## Geo-Tagging: Has Social Networking Now Gone too Far?

Twitter allows users to comment on your Twitpic and track your home address too. Though many would never dare hand out this personal information to any stranger on the street, many account holders unknowingly provide this same vital information via social networking sites. The geotagging capability on many of these sites allows users to see the exact location of others whether they are uploading a photo or tweeting. It is even more shocking that geotagging is not limited to cities, but can also provide the exact longitude and latitude points of the device being used.

Geotagging has become one of the major controversies associated with online privacy. Google, Facebook and Twitter have already added service.

Despite geotagging's popularity,

sophomore Daryl Foster refuses to allow geotagging on her social network accounts. "I think they come up with these features with good intentions, but [on a larger scale] it's dangerous," Foster comments.

There are several probable "good intentions" to geotagging. For example, police forces would be able to track a missing victim or criminal because the Stored Communications Act grants access to locational data from cell phones and social networks. The agencies must provide "reasonable grounds" to tap into the locational data before they are allowed to do so.

Additionally, geotagging programs such as the phone application Foursquare, allows users to update their exact location enabling friends to meet for gatherings with no direct communication. However, the information is available to friends as well as strangers, making it easier for stalkers and other criminals to

track potential victims.

In her article "Privacy: Geotagging Highlights Safety, Risks Of Mobile Technology," Lisa Riordan Seville of the *Daily Beast* discusses the tech savvy Carrie Bugbee who "checked in" and shared her exact location with her friends on Foursquare. Later that night she received a phone call from an individual who tracked her down from PleaseRobMe.com, a site devoted to warning people of the dangers of geotagging. From that day on, Bugbee deleted Foursquare and started taking necessary precautions to prevent being tracked again.

Similar to Bugbee, Daryl takes the better safe than sorry approach when it comes to internet privacy. Although she considers herself a rather open and outgoing person, her Twitter remains private. "If they're not close [friends] then they shouldn't know what I'm doing," said Foster. Also, strangers on Facebook only

get the limited profile view and she does not own any other Geotagging programs such as Foursquare.

These types of cyber precautions may be necessary in light of the recent stalking report from the US Department of Justice. The report states that, "During a 12 month period, 14 in every 1,000 persons of age 18 or older were victims of stalking and approximately 1 in 4 stalking victims reported some form of cyberstalking such as email (83%) or instant messaging (35%)."

The recent trend of Geotagging can make this even worse. Seville proposed the point that many of those "exposed to location-based tracking will not even know they are being watched." Therefore, stalking statistics may be higher than realized. "Geotagging and other location-based tracking programs may not directly cause stalking, but it can make it easier," writes Seville.



# Illegal Aliens in USG School

The immigration reform is a growing controversy nationwide, particularly in Arizona due to the recent implementation of the immigration law that allows law enforcement to check the immigration status of persons in question if there is reasonable suspicion that the person is an illegal immigrant. However, a recent scandal brought the national immigration debate to Georgia.

In response to the case of an undocumented student who was allowed to pay in-state tuition at Kennesaw State University in early May, the Georgia Board of Regents called for a review of the University System of Georgia's residency verification procedures.

The USG follows current state laws which grant undocumented students admittance to Georgia colleges and universities, but requires them to pay out-of-state tuition.

The issue of the KSU student was resolved in terms of her reclassification as a non-Georgia resident. Immigration authorities deferred action on the student's immigration status for one year, giving her time to complete

her degree.

Nonetheless, the Georgia Board of Regents took immediate action to ensure similar problems like the KSU incident do not reoccur.

A new Resident Verification Committee has been formed and will review the residency verification processes for all current and incoming USG students.

All Georgia colleges and universities were ordered to review and report the residency verification status of all students to the Board of Regents by mid August.

According to an estimate taken by the Board of Regents in July, there are fewer than 100 illegal aliens attending Georgia public colleges and universities. Georgia State University enrolled 19 undocumented students in 2009, while Georgia Tech University enrolled fewer than 5. The University of Georgia reported having none.

The Resident Verification Committee will provide a final interim report of the residency status of all USG students, along with any recommendations to the full board in October.

Granting in-state tuition to undocumented students at state colleges and

universities is a nationwide issue.

According to the Christian Science Monitor, between 2001 and 2006, 10 states, including California and New York, passed legislation awarding in-state tuition to illegal immigrants.

In the midst of the dispute over college tuition rates for undocumented students, a larger debate over whether illegal aliens should be admitted to Georgia colleges and universities has surfaced.

Individual states have the option to bar undocumented students from public colleges and universities. South Carolina has acted to deny undocumented students admission to state institutions of higher learning.

Senator Don Balfour (R-Snellville) has joined 13 other state senators in urging the Board of Regents to bar illegal immigrants from Georgia colleges and universities.

Republican state senators are not satisfied with the solution to charge illegal aliens out-of-state tuition. They argue that because out-of-state tuition does not cover the full cost of education at a public college or university, a student's attendance is subsidized by taxpayer money and admittance to these schools should be limited to legal residents.

"Persons not lawfully present in the U.S. are not eligible, regardless of tuition rates, to attend taxpayer supported colleges and universities in Georgia," said 14 Republican state senators in a letter to the Board of Regents. "[It] is an inescapable lack of wisdom in forcing Georgia taxpayers to subsidize the education of a person who upon graduation, is not legally eligible to be employed."

The Department of Homeland Security estimated Georgia's illegal immigration population to be 480,000 in 2009, the sixth highest in the nation.

GOP governor candidate and former state senator, Eric Johnson proposed a solution to limit the number of illegal immigrants in Georgia schools. He plans to mandate the collection of citizenship data from K-12 schools.

"With the federal government failing to secure our borders and stem the flow of illegal immigration, it is up to the states to fill the gap," said Johnson in a press release. "Simply checking a box on a form is not enough. We should ask prospective students to provide verifiable proof of their immigration status."

A good breakfast spot is hard to find. Many college students work with a painfully restricting budget. Therefore, a weekend trip to Gladys Knight's Chicken and Waffles is not the usual option. However, Atlanta is a renowned culinary hub; which allows AUC students to find delectable bacon, sausage, eggs and grits at reasonable prices.  
Located on Howell Mill road, West Egg Cafe is relatively indistinguishable from the rustic charm of the White Provisions Residences surrounding the cafe. Though its appearance may not immediately grab the attention of a passerby, the continuous flow of patrons definitely sparks interest.  
At first I paid the venue no mind, regularly passing it to venture to other restaurants sprouting all over the Westside dining district. It was not until my last few hours in Atlanta before summer break that West Egg was casually recommended as a great place to stop before heading home to Washington, D.C.  
What a terrible idea! A summer without Atlanta was bad enough, but a summer without West Egg was practically unbearable.  
One of the reasons why I craved the West Egg over the summer was because of the restaurant's soothing atmosphere. West Egg holds lush mahogany couches and a mouthwatering display of freshly baked goods upon entry. It's quaint photo booth with an old-school flair and bar lined with freshly brewed coffee establishes the homely climate that is the West Egg.  
Both *Creative Loafing Newspaper* and the *Southern Living Magazine* agree that West Egg is one of the best breakfast restaurants in Atlanta. Many other restaurant guides provide the same recommendations. With all of its great ratings, there is no question that West Egg provides something unique in place of your regularly mundane breakfast selections.

