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
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To the students, faculty members, and alumni of Morehouse College,





THE TIES THAT BIND

any students in the AUC assume that Morehouse College and Spelman College are brother and sister. In true familial fashion, the schools do, quite literally, everything together. It is often difficult to ascertain where one school starts and the other ends because these two illustrious institutions come together for so many things, from class to Homecoming. And it is the latter event that brings to light the true notion of the imagined relationship between Spelman and Morehouse.

Every year, Morehouse's true sister school, Bennett College for Women, sends their Homecoming court to represent the often forgotten and occasionally resented brotherhood and sisterhood between the schools. Bennett College is located in Greensboro, NC, about six hours away from Morehouse and the rest of the AUC, whereas Spelman is right next door. Based on propinquity alone, the relationship seems, in a word, nonsensical.

Add that to Morehouse's and Spleman's traditional fraternal relationship characterized by the brother-sister exchange, joint events and the virtual sharing of grounds since 1883, and the relationship between Bennett and Morehouse seems even more ludicrous.

Bennett also has a socially assumed brother school in the form of North Carolina A&T. A&T, a co-ed institution, is an expansive college on a sprawling campus that occupies the property just across the street from Bennett. Just as Spelman looks to Morehouse for coeducational and familial purposes, Bennett looks to NC A&T. This additional bond further complicates Morehouse and Bennett's ambiguously defined relationship.

The relationship, however, is entirely legitimate. The Morehouse and Bennett family ties were born out of a close friendship between Morehouse's former President, Dr. Benjamin E. Mays, and Bennett's former President, Dr. David Dallas Jones.

At its founding in 1873, Bennett was a coeducational normal school established to educate the formerly enslaved. Jones, who became president of Bennett in 1926, oversaw Bennett's transition

from coeducational to all women in the same year that he took office. Jones tapped his close relationship with Mays and from that year forth, Bennett College for Women became Morehouse College's official sister school.

Both Morehouse and Bennett are well aware of their historical connection and make strides to retain close family ties. As stated previously, Bennett sends representatives to what has become known as the SpelHouse Homecoming. Bennett's courts can be seen strutting around the track with Miss Maroon and White and her court each year. Morehouse has also recently established an annual trip to Bennett College to foster the close relationship that Drs. Jones and Mays hoped for.

The relationship between Morehouse and her true sister school is often a source of indignation or, at the very least, confusion for Spelman students. The truth of the matter is that despite Bennett's official status as Morehouse's sister school, Spelman occupies a special place in the hearts of Morehouse students as well.

This does not denote that one school is of a higher caliber than the other or that Morehouse should renounce its relationship to Bennett and formally declare Spelman as its sister school because, in a way, Spelman already is. Instead of only having one sister, Morehouse has two.

This relationship should not be seen as a source of indignation or confusion, however. It should be looked at as an opportunity. Morehouse should not be forced to choose and Spelman and Bennett should not feel the need to harbor resentment. These three institutions have the chance to not only act as family within the greater HBCU community but to form an even closer, tight-knit bond among themselves.

Instead of seeing Bennett as competition, Spelman should be proud to have such an illustrious institution as Bennett College as a sister and Morehouse should be glowing with pride because of its official and adopted family ties.



THE MOREHOUSE-HOWARD RIVALRY

he rivalry between Howard and Morehouse has been dormant since 1997. Unless you have friends at the school, you could almost forget Howard was there. Yet the rivalry between the two institutions dates back to 1923 and the football game that embodies it all has a chance to be renewed.

"Back in the day," as older generations would say it, the game between the schools was always like a homecoming. During the 1992 game, then Howard coach Steve Wilson renewed acquaintances with then Morehouse coach Craig Cason, a teammate when the two played at Morehouse.

The 1995 game, which occurred during Howard's homecoming celebration, had to be moved to RFK Stadium to accommodate the crowd of over 12,000. Edward Hill Jr., sports information director at Howard, described how alumni from all over would come to D.C. for the game.

"People always came out of the woodwork for that game," Hill said. Yet with a 13-year drought since the last annual game, there is finally a hope that next year will be the beginning of a new mutual homecoming between the institutions. Washington officials hope to use the rivalry as a chance to have a weekend worth of events for alumni from around the country.

History says that Morehouse has an excellent chance of leaving D.C. with bragging rights after the football game, because the Maroon Tigers hold an 18-13-5 advantage over the Bisons.

