune-Cookman and Lincoln University. In a soft humble tone, she explained that it was never her ambition to become a college president. For now, Watts is still focusing on developing the hundreds of promising young men who come to Morehouse to reach their destiny.

"Seize the day," says Watts. "Take advantage of every opportunity. Continue to strive. Continue to climb. You must never give up!"

Crisis on the Campus

One of the bloodiest fights I've ever witnessed in my life took place on campus during my freshman year at Morehouse. Strangely, the fight was between young men who literally didn't know one another. During my early days on campus, the genre known as hip-hop was just being born.

Bloodily, they retreated to Hubert and Robert Halls, respectively, got amped up by either members of the DC Metro Club (who originally sponsored FreakNik back in the day) or by members of the New York whatever-they-calledthemselves; back into the fray again. These brothers went back and forth for damn near three hours until they simply became tired. Or their "corners" realized the silliness of it all. I believe it to be the former more so than the latter. The scene is etched into the catacombs of my mind's eye.

Now, here I am a generationplus removed from my freshman year picking up a copy of the Maroon Tiger to read about the recent on-goings with altercations on campus. I can't say honestly that I'm surprised, but T can say that I'm disappointed. Many of the younger alumni get together and talk about you brothers on campus. One can almost imagine the topics that engross the conversations. We understand that violence, drugs, and even suicide are all a part of

what's happening on our campus nowadays. Given the personal anecdote above, fisticuffs are likely to occur whenever you have a mass group of young Black men together-Million Man March notwithstandingespecially when there are young women around. Illicit drugs, like on any college/university campus, always will be there. Suicide, though, is a recent phenomenon to Black males and was non-existent during our days on campus. Maybe we were too busy exploring this new way of style, walk and rap. And, it seems, it was during this same period of exploring hip-hop and other musical tastes on Hump Day Wednesday a few weeks ago that young Morehouse brethren turned on each other and started a melee. This is not a question asking, "What has happened to young Black males," but, "What has happened to the things that young brothers put into their heads?

As a professor, researcher and filmmaker. I've traveled to different cities talking to young brothers "on the block" about

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violence, drugs and their dreams. One of the most poignant questions that I ask the dopeboys is, "What'd you dream of becoming as a child?" Too, let's hope students/readers like yourself won't have reason to write an op-ed similar to this one twenty years down the line.

McDonald's Uses Branding to Hide Cruelty

C ome readers may have heard) that peta2, the world's largest youth animal rights organization, recently lifted its moratorium on its campaign against McDonald's, a company that has a long and checkered history in regards to its relationship with HBCU's. Whether it is sponsoring a battle of the bands or a football halftime show, the company uses its branding power to sell a product that it knows consumers would be hesitant to buy if they looked behind the scenes. As responsible, Black consumer, it is frustrating for me to see our community exploited by a company that doesn't even have the decency to reduce the suffering of animals killed for its McNuggets.

The tragic reality is that in the slaughterhouses of McDonald's U.S. chicken suppliers, birds are dumped out of their transport crates and are hung upside-down in metal shackles, which can result in broken bones, extreme bruising, and hemorrhaging. Workers have ample opportunity to abuse live birds, and birds have their throats cut while they are still conscious. Many birds are even immersed in tanks of


scalding-hot water while they are still alive and able to feel pain. All this is documented on peta2.com

Why would McDonald's allow this? And how can its suppliers get away with it?

The fact is that there is only one federal law that regulates how animals are treated when killed for food—and do you know what worst? Chickens are excluded from that law, even though they make up more than 95 percent of all animals killed for food. As a result, abuse cases that would warrant felony crueltyto-animals charges if they were inflicted on cats or dogs are legal when it comes to chickens and other birds.

How does the Black community fit into all this? McDonald's is not Black-owned, but it sure knows how to market to Blacks. The restaurant takes our money but returns little to the campus community (except for the notorious "freshman 15").

McDonald's could take common-sense steps to reduce the suffering of animals killed for its restaurants and to lessen the number of injuries to slaughterhouse workers. For example, there is a less cruel method of chicken slaughter that's available to McDonald's suppliers called "controlled-

atmosphere killing" (CAK), and it would cost the corporation nothing to demand that its suppliers use it. CAK would eliminate the worst abuses that chickens killed for McDonald's in the U.S. currently suffer. In fact, a 2005 study about CAK that McDonald's produced concluded that it is far better for an imals than the current slaughter method.

Thiskindofsensibleapproach is precisely what consumers expect from a company that has so much influence. As detailed on peta2, McDonald's agreed nearly a decade ago to make incremental improvements to reduce the suffering of animals Image: Courtesy

raised for its eggs and to initiate audits of slaughterhouses. Unfortunately, these changes do nothing to stop the abuse of billions of chickens who are raised and killed for their flesh. Their suffering goes unnoticed.

McDonald's is a big company, butitreliesheavilyonthefinancial support of communities like ours. Let's send a strong message that unless McDonald's listens to animal protection organizations such as peta2 and makes some of the changes that are listed on McCruelty.com to reduce the suffering of the animals killed for its restaurants, we will take our money elsewhere.

By implementing these "studentprofessor/course evaluations" we, the students, are empowered. After all, according to President Franklin, 85% of the school's operational budget is derived from student tuition & fees. That is to say that we are active stakeholders or, vernacularly, we essentially own

professor who abnormally deviates from the syllabus, or the professor who says "there's no way you can earn an 'A," or the irrationally difficult professor in who's class the majority of those enrolled either fails or withdraws and the remaining minority barely passes. These evaluations will bring justice to the classroom because the saying is true, teachers/professors actually do hold your life in their hands. This week, for the first time, the campus community heard President Franklin address the controversial topic of students wearing women's clothing. Franklin's remarks, as expected, were direct, fair and placed within an appropriate context. Our President offered an example of how to address these topics within the unique environment that is Morehouse.

With specificity, Franklin

Now, when the question is asked, "why is it that other institutions have better facilities and better options (Chick-Fil-A, Chipotle, Subway, etc), the management team immediately thinks of the immaturity and lack of respect portrayed that in turn puts limitations on what all can be provided for us. 



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The springtime video release of "Seven Pounds" opens with Ben Thomas (Will Smith) yelling at a blind beef salesman (Woody Harrelson) and ends with kids singing show tunes in the park. 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





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he 2009-2010 NBA regular season officially went on the books last weekend as the postseason officially began.

There were upsets, buzzerbeaters, and performances that indicate that June's NBA Finals will be a hard-fought battle between whatever two warriorlike teams are left standing. Below are some notable matchups and predictions.

Front-running candidate for this year's Rookie of the Year Award Derrick Rose scored 36 points and had 11 assists as his Chicago Bulls sucker-punched the reigning World Champion Boston Celtics in a 105-103 Game 1 victory in Boston.