For instance, I am not much of a sandwich girl, but when I assessed the menu, chock full of meals presented in a new light, I changed my outlook. The creative selections included wilted greens and spicy buttermilk pancakes.  
My personal favorite is the Fried Green Tomato BLT. This plate was mind blowing. How could I deny the idea of sweet, crunchy and delectable pieces of fried green tomato coupled with thick strips of smoked bacon? In tandem with toasted fresh and grainy challah slices, pimiento cheese, field greens, and a gracious amount of skillet potatoes-I was in heaven. It was a mixture of flavors I had never experienced before, and the pleasure after one simple bite was intensely satisfying.  
Shouldn't all our meals be like this? They will be at West Egg.  
Although the West Egg is not as expensive as other popular Atlanta restaurants, the numbers can add up for some. Still, an \$8 meal is completely worth the out of this world experience.  
The West Egg also features variations of old time breakfast favorites such as Eggs Benedict, fluffy buttermilk pancakes, customized omelets and so much more.  
Keep in mind that if you are only interested in taking advantage of West Egg's free wireless connection, you must order a cup of hot chocolate. Even though it comes with a spoon, sipping on the beautifully displayed foam and whipped cream on the hot chocolate will liven the mood with playful foam moustaches.  
One last thing to remember is that West Egg has also been considered one of the best places for cupcakes as noted by Atlanta Magazine. The Coca-Cola flavor is wildly popular.

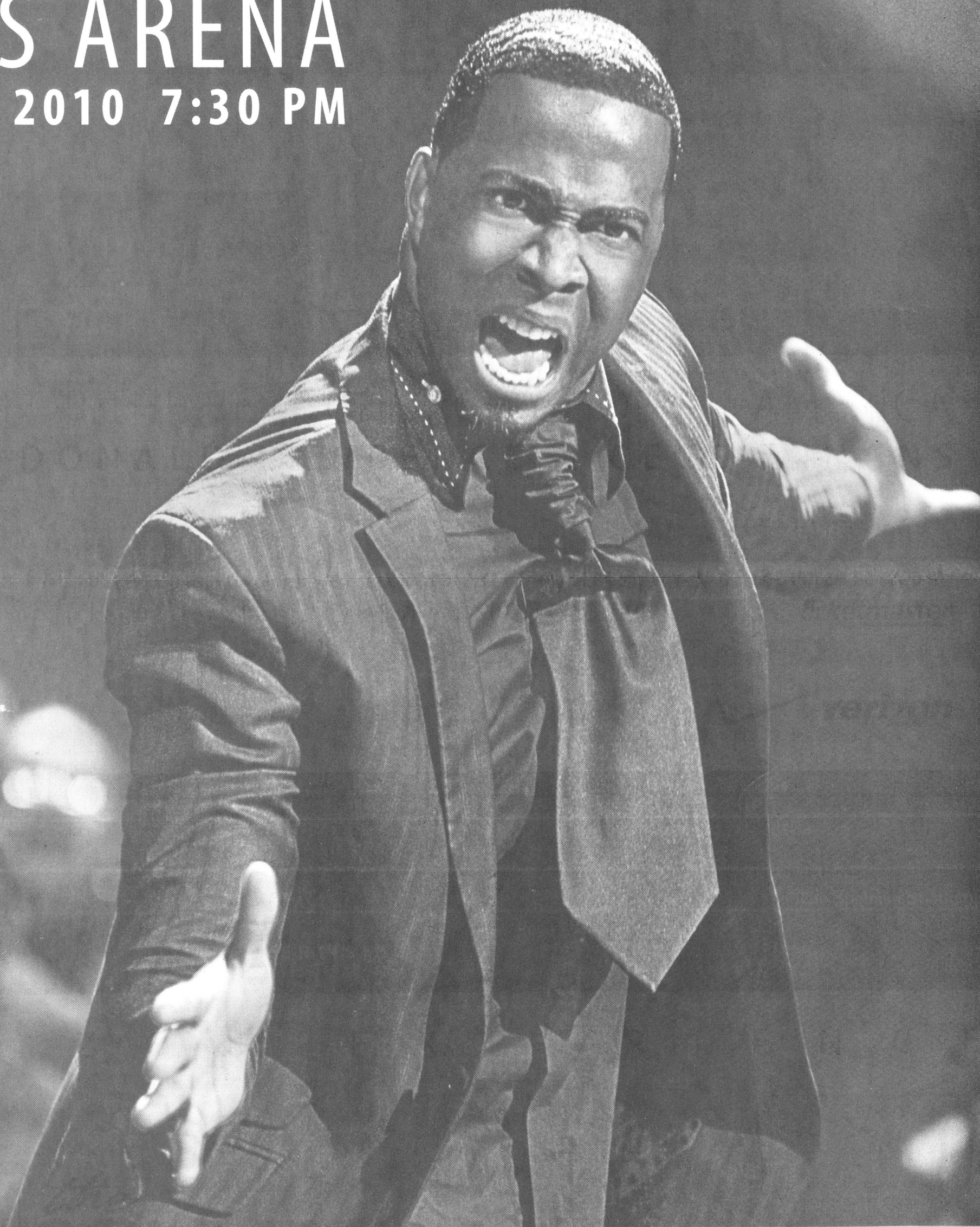

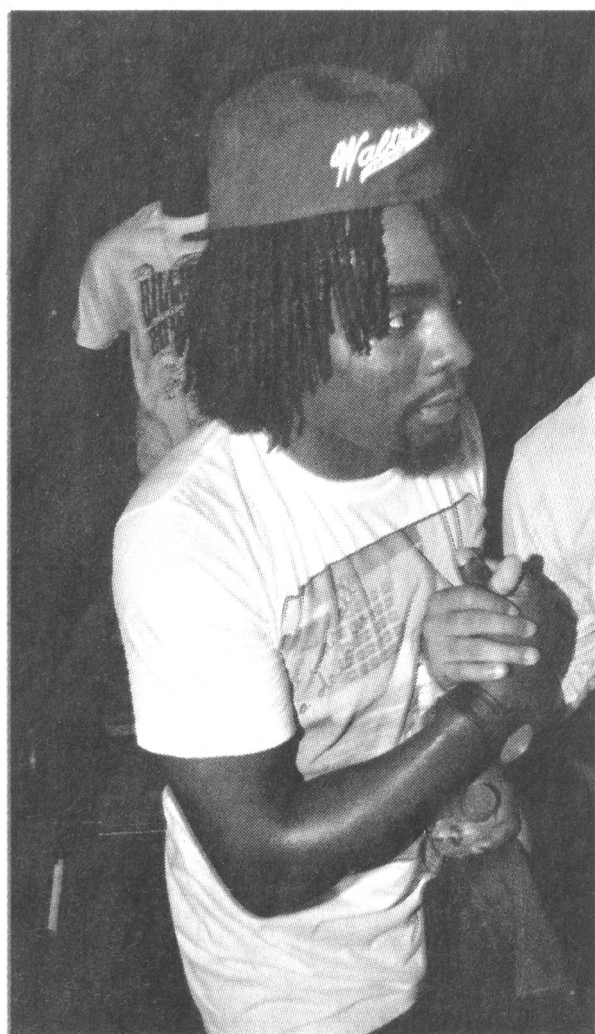

## If Islam Caused 9/11, Did Christianity Cause Columbine?

Emotionally-charged signs with messages such as "All I need to know about Islam, I learned on 9/11," can be found just two blocks from Ground Zero at the proposed site of Park51, a Muslim cultural center and mosque. According to the recent *Time* poll, 61% of Americans are opposed to the proposed location of the mosque. In fact, many Americans say that the Islamic center would be an insult to the Americans who died as a result of 9/11.

