The Class of 2011, Leaves a Memorable Legacy

The Class of 2011 raised approximately \$2,500 this year, through their "Senior Legacy Gift" campaign. This year Senior Class Council led by Samantha Tulin asked each senior to donate \$20.11 to Spelman College. While they did not expect 100% participation, they did expect the students who could make the donation to do so.

"I do understand that some seniors may not be able to make such a financial contribution to the College at this time. But I hope that this program inspires all seniors to carry with them the idea of how important it is to give back to Spelman as we transition into alumnae who will soon be in a position to give back," said a representative of Annual Giving.

The idea for this year's Senior Legacy Gift was inspired by the efforts made by the Class of 2010. Last year, Morgan Williams, a member of the senior class and president of The Power of Ten, an initiative under the Office of Institutional Advancement, the wing of the College aimed toward increasing alumnae giving created the program.

This year the "Every Woman...Every Year!" campaign was not able to reach its goal of 7,000 alumna contributors by Founders Day on April 7th, but Spelman was given an extension so that they can secure a \$250,000 donation from an anonymous donor. Another anonymous donor announced that they will match the first donation if Spelman is able to secure 7,000 alumnae contributors.

The senior class is doing its part to help to build a pattern of giving amongst current students, which will hopefully encourage the graduates to give as alumnae. There is an increased responsibility for students and alumnae to give back to Spelman in a time where outside support is minimal because this is our institution and we need to show that we take responsibility for the up keeping of our school so that donors can see the evidence of our care.

This milestone for the senior class does not belong solely to the Senior Class Council. The "Senior Legacy Gift" campaign was a collaborative effort between the Senior Class Council, the Secretary of Institutional Advancement for SSG. By working together they made a decision to invest in their institution by taking on the responsibility of giving back.

"Students and alumnae always have the responsibility to give back to Spelman, no matter how abundant or minimal outside support may be provided. Spelman is an institution that stands on ideals of excellence. Most people do not understand this, but of all the women's colleges in the nation, Spelman stands as the lowest in alumnae contributions," said Jade Watkins, a senior who participated in the Senior Legacy Gift.

Members of the senior class seemed to take their gift to the college very seriously. Many approached this opportunity to make a difference with eager interest. Senior Legacy Gift participants, like Watkins, were thoroughly excited and proud about the donation and the reality that commencement is coming. Seniors stood by the decision to invest their money in giving back to the College, rather than a bench, tree, which have been typical Senior Class Gifts to the College. The money raised for the Senior Legacy Gift will be used to fund scholarships for matriculating students.

The Class of 2011 will leave their legacy behind for future graduating classes to continue for years to come. On Founders Day, the seniors wore their blue tassels in honor of the choice they made to invest in the future of Spelman College. With the choice already made to change their institution for the better, the Class of 2011 will be well on their way to making the choice to change the world.





More School or More Money? Graduate/Professional Schools vs. Employment

As the spring semester comes to an end and the final days of college socials near, many 2011 graduates are faced with an important dilemma- whether to further their education by enrolling in a graduate or professional school, or to take some time off and enter into the workforce. With graduation approaching, many are feeling the pressure as to whether their decisions were beneficial. So what happens after the graduation caps have flown into the air in celebration and grade point averages have been forgotten?

According to Debra Stuart, President of the Council of Graduate Schools, "While undergraduate education is essential for a nation to participate in the global knowledge economy, graduate education is the key to establishing a leadership position in that economy". In the current economy, the amount of domestic undergraduates enrolling in graduate schools is not impressive. In the Higher Education Institute's 2005 study, more than 80% of students at HBCU's were more interested in making money while less than 80% were interested in preparing themselves to enter into graduate or professional schools.

Contrary to the negative statistics, those who do choose to enroll in graduate or professional schools are opening the gates to a world of endless opportunities. For many careers, such as legal or medical careers, an advanced degree from a professional school is essential. For others, a Master's or Doctorate degree can assist in the advancement of careers and in earning a larger salary. Statistics have shown that individuals with advanced degrees make far more than their colleagues with undergraduate or associate degrees. Advanced degrees and enrolling in graduate or professional schools increase job satisfaction, self-confidence, and hone certain skills in a particular area of the student's perspective field. Graduate and professional schools also allow the student to network with others in their field. As scholars and women who want to change the world, networking is imperative to our development as woman and career-driven women.

For others, employment and taking time off is a much more attractive option. Being employed helps to foster a sense of confidence and experience, while receiving a mental break from the rigorous coursework that school provides. Not only are these attributes of employment influential, but many graduate schools are now seeking students who have had work experience prior to their enrollment. This experience assists in grasping various concepts and contributes to a more impressive resume. Graduate schools look at more than essays, letters of recommendation, and exceptional GPAs. Students who choose to enter the workforce usually have graduate school plans in the near future and use this precious time as a way to prepare for tests and save money for tuition.