Morehouse lost the series' first game in 1923. The teams didn't play from 1930-1954, then renewed for 16 straight years, during which

Morehouse went 7-8-1. After a 15-year break, Morehouse won six straight games from 1985-1990, and then went 4-2 from 1992-1997. Now it may be time to add to the tally.

Morehouse athletic director Andre Pattillo described the game as "something that Morehouse as well as Howard and the alumni from both institutions have been anxiously awaiting."

Students also view the possibility as one that will benefit the greater community of both institutions. Kai Lawson, a senior radio, television and film major at Howard who is also the homecoming committee's public relations director, shared her perspectives on what the game could offer.

Lawson noted that the renewed rivalry would fit into Howard's desire to return to traditions.

"It would give both schools something to look forward to and with all the debate between Howard and Morehouse, at least in that given year somebody would have to shut up," she said.

Yet at both schools the sentiment for the other is very friendly and if nothing else this game would offer a chance to embrace a seemingly lost sibling rivalry.

"Howard has its traditional title of being the center and Morehouse produces all these great men," Lawson said. "So imagine having all of your favorite friends and finding a good excuse to have fun and celebrate HBCU life? If we could re-instill a rivalry and support our respective teams, it would be good for the morale of the student body and for the athletic departments at both schools."

ince 2008, the Campus Alliance for Student Activities, or CASA, has been responsible for planning and coordinating the Spelhouse Homecoming. The last time the Student Government Association (SGA) led Homecoming was in 2007 when the featured hip-hop artist was Lil Wayne. Many students and guests were thrilled by the performance he gave, and some believe he was the best musical guest that's been here in the past three years.

However, there were some who were less than enamored with the lyrics that he used and felt that he did not meet the standards of Morehouse.

In the three years since SGA last produced a Homecoming, many students feel that the Homecoming activities and events have underwhelmed. So what do some students think when comparing the 2007 Homecoming to the past two?

"I preferred Lil Wayne and the Homecoming directed by SGA," one student said. "It seemed more orderly and put together. The last couple of Homecomings seemed thrown together at the last second."

Another student added that "freshman year was a lot better in my opinion because there were a lot more different activities. Losing the comedy show took a lot from Homecoming."

While the SGA-led Homecoming appeared to be more popular, SGA Vice President Tyler Bell believes that CASA has not been given a truly fair assessment.

"I think that the students have been disappointed the last two years because there has not been a big headliner," Bell said. "When you're a new organization, it takes time to build and get the Wayne's, the Kanye's and a Jay-Z."

Ashraf Felix, former editor-in-chief of the Torch yearbook, thinks it is possible that students do not favor CASA because they are still a relatively unknown faction on campus.

"What we saw was the introduction of CASA to the Morehouse community; it was sprung upon us, and many felt like it was an elitist group of people," Felix said. "We don't know why many of those people were chosen. I honestly believe that CASA does a wonderful job with Homecoming; entertainment is relative and what I may

like, another person may not. Often times, people just don't like what they don't like. I don't believe they don't enjoy Homecoming because of the individuals who planned it."

There was an opinion held that the SGA needed to focus more on student advocacy, and a new organization was created to provide campus programming.

"CASA is focused on programming, and programming only," said the Associate Dean of Student Life, Kevin Booker. "The SGA is dealing with advocacy. Having those clear and definable roles helps determine how you want to approach the different programs that are offered by the college."

Contrary to some student's beliefs, Homecoming planning has become a year-round activity. Administrators assert that the Homecoming committee works diligently to provide the students a suitable Homecoming with a tight budget. Bell explained that the budget is for the entire academic year and that portions of the budget must be spared in order to provide events throughout the year.

"They (homecoming organizers) have a limited budget; there is only so much they can do with the budget that they have," Bell said. "With the resources that they have available, they are doing the best job possible."

There have been many concerns over artist selections who do not meet Morehouse standards, but Bell and Booker maintain that there must be a way to balance meeting appropriate standards and letting students enjoy themselves.

"There has to be some type of scale where we understand the administration's concerns, but the Homecoming is not for administration, it is for the students and alumni," Bell said.

"From an administrator's perspective, it is important that we guard and protect the brand of Morehouse College," Booker said. "From a student's perspective, Homecoming is a time to let your hair down, relax and enjoy yourself in a safe manner.