It seems that a violent case of what *Times Magazine* calls Islamophobia has struck the hearts of many Americans. As a result, many citizens have misinterpreted the hard truth: Islam is a religion; Al-Qaeda is an extremist religious group.

New York native Kiara White and President of Al-Nisa, Spelman's Muslim student group, feels that 9/11 has nothing to do with her religion.

"On that day, my mother was only one block away from the second tower when it fell. It was not religion that was impacted—it was humanity," said White.

Despite the fact that Muslim citizens were among the fatalities during the fall of the towers, many major political figures have vocalized their criticisms of President Obama's support of building the mosque near the sacred Ground Zero.

A day later, critics even said the President "flip-flopped" when he stated that his earlier comments were centered around religious freedom, not the exact location of the mosque.

During a time when re-election tensions are on the rise, congressional members are taking a stance that is most favorable to constituents. For example, New York Governor David Paterson stated that he was "sensitive to the concerns of a community traumatized by the attacks and still struggling to rebuild." Paterson continued by saying "[moving the Islamic center] might be a way to suit the needs of the community."

While Paterson took a more cautious approach, other figures made much more

blatant statements. Former House Speaker and Republican, Newt Gingrich stated that the proposed location of the mosque is comparable to Nazis protesting near the Holocaust Museum. Furthermore, Gingrich claims that the building of the mosque would be in celebration that "[Radical Islamic leaders] can build a mosque next to a place where 3,000 Americans were killed by Islamists."

Gingrich's flawed logic could potentially open the floodgates for a number of inaccurate assumptions. For example, the average American teenagers Eric Harris and Dylan Klebold were once described by adults as "nice kids." However, those descriptions have changed entirely as they are now infamously known as the murderers of their peers and teachers at Columbine High School.

Although this massacre is coldly remembered almost 11 years later, most do not attribute the killers' religion or upbringing as the source of the crime. In contrast, teams of psychiatrists worked long hours to diagnose the two as psychopaths.

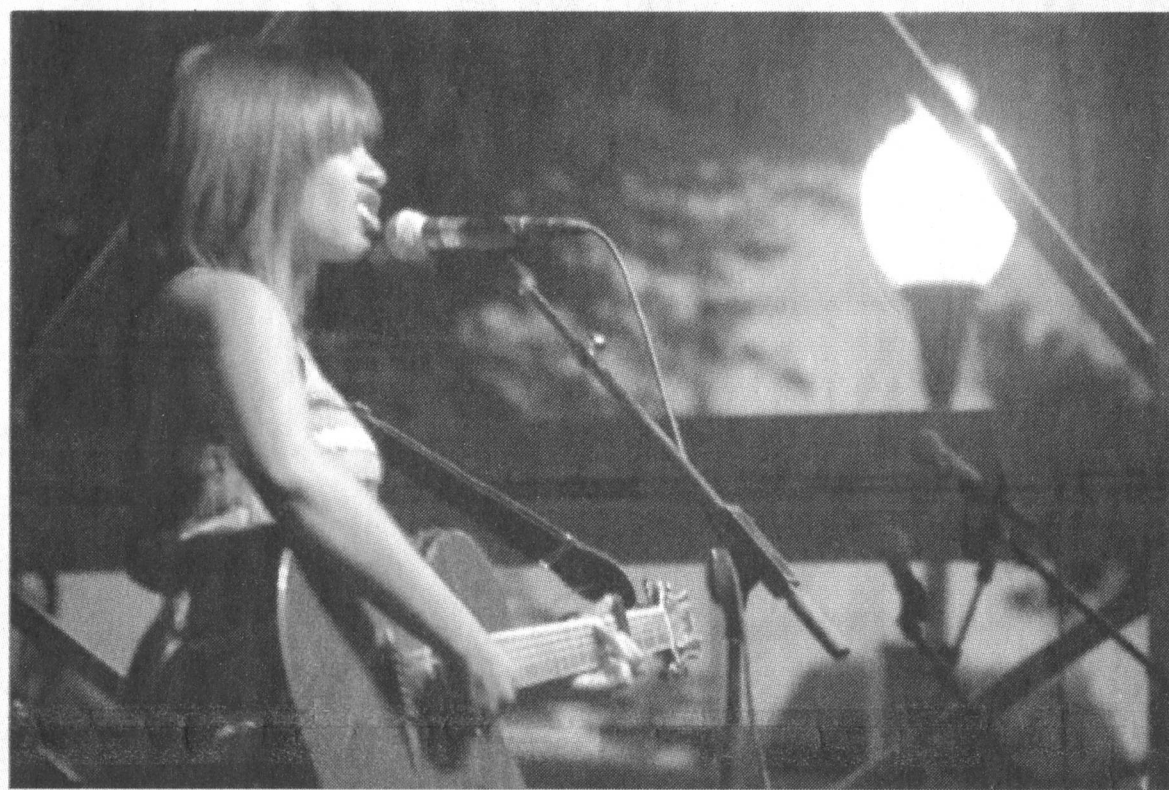

The Islamic center is a place of worship. Yet in the midst of the media frenzy, the fact that Muslims were praying in the building for nearly a year has been overlooked.

A criminal's religion can not be validated as the reason for the crime. If this reasoning were held true, then churches and synagogues would not be built near any ground held sacred to Americans.

Bundy, the Columbine killers, and the 9/11 perpetrators have one thing in common—they were terrorists. It is not religion that murders people, terrorists do.

September 11, was supposed to be a commemorative day for Atlanta's Muslim community, as it marked the end of the Islamic holy month of Ramadan. Two Muslim music promoters, Morehouse alumnus Basheer Jones and partner Nardin Jihad, planned to host a concert at The Fox Theatre to celebrate the end of the fasting period, but were turned down by the popular venue due to their religious affiliation. What was meant to be an opportunity to put on an event to inspire the youth, turned into another example of this group's battle for basic civil rights.

Since 9/11, Muslim Americans have dealt with an onslaught of prejudices and consistent harassment; in the workplace, in train stations, and of course – in airports. After the incidents that occurred on that horrific day nine years ago, Muslim Americans across the country relinquished their basic rights in the name of the protection of the greater population. If asked to be searched by authorities, these citizens are forced to comply – or risk being treated as a terrorists.