Aside from the attractiveness of independence and self-awareness, there are many factors that influence a student to enter the workforce rather than enroll in graduate school. These factors include debt, career development, and fear.

The decisions that Spelmanites have made greatly depend on the opportunities that are given. While some are going to graduate or professional schools to gain a head start on becoming the next Supreme Court Justice or the female version of Dr. Benjamin Carson, others are entering the "real world" and finding their perspective paths.

Jordan Webber The Valedictorian

Jordan Webber, the 2011 valedictorian, had her pick of colleges to attend. She received acceptance offers from Harvard, Yale, Princeton, Brown, Columbia and Stanford.

Coming from a predominantly White girls' high school in Bethesda, Md., Webber looked forward to not only the academic rigors of Spelman, but also the cultural exploration that an HBCU distinctly offered.

"I was in for a journey, with my Spelman sisters, at a college that had been successful at developing women of African-American descent who would go on to do amazing things," said Webber a political science major with a 3.975 GPA. "This allowed for an academic experience that was unique and key in my personal development."

A Phi Beta Kappa and Pi Sigma Alpha National Political Science Honor Society inductee, Webber was one of 16 students in the United States to be named a Goldman Sachs Global Leader in 2009. That same year, she was selected to attend the Public Policy and Leadership Conference Program at the John F. Kennedy School of Government at Harvard. Toward the end of her junior year, Webber won an Arthur Liman Public Interest Law Summer Undergraduate Fellowship at Yale Law School, and that summer interned for the Joint Center for Political and Economic Studies in Washington, D.C.

Webber intends to be a third-generation attorney with a career in public interest

law. "I want to represent people who may not always know they are entitled to representation," said Webber, who will work as a legal assistant for the law firm McKenna Long and Aldridge LLP in Atlanta for a year before applying to law school.

Shayna Johnson

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THe activist

It is a long way to the top, but Shayna Johnson arrived there with class and style, in the true fashion of a Spelman woman. A native of Fort Lauderdale, Florida, Johnson is the salutatorian for the 2011 senior class.

The journey was not always easy. Johnson was involved in many activities including A.C.T.S., Homeless Pets as a Site Volunteer, Partnership Against Domestic Violence as a Victim Advocate, and Relay for Life as a Publicity Committee Member. With the addition of financial burdens, academic responsibilities and leadership positions, she soon discovered that her toughest challenge at Spelman was time management. "I found myself taking on more responsibilities and finding less time to focus on myself," Johnson said.

The second step to analyzing a problem is to find a solution. Johnson overcame this obstacle by relegating an hour a day to doing something that made her happy and relaxed.





When asked to give advice to her underclassmen sisters Mason stated, "To underclassmen who are feeling discouraged about finishing their matriculation, do not worry about not finishing but worry about the things they can and will do to finish." She believes that it is important not to stress about the little things and to surround yourself with positive people who have your best interest at heart.

Mason also believes that Spelman helped her to grow and develop as well as gave her the determination to go after her dream. Next year she plans to receive her Master's in Public Health concentrating in the area of behavioral science and health education. "The thing that kept me motivated and focused



throughout my matriculation at Spelman were the support my friends and the push I received from different faculty, staff, and other alumnae," said Mason. "Without constant words of encouragement, faith, and drive, I would not be where I am today."

During Kendra's junior year, her mother was diagnosed with breast cancer, which dually served as Hyson's inspiration and source of sadness. "My mother has influenced my passion. My love of art comes from watching her work so diligently," stated Hyson.

Although Hyson has achieved both inside and outside the classroom, her senior year proved to be the most difficult for many reasons. This year she was forced to overcome the adversities of working two jobs, completing school, in addition to graduating and being a support system for her mother. "Due to [my mother's] illness she had to leave her job and because of the economy she is still out of work. Although she has won her battle with cancer

things are still difficult because of this economic strain," said Hyson.



Even though there were some trying times Hyson, refused to quit and is proudly graduating with the Class of 2011, and thanks her friends for supporting her throughout her matriculation. "Although they don't always know what exactly is going on in my life, they are always there for support and to give me a good laugh when I'm feeling a little down in the dumps," Hyson added.

After graduation Hyson plans to take a year off and focus on her art. As a student Kendra served as the Director of Publicity and Creative Director of P.U.L.S.E., captain of the softball team, a member of the Diverge art club, and a lifeguard for the Wellness Center. And is a member of Alpha Lambda Delta Honor Society and the National Society of Collegiate Scholars.

Michelle R. Fench is a Pauline E. Drake Scholar from Detroit, Michigan. She is also a member of the Spelman College staff where she works full time as a Sergeant for Spelman's Public Safety. Fench's journey to earning a degree is not typical because she had to postpone getting her degree when she was younger because of numerous roadblocks. Like many traditional students Fench had financial problems and was forced to postpone her education.