"Any artist who comes to our campus needs to be respectful of our campus. We also need to understand that there is a realm of entertainment that may not coincide directly with our institutional values, but our students still want to see it. We still need to figure out how we are going to handle that."



P.U.L.S.E. Sets the Beat for Homecoming

.U.L.S.E. stands for Planning Unique Activities for a Lively Spelman Experience, and the student-run organization has exemplified the acronym exceptionally since 2001. P.U.L.S.E. hosts some of the most popular events in the AUC including: Spelman NSO (New Student Orientation), Winter Wonderland, International Spring Fest, Romantic Interlude, Movie Sneak Previews, Welcome Back Jam, and Exam Jam. However, the most anticipated event is Homecoming.

For Homecoming 2010, 14 Spelman "pulsers" have planned and organized several free events for Homecoming – the opening worship service, the neo-soul concert, the educational social and the kick off jam.

Homecoming 2010 events were designed under a theme both Morehouse College's CASA and P.U.L.S.E. created – Galactic Ascension, which P.U.L.S.E. Homecoming director, Christiana Umukoro is worried may be too vague for students to understand.

"We wanted to have a space theme, but not something cheesy with aliens...a Kid Cudi kinda feel," Umukoro, a junior child development major explained. "[Galactic Ascension] means Spelman and Morehouse are so elite and great that they're ascending above these other institutions."

However, the P.U.L.S.E. committee is not interested in focusing solely on confusion or dismissive attitudes toward this year's theme. According to Umukoro, it's extremely difficult to please everyone in the student body but she is confident that the committee has accomplished the aspired goal of tending to the needs of most of the student body.

The second Homecoming director, Courtney Sholar, a junior psychology major, said, "I was excited to hear that people are excited to see Chrisette Michele. I wanna see a lot of positive energy and people having fun."

The neo-soul concert, starring Chrisette Michele, parallels the hip-hop concert at Morehouse. However, both P.U.L.S.E. Homecoming directors and the director of the neo-soul concert, Porscha Phillips,

agree that the neo-soul concert attracts more alum to Homecoming and encompasses the needs of students uninterested or unfamiliar with hip-hop.

As for other Homecoming events, P.U.L.S.E. is riskily bold in their attempt to experiment with a new type of educational social this year. The event is expected to be different from multi-cultural cafes they've planned in the past.

This year's educational social will be an open forum on Thursday, Oct. 21, called the "Hip-Hop Dating Class." It will be held in Spelman's Manley atrium at 5 p.m. The guest speaker, Jeff Carroll, is a relationship professional who goes by the alias "Yo Jeff." The event's objective is to provoke students to prioritize when considering school and relationships.

The opening worship service will be Sunday, Oct. 17, in Spelman's Sister's Chapel at 10 a.m., followed by the kick-off jam on the Spelman Oval at 8 p.m. The P.U.L.S.E. Homecoming extravaganza will end that weekend with Market Friday.

BEHIND THE SCENES: THE MAKING OF HOMECOMING

orehouse's Campus Alliance for Student Activities (CASA) has been directing Homecoming since the 2008-2009 academic year. This year's co-chairs, junior Justin Perry and senior Luke Yancy, have done their best to make this year's Homecoming experience the best one to date. The Maroon Tiger felt the need to sit down with the two co-chairs and get an in-depth look into what it takes to plan Homecoming.

MT: In your opinion, what is the hardest part about planning Homecoming?

Justin: Well I think one is deciding on a theme that the entire community of Morehouse and Spelman would appreciate. Also, working with the budget that we get annually for Homecoming; it has been getting cut every year. We try to do the best we can with the money that we are given to give the AUC a Homecoming experience that they expect.

MT: How many hours per week do you think are dedicated to Homecoming preparation?

Justin That's kind of hard. We started in January; so back then it was probably like two hours a week. But as you get closer, and we start working on specific events and start trying to meet deadlines it can become very time consuming.

MT: What are the steps in picking the artist for Homecoming?

Justin. First, the board comes together and we all come up with artists that we think the AUC would like to see. Then we take a look at the budget and contact a promoter along with Mr. Booker (Morehouse Associate Dean of Student Life) to see what kind of money we are working with and what type of artist we can feasibly attain. From there, it begins with who's available and who will be in Atlanta within those two months. I know a lot students think "oh we could go out and get Kanye, but CASA didn't try to get Kanye." No, CASA was working with the constraints that we had, and we try to do what we can to please as many people as possible.