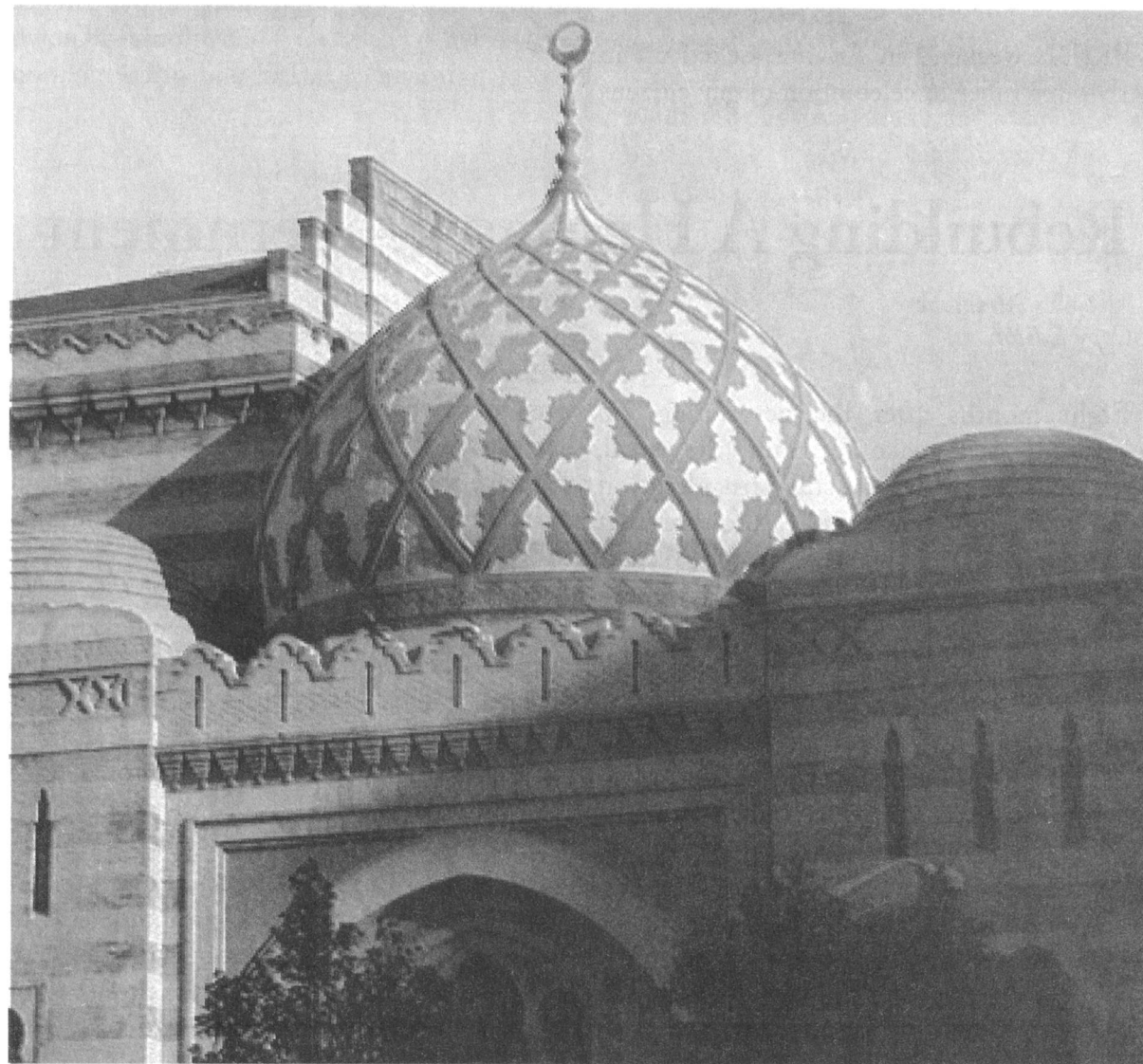
Jessica Dinac, a junior, understands why some Americans believe it is unjust to expect society to immediately accept a group of individuals who had a devastating impact on Americans all over.

We both had one too many overstuffed bags, but our religious beliefs and ethnicity separated us, and the actions of individuals almost a decade ago – to whom she most likely has no relation whatsoever.

While the reasons behind these cautions are fully understood, no one wishes to relive the horrors of 9/11. Perhaps, it is too much to ask Americans to simply allow Muslims to reenter this society on a leveled playing field. That purpose being to provide equality all across the board? So what message is America sending to its citizens when it fails to practice what it preaches?

It appears that, America is gradually closing its doors on more people – moving further and further away from the model it originally

Firefighters, police officers and soldiers risk their lives everyday in order to provide a service to their communities. While the hazards associated with being a journalist are less commonly thought about, they are just as real and deadly. According to the official website of the International Press Institute, 54 journalists around the globe have lost their lives since January. Although 4 less journalists were killed in 2010 than 2009, this number is still disheartening. The IPI, a global organization dedicated to protecting free press, calculated that casualties in the Americas contributed most to this “Death Watch,” with 20 reported journalist deaths. Asia was named the second most deadly region for journalists, with six killed in Pakistan, three killed in the

Philippines, two killed in Afghanistan, and several other deaths documented in Thailand, Indonesia, Japan and India.

The death of these innocent journalists, all of whom were simply attempting to report the truth, posed an important question: Why were their lives lost? Alison Bethel McKenzie, interim director of the IPI, made the following statement at an IPI meeting in Vienna: “Journalists continue to systematically lose their lives to conflict, militants, paid thugs, governments, drug dealers, corrupt politicians, unscrupulous security officers, and others.” In most cases, the more war or violence in the area, the greater the chances that a journalist will be killed in his/her efforts.

One such example is the slaying of Luis Carlos Santiago, a Mexican photojournalist and the wounding of his colleague, Carlos Manuel Sanchez in Ciudad Juarez. According

to Globe Newswire, Santiago was shot and killed on Thursday, September 16 in a mall parking lot. Santiago and Sanchez had just left a photography workshop and were on their lunch break. While the shooters' identities and the exact motive for the crime remain unknown, it appears that the two journalists (both of the daily paper El Diario) were targeted as part of an “ongoing wave of violence,” started and perpetuated by rival drug cartels. These acts of violence have plagued the city since 2008, the year in which the first journalist was slain in Juarez. According to the Committee to Protect Journalists, an excess of 30 journalists have been killed or disappeared in Mexico since 2006.

Such chilling statistics pose a second question: What is being done to help? One form of aid is the IPI's “Justice Denied” campaign. This crusade seeks to tell the stories

of journalists who have been killed, injured, or wrongly imprisoned simply for doing their jobs.

“Justice Denied” ensures that the public and key decision-makers stay continually informed about the cases of such journalists. It also pushes decision-makers at all levels of government to act on behalf of the journalists, and provides support for their family and friends. This campaign also charges individuals to act by publicizing cases through his/her own media outlet, speaking out against the wrongful imprisonment, injury or death of journalists, and donating to the campaign.