In addition, to financial problems Fench has overcome several challenges including living with Lupus, which is a collection of diseases that can affect many different body systems including joints, skin and heart.

Also, her Spelman career was almost interrupted when she was diagnosed with Breast Cancer, however her cancer was diagnosed early and Fench was able to continue with her education. "It was a very hard time for me but my trust in God and the support of the faculty, staff and fellow students helped during my trying time," said Fench.

At the age of 43, Fench has completed her Bachelors of Art degree at Spelman and plans to pursue a Master's of Business Administration with a concentration in Public Administration at Keller Graduate School this fall. As a student at Keller Graduate School Fench will prepare herself for a career with the justice system. Eventually Fench wants to work in the juvenile court system as a Juvenile Probation Officer.

"I always promised myself that I would finish [school] so that I could be an example for someone else and enhance the lives of troubled youth," said Fench.

In addition to being a PED student, Fench is also a member of the National Society of Leadership and Success and she was elected Miss Pauline E. Drake Scholar 2010-2011.

She accredits Spelman College to improving her writing skills as well as enhancing her critical thinking. "I would encourage underclassmen to continue to strive for excellence," said Fench. "There will be roadblocks and problems, but I would advise them to find someone who has been a positive influence and a 'talk to' person if they ever feel discouraged."

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2011 Honorary Degree Recipients

As the 2010-2011 academic year draws to a close, the date on which members of the class of 2011 receive their diplomas rapidly approaches. However, graduating seniors are not the only individuals who will be honored with a degree on May 15, 2011. This year, Spelman College honorary degree recipients include First Lady Michelle Obama, actress Phylicia Rashad, and dance pioneer Debbie Allen. Wendy Kopp, the CEO and founder of Teach for America, will be receiving the Community Service Award.

First Lady Michelle Obama was born Michelle LaVaughn Robinson and was raised on the South Side of Chicago. She attended Princeton University and Harvard Law School before returning to Chicago to work at the Sidley Austin law firm. It was there that she met her future husband, current President Barack Obama. Later, she worked on the staff of Chicago mayor Richard M. Daley and for the University of Chicago Medical Center. During the Presidential campaign of 2007 and 2008, she helped campaign for her husband's presidential bid. She also delivered a keynote address at the 2008 Democratic National Convention. She is the mother of two daughters, Malia and Sasha, and is the sister of Craig Robinson, men's basketball coach at Oregon State University. First lady Michelle Obama is often viewed as a fashion icon and is often compared to Jackie Onassis Kennedy. Even more impressive than her impeccable style is her desire to improve the health of people in the United States through her campaign promoting physical activity and healthy food choices.

Phylicia Rashad, formerly known as Phylicia Ayers-Allen, was raised in Houston, TX. Rashad is an American Tony Award winning actress and singer but is best known for her role as Claire Huxtable on the popular NBC sitcom *The Cosby Show*. Rashad became the first African-American actress to win the Tony Award for Best Performance by a Leading Actress in a Play, for her role in the revival of *A Raisin in the Sun*. She played the same role in the 2008 television adaption of *A Raisin in the Sun* and won the 2009 NAACP Image Award for Outstanding Actress in a Television Movie, Mini-Series or Dramatic Special. Rashad was dubbed "the mother" of the African American community at the 42nd NAACP Image Awards, and will forever be thought seen as a positive portrayal of black motherhood.

Deborrah "Debbie" Allen is a woman of many talents. She is an acclaimed actress, dancer, choreographer, television director, television producer, and a member of the President's Committee on the Arts and Humanities. Although Allen has made many notable accomplishments throughout her lifetime, she is best known for her work on the 1982 musical-drama television series *Fame*, where she portrayed dance teacher Lydia Grant, and served as the series' principal choreographer. Allen is also the younger sister of actress/singer Phylicia Rashad.

Teach for America founder and CEO Wendy Kopp was an undergraduate in the Woodrow Wilson School of Public and International Affairs, Princeton University. In 1988, Kopp proposed the creation of Teach for America in her undergraduate thesis. She was advised by senior sociology professor Marvin Bressler. Kopp believed that many fellow college graduates were "searching for a way to assume a significant responsibility that would make a real difference in the world and that top college students would choose teaching over more lucrative opportunities if a prominent teacher corps existed." She received her Bachelor of Arts degree from Princeton in 1989 and was a member of Princeton's Business Today. Upon graduating from Princeton, Kopp founded *Teach for America*. She also serves as the Chief Executive Officer of *Teach for All*, an organization that seeks to apply the methods of *Teach for America* to the education systems of foreign countries. Although she is an international icon for her impressive background and down to earth charm, Mrs. Obama was so sought


after because of how much of a role model she is for Spelman students.