MT: Is it difficult balancing being co-chairs?

Justin: I like the fact of having two people heading CASA. This is my junior year. I'm taking 17 hours, and I'm a chemistry major. If I was directing Homecoming by myself, and I was still trying to major in chemistry and graduate in four years. I wouldn't see it happening. So I think by having two people that can balance each other out allows it to work out very well.

and senior as the co-chairs. I don't think we've ever had an argument, but we do clash on our ideas a lot. But at the end of the day, it creates a better product because we can come to a happy median between the both of us.



MT: Some students have said that pre-CASA Homecomings have had more due to a larger budget given to SGA. Is this true? And if so, what is the reason that CASA cannot be given a similar budget?

Luke: The reason that it seemed like there was more money given to those events (pre-CASA) is because they spent more money on the concert. [My] freshman year they had the concert and the fashion show together. So by doing that you eliminate having to pay crew and staff for two [different] days. The Homecoming budget has been drastically decreased each year.

MT: What is the best part about planning Homecoming?

Justin: I think the best part is actually seeing the event come into fruition; actually seeing people at the event enjoying themselves and having a good time.

MT: What is CASA's overall goal when planning Homecoming?

Spring Fest" isn't institutionalized. Homecoming is an institutional thing, so the institution sets aside money for it each year. Last year was the first Spring Fest since my freshman year (2007-2008). But last year we didn't have a budget for it, so we had to pull it straight out of the CASA budget which was very small at the time. So by staying under budget for Homecoming, it will allow us to have a bigger Spring Fest, Students and alumni enjoying themselves is the first priority.

MT: What would you say about this year's Homecoming that makes it better than the past two Homecomings that have been run by CASA?

buke: Anytime you do an event, you always learn as you make mistakes. For example, [CASA's] first Homecoming (Fall 2008) had a lot of mistakes. Last year (Fall 2009) wasn't perfect, but we got closer to having a very tight week; so we can only grow from there. I also think the overall confidence of the [CASA] board will be exteded through the events this year. Things will run a whole lot more

smoothly now because this is our third year in. We expect what's going to go wrong and we can fix it before it happens.

MT: Many students have expressed that they don't like this year's theme. How was this theme decided upon? And what were some of the reasons that other themes were rejected?

Justin: We had a lot of ideas for themes. Basically, when we look at a theme we look at: how can we tie in each event with the theme [and] how can we decorate campus. We felt that this theme (Galactic Ascension) allowed us the most flexibility with the events. I know some students don't like the theme, but in the end it's just something that you can say, "Oh this is what it was last year." I highly doubt that these two words, Galactic Ascension, are going to stop anybody from having a good time on Saturday during Tailgate or during the game or at Coronation ball.

MT: If you could give yourselves a letter grade for CASA's performance delivery thus far, what would it be and why?




MT: If you could describe preparation for Homecoming in one word, what would it be?



fter the questionable choices of J. Holiday and Lloyd in 2008 and 2009, respectively, it is safe to say that the Morehouse and Spelman Homecoming Committee has gotten their musical choice for the acclaimed neo-soul concert correct this time. The committee has finally reached back into the heart of the neo-soul genre after having had its last real neo-soul artist, Dwele, perform in 2007.

With her jazz-filled voice, passion-filled lyrics and soul-throbbing instrumentals, it is safe to say that Chrisette Michele exudes the spirit of the neo-soul genre and is an excellent choice for this year's Homecoming festivities.

Neo-soul is a term used to describe a style of music that is a hybrid of soul, funk and contemporary R&B. The term was originally coined by Kedar Massenburg, a music producer from Motown Records, in the late 1990s as a marketing tool following the commercial successes of artists like Maxwell, D'Angelo, Lauryn Hill and Massenburg's personal musical success, Erykah Badu.

According to musicologists and African-American Studies scholars, neo-soul is distinctive among its contemporary R&B counterparts because of its use of live instrumentation and deeper lyrical content. Neo-soul is unapologetic, complex and highly introspective.