## MARTA Money Problems Affect Our Wallets

On Sunday, Oct. 3, MARTA increased their prices, and reduced bus and rail routes on Sept. 25 in order to make up for a \$69.34 million budget deficit for the 2010-2011 fiscal year. MARTA increased the cost of most of their day passes. A one way ticket will still cost \$2.00 and a one day pass will remain \$8.00. However, 2,3,4,7, 30 day and mobility passes rates increased.

MARTA has also enacted a 10.2% reduction in bus service and a 14.2% reduction in rail service. Out of the 131 routes that MARTA are currently operating, only 91 will remain active. MARTA is even eliminating 734 positions

and laying off a minimum of 300 employees. All of this translates into even longer waiting times and lower customer service for those who ride the MARTA. Davida Pete, a student at Spelman, says, “Yes, I will be doing a lot less traveling on the MARTA,” when asked if this increase in fare price and time waiting for the bus will affect her traveling. However, often times it turns out that MARTA is the easiest or only way to commute to campus. Our AUC shuttle is great, but it only goes so far. Taxis are also a viable option for students, but they can be pricey, especially if you want to go a long distance. They also aren't as useful if you are going out with a large group of friends.

Yet, even with these increases and cuts, it seems that Marta is hemorrhaging money

needlessly. 57 Marta laptops have seemingly disappeared, out of an original 316 and the two employees who were supposed to be overseeing them were fired. They are valued at \$55,000 dollars at used value and \$127,000 at new value. This summer Marta was forced to pay a \$79,000 fine to the state because their vehicles went thru the G.A. 400 Cruise Card lane without paying the toll. While the total amount for regular sized vehicles that went through the toll without paying only added up to \$2,600 this year. The assistant to CEO Beverly Scott was fired in August due to alleged abuse of her MARTA issued company credit card. So all together, MARTA lost about \$134,000 worth of money that could have contributed to decreasing the deficit. This lack

of oversight and continued loss of money is coming out of the pockets of the customer.

On the other hand, Monae White, a student at Spelman says that “I think that it is an understandable action considering their current position,” in response to MARTA increasing the cost of passes and cutting off services and routes.

Harold Buckley, MARTA board member said, “I would say that 99.9 percent of our assets, I can absolutely unquestionably say that we can know where they are, we have control over those things.” Yet, the 1 percent of their assets that they can't find cost them \$134,000. With all these fare increases, who will be able to afford MARTA in the long run?

About 40 Ku Klux Klan (KKK) members gathered in the back parking lot of the Gilmer County Courthouse in north Georgia for a demonstration. # Rebuilding A Haitian Government

Eight months after the devastating 7.0 magnitude earthquake in Haiti, the small, impoverished nation is still struggling on a political scale. With an earthquake that killed approximately 300,000 people and left another 1.5 million homeless, natives of Haiti are now seeking a new start. Nov. 28, is the official date of one of the most important events that will take place in Haiti, courtesy of the international community that donated \$29 million to fund the elections. As of now, details about a recent meeting between current Haitian President, Renè Prèval, and members of Haiti’s election commission, have stirred up new governmental corruption accusations.

The “secret” meeting was held a few days prior to the disqualification of 14 potential candidates. Confirmation from several alleged

sources have suggested that the election has been under manipulation on what is supposed to be an independent body election (which ensures that the elections are neither tampered nor swayed). According to a few credible sources, the decisions on who could remain on the presidential list were made during this meeting. Many feel as if this is just a further attempt to continue controlling the elections.

“Logically, a president must be independent. Rene Preval said he would support Jude Celestin. The presidential campaign hasn’t even started, yet he has declared a candidate,” states, Jean Norgaisse a Haitian professor, at Spelman College.

Recently, Prèval has also kept in contact with the remaining candidates allowed to run in the election. Among the 14 candidates who were rejected was the well-known hip hop star, Wyclef Jean. In order to become president of Haiti, a candidate must have been a resident

for at least five consecutive years. They must also meet certain tax compliances. Lawyers for Jean argue that he has had consistent presence in Haiti since the year 2005. Furthermore, he was appointed as Haiti’s “ambassador at large” in 2007. In this responsibility, Jean was assigned to represent Haiti in numerous affairs. His lawyers made a point to also clarify that the job of an ambassador requires inevitable absence.

Professor Norgaisse displayed no signs of being fickle in his opinion on the matter. “Everyone has the right to be a candidate if he fulfills the requirement. Unfortunately, Wyclef doesn’t fulfill the requirements to become president. He doesn’t even have basic education. If he is not educated, how can he manage a country?” questions Norgaisse.

The controversy over Preval’s rumored efforts to seize the elections behind closed doors, are also the commentary concerning

United States efforts and presence in Haiti. Following the earthquake disaster, there was a huge fear that this tragedy could be used to exploit the impoverished island.

While U.S. officials deny the accusations, speculation still occurs. Professor Norgaisse states that “In the past, as well as today, U.S. presence has and will remain permanent. Therefore we need the U.S. but those who are in charge of Haiti need to know how to use (the U.S.). We need them, but they’re not supposed to impose their own decisions upon our country.”

Unfortunately, Haiti has not completed its process of rebuilding. Transportation is very limited due to machinery and debris remains left in the streets, thus it is questionable as to which method everyone will use to find their way to the voting polls.

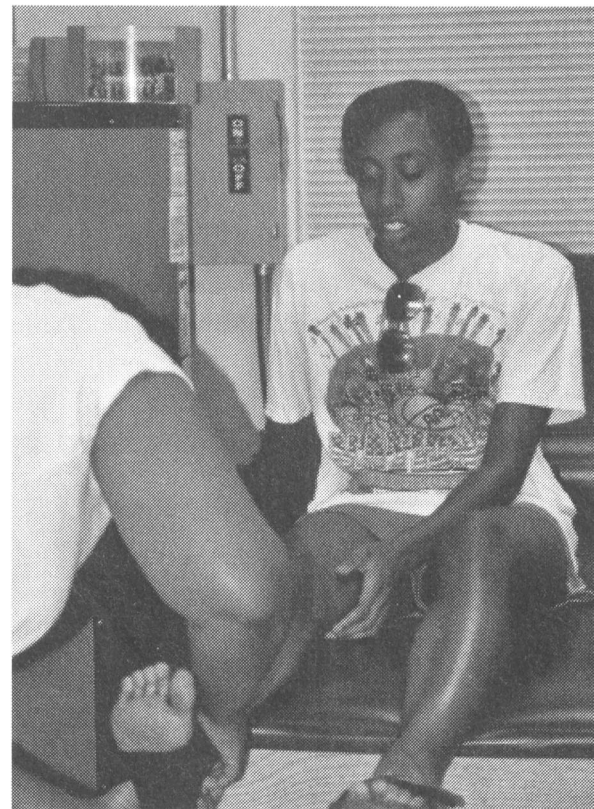
Physical ability is not the only thing developed with the personal training sessions, but also a relationship with a valued faculty member.

The health services offered at Spelman College greatly impact the students. Creating a preventative mindset among these women that can decrease the number of people who suffer from diseases attributed to poor diet

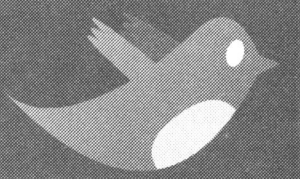

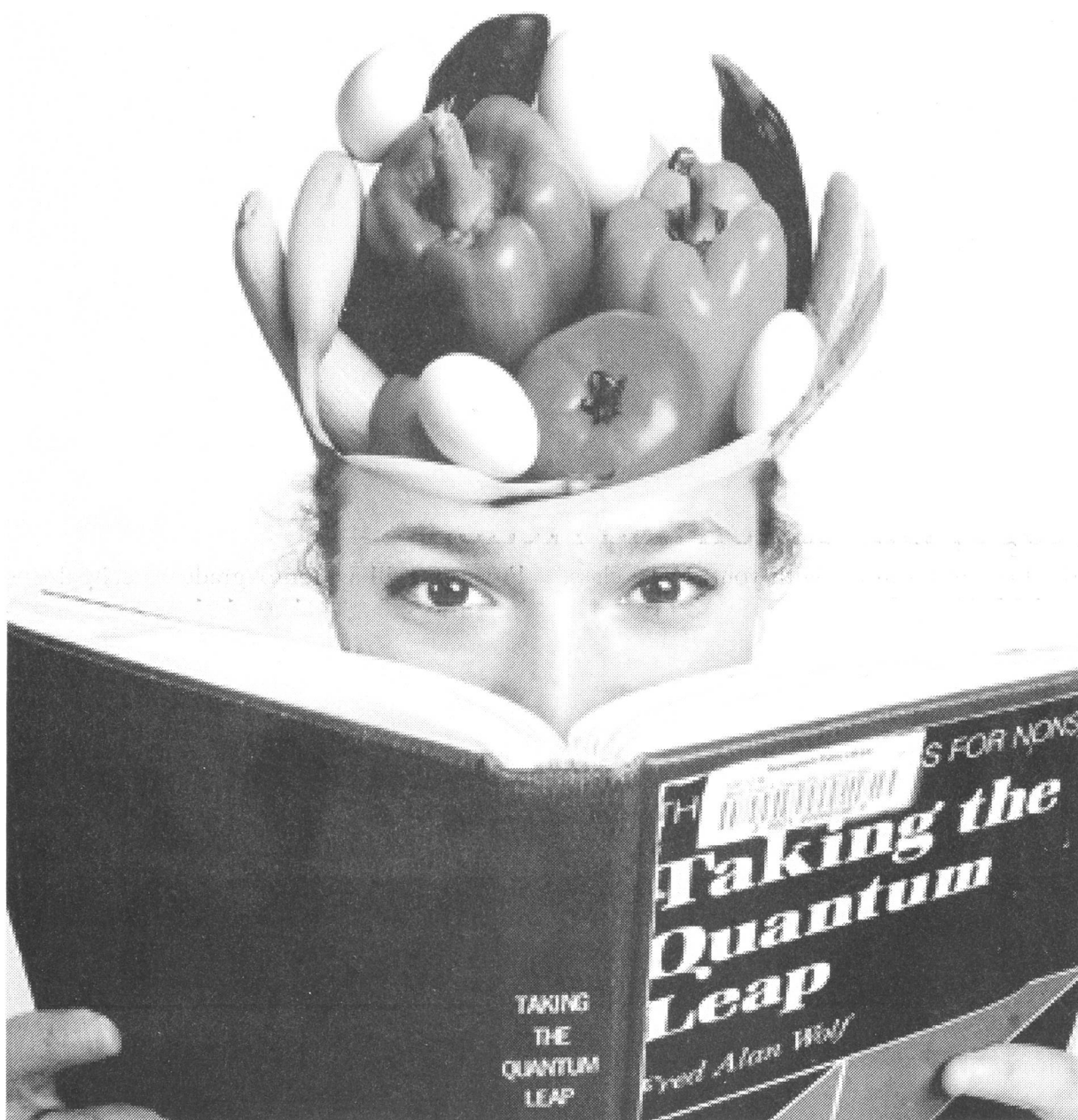
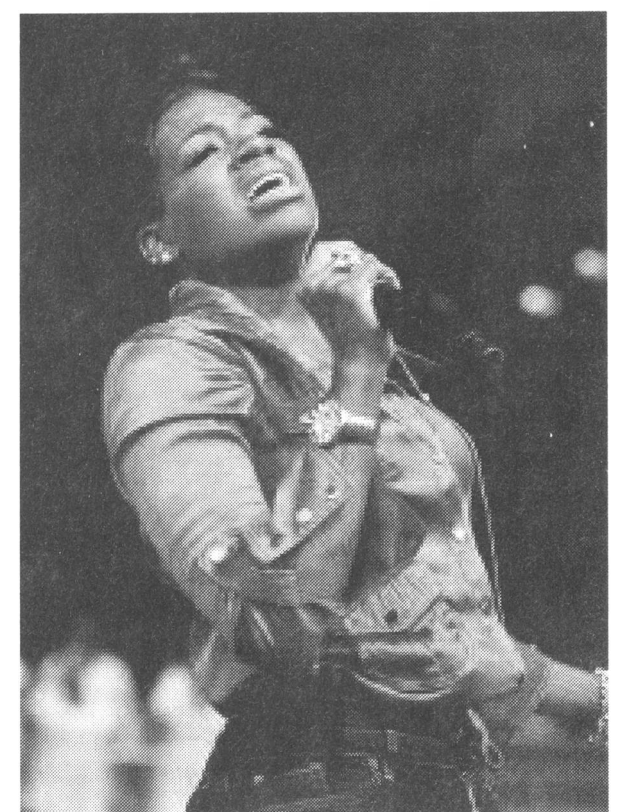

Regardless of whether you are rebelling against the norm, attempting to find some