Chrisette Michele fits all of the above criteria. Her music is poetic, unapologetic, and complex. Raised in Patchogue, N.Y., Chrisette Michele always knew that she wanted to be an entertainer. During her high school years, she led numerous choirs and she received a degree in vocal performance from Five Towns College in Dix Hills, New York. Music lovers all around received their first dose of Chrisette when she made a guest appearance on Jay-Z's "Lost One," the second single from his "Kingdom Come" album. Ironically, she was featured on Nas' "Can't Forget About You," the second single from his "Hip Hop Is Dead" album.

In 2007, Chrisette Michele's debut album "I Am" was released to rave reviews. Billboard and USA Today gave her positive reviews. The Internet publication, AllHipHop, stated that her debut was "one of the quietest, yet most powerful albums out there." In the end, Chrisette Michele received her first Grammy for Best Urban/Alternative Performance for "Be Okay" at the 2009 Grammy Awards.

that same year, she released her last album, "Epiphany." It debuted No. 1 on the Billboard 200, selling 83,000 units in its first week. Although her album was listed as the lowest selling No. 1 debut album for three months, her album was receiving positive reviews once again. Some critics did not like her choice of production and that it lacked the jazz influence of her previous album while others praised her for her soulful voice, often citing a comparison to the late Ella Fitzgerald.

Overall, Chrisette Michele is an excellent choice for the 2010 Homecoming festivities. She will add her soulful touch to a week filled with spectacular surprises. In comparison to previous artists who have been slated as the Homecoming neo-soul artist, Chrisette Michele supersedes them with commercial appeal, technique, and above all, she is a true neo-soul artist.



Though Jeezy performed singles from his then new album, "The Recession," people were disappointed that Fiasco wouldn't be performing. No one knows the exact reason why he didn't come.

Redeeming themselves from the previous year, CASA made sure Fiasco was the headlining artist for 2009. Along with newcomer B.O.B., Fiasco gave an amazing show. Overall the concert was a great success, but some people would have rather seen him during Homecoming 2008 than 2009. By Homecoming 2009, Fiasco's last album had been out for nearly two years. uring the past few weeks much attention has surrounded Homecoming, whether it be the Miss Maroon & White Coronation to the controversial hip-hop concert headlined by Rick Ross. But many have forgotten that the 2010 theme is Galactic Ascension and the Morehouse-Albany State University football game has been correctly dubbed Homecoming's "Zenith".

The Maroon Tigers opened the season making local and national headlines after earning their best record since 1930, 5-0. Morehouse recorded two important conference road wins against Benedict College in overtime and Fort Valley State University. Until its first loss to Tuskegee University on Oct. 9, Morehouse was tied with Albany for first place in the SIAC standings for the first six weeks of the season. The American Football Coaches Association also recognized the Maroon Tigers by ranking them the 16th-best team in Division II football earlier this month, the highest rating in school history.

For the past three Homecoming games, Morehouse has defended B.T. Harvey Stadium against Clark Atlanta University twice and Albany. The past three wins have all been decided by nine points or less, with the closest victory coming last year against the Panthers, 24-20. The last time the Maroon Tigers walked off the field disappointed with the Homecoming game's outcome was in 2006 when Albany State left Atlanta with a 16-6 win.

Although winning the Homecoming game is very important for Morehouse fans, head coach Rich Freeman is looking at the big pic-

ture, an SIAC regular-season championship and a postseason bid.

"The Lord doesn't hold one day higher than the other," Freeman said in reference to the Homecoming game's significance over other games. "If we lose any more games its all over, so we must take every game one at a time."


The team still has a chance to reach the playoffs if they win out and FVSU, ASU, and Tuskegee beat each other in their upcoming matchups. Freeman believes his team may have the premier talent in the SIAC and if it is coupled with excellent coaching, their goals are very feasible.

The key aspect of this game is both teams' ability to run the ball. Morehouse sophomore tailback David Carter has finessed and powered his way into opponents' end zones throughout the season and has led the conference in rushing with 125.4 yards per game.

The Golden Rams have their own two-headed rushing attack comprised of Robert Welton and LiRonnie Davis. Welton, a transfer student from Appalachian State, is second to Carter in rushing (95.2 ypg.) while Davis, who missed the last two seasons because of a broken leg and academics, gains 54.8 ypg.

Refusing to be overshadowed, the defenses for both teams have played extraordinarily well. Albany's defense has held opponents to 62.4 ypg, while Morehouse's rush defense allows less than 90 ypg.

The winner of the SIAC may come from the victor of this game, leaving the excitement for 2 p.m. on Oct. 23 at an extreme high.





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