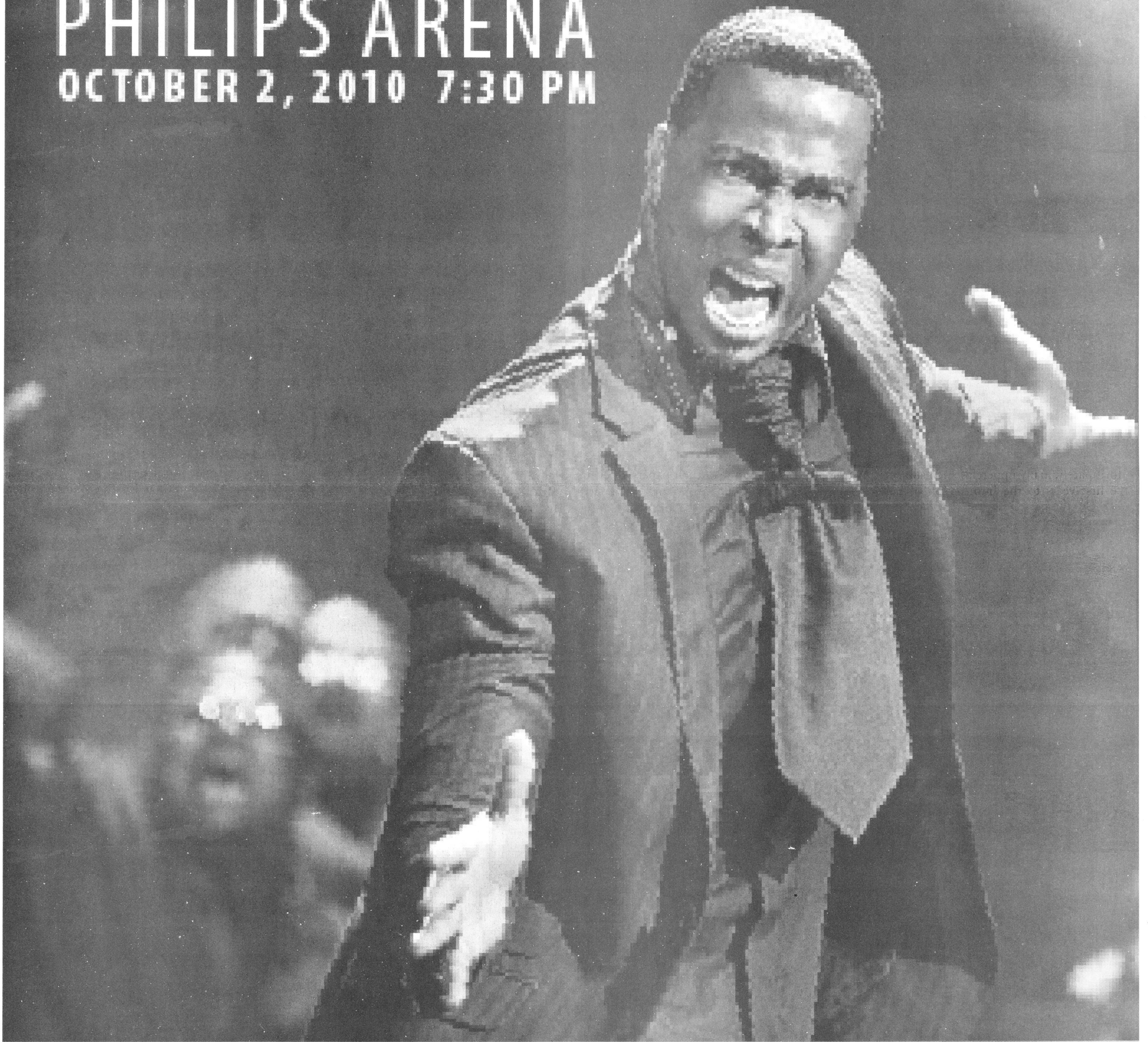

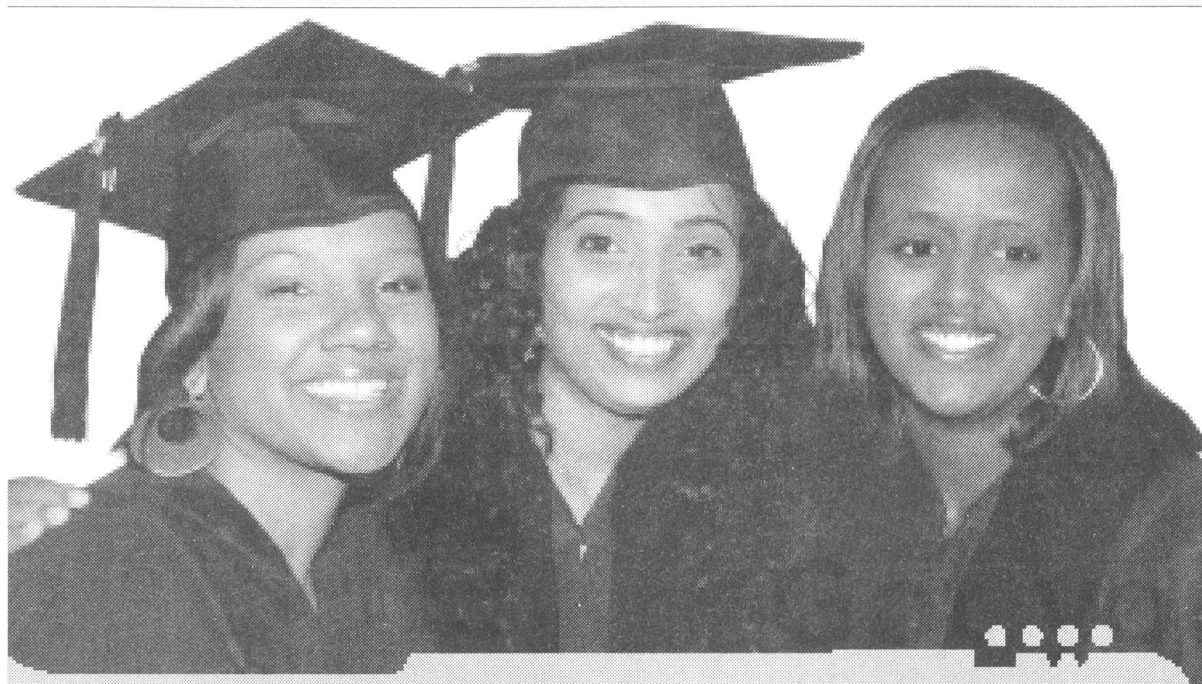

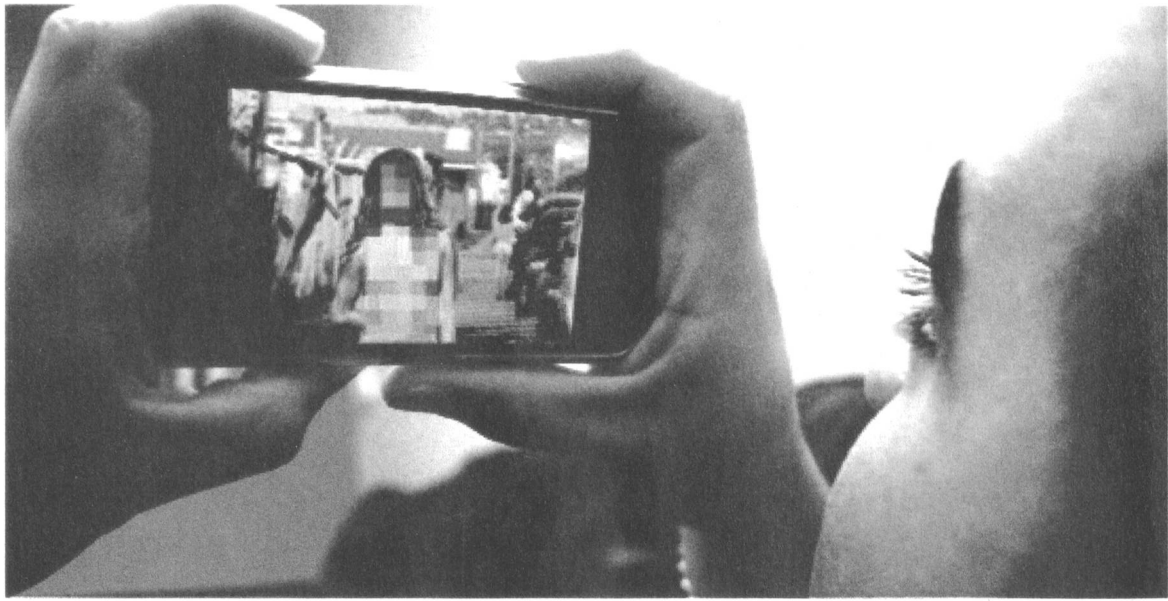

# The Basics: Skin Care

Cleansing, exfoliating, moisturizing, and applying sunscreen are basic concepts in preserving the radiance and clarity of your skin. Cleansing washes away dirt, oil, makeup, and other impurities that can clog the pores. Exfoliating creates a healthy, vibrant complexion by removing the top layer of dead skin that can dull your complexion. Moisturizing helps to keep the skin hydrated. Applying sunscreen, even in the winter, can help keep the skin from becoming damaged. Finding a cleanser and a moisturizer that works for you can be difficult. So, it is helpful to know what type of skin you have before you go to the skin care counter at a department store or browsing down the aisles of Target, Walmart, or even CVS. Here is a test for you to determine your skin type and what type of products will work for you:

- 1.Wash your face with warm water.
- 2.Pat it dry with a towel.
- 3.Wait 15 minutes and press a tissue or blotting paper to the face.

**Normal Skin:** If you have normal skin, the tissue will come off and there will be no visible oil residue. Your face will not feel tight. It will look clean and smooth with a healthy complexion. This skin type is the least problematic. A mild, soap-free and oil-free, cleanser is all you need accompanied by a light moisturizer.

**Dry Skin:** If you have dry skin, the tissue will come off but you may feel some tightness on your face. Your skin may even be flaky. Dry skin is prone to irritation. Try using a creamy cleanser. These cleansers will not take away any of your essential oils, but they will remove dirt, makeup, and other impurities. Also, use a facial cream that will help keep your skin hydrated without clogging your pores.

**Oily Skin:** If you have oily skin, the tissue will have visible spots where the oil has been transferred. Oil is usually found around the cheeks, nose, and forehead. This skin type is often shiny and tends to have blackheads and blemishes. Use a cleanser that will help manage acne without leaving the skin too dry and use a gel moisturizer because they are very light.

**Combination Skin:** If you have combination skin, the tissue will have oil spots around your T-zone. The T-zone includes the forehead, nose, and chin. The combination skin type has both oily and dry skin. This type of skin requires various types of care. Use a cleanser that is mild, but will thoroughly cleanse the pores. Use a creamy moisturizer around dry areas like the cheeks and eyes, and use a light moisturizer for the rest of the face.

**Sensitive Skin:** If you have sensitive skin, the tissue will have no oil residue. The face may be tight because sensitive skin is usually very dry. It is easily irritated and inflamed. Use a gentle cleanser that is fragrance-free. Also, use a fragrance-free creamy moisturizer.

But the seemingly conflicting flavors works together to create one unique "burger" that will keep you satisfied until the very last bite.

If you want to try something a little more All-American, I suggest the Philly Beef Burger. It is made with caramelized onions, green peppers, and something that was completely foreign to me: American cheese foam. It looks slightly foreign too, so don't be as caught off-guard as I was when my waiter presented it to me. The foam makes for a more light and airy flavor that plays nice with the more distinct tones of the onions. Made well done, the burger was deliciously tender.

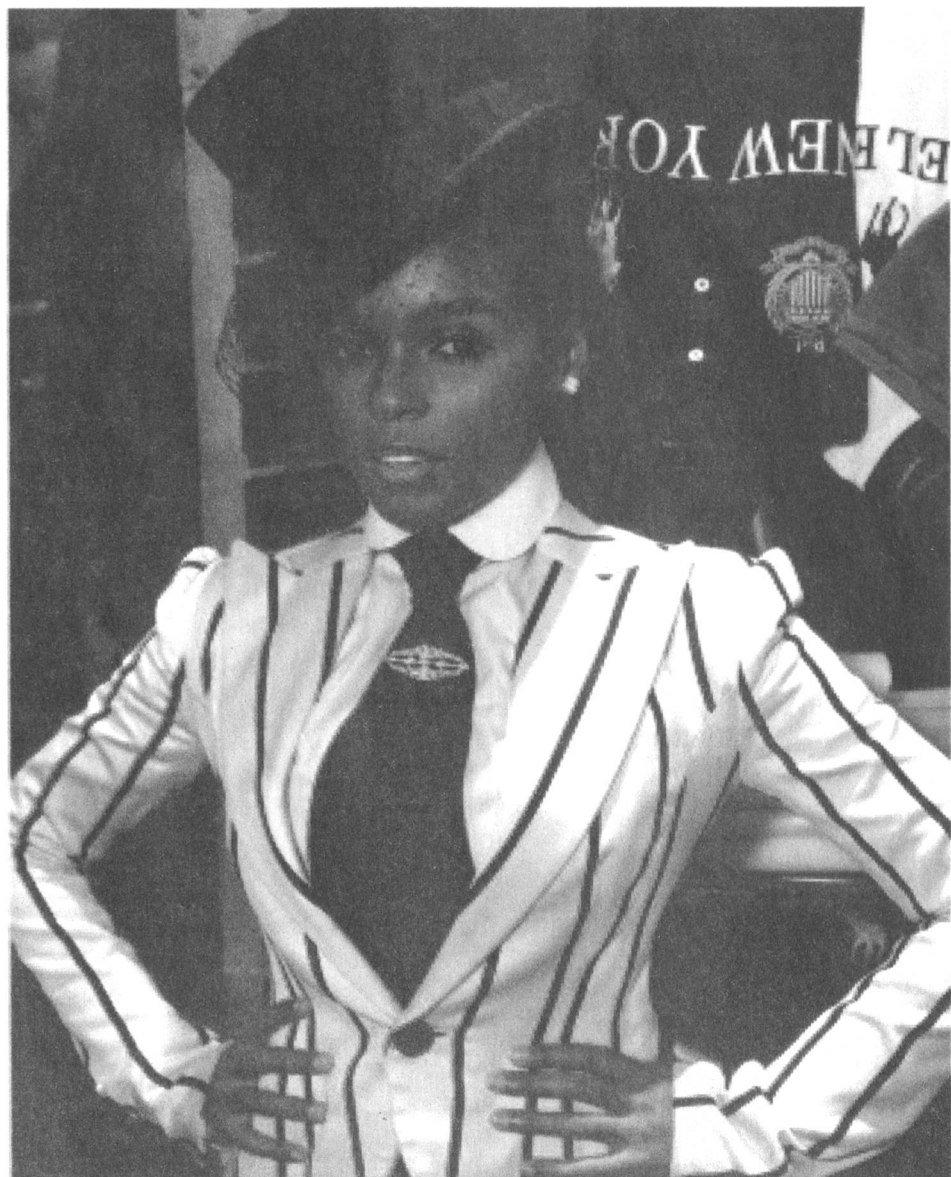

But the burgers are not the only things keeping patrons coming back for more. If for nothing else, come in and try one of their specialty milkshakes. I tried the Krispy Kreme Doughnut flavored milkshake, and was oddly surprised when I began slurping on a liquid doughnut. The titles hold true, and that adds to Flip's impressive ability to pay
