Solden Anniversary Concert

On Friday, Saturday and Sunday evenings, December 3, 4, and 5, the Spelman and Morehouse Glee Clubs combined to perform their fiftieth annual Christmas Carol Concert in Sisters Chapel. This Golden Anniversary Concert presented an appealing blend of the old and the new in its nineteen selections.

The first part of the program featured traditional selections for mixed chorus and was conducted by Dr. Wendell Whalum of Morehouse College. While each of these was uniquely beautiful, one is always exhilarated by the inter-

twining melodies of four Christmas carols in the arrangement by Gustave Holst entitled "Christmas Day".

The next part of the program featured the Spelman Glee Club directed by Dr. Roland Allison of the Department of Music, with a haunting performance of A Ceremony of Carols by the recently deceased British composer, Sir Benjamin Britten. Spelman was fortunate in having Ms. Judith Beattie of the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra accompany the Glee Club on the harp in order to provide an authentic performance of the composition.



After the Morehouse Glee Club, directed again by Dr. Whalum, presented its traditional works from both Africa and the West, the mixed chorus returned with Dr. Allison conducting the powerful "Te Deum" by Anton Bruckner. Dr. Whalum then took over the mixed chorus for more traditional Christmas music (including African) to round out the concert.

Of special note to us at Spelman was the continuing excellence of the accompaniment by Dr. Joyce Finch Johnson, professor of music, the lovely solo singing in the

"Te Deum" by Mrs. Laura English Robinson, assistant professor of music, and the soli sung in various parts of the concert by Spelman students Cynthia Thompson, Hazella Rollins, Ayakao Gallman, and Wanda Howard.

The general excellence of this Golden Anniversary Concert was climaxed by the superior performances of the Britten and Bruckner compositions conducted by Dr. Allison. Let us hope that we will have many more Christmas Carol Concerts as successful as this one.

Women in Science Career Workshop

A Women in Science Career Workshop was held on the Spelman College campus on Saturday, October 30, from 9:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. The purpose of the workshop was to motivate young women of high potential to pursue graduate study in science. The workshop was funded by the National Science Foundation through its Women in Science Program.

Approximately 150 junior and senior college women from Georgia colleges participated in the workshop.

They received detailed information concerning various careers in the social and natural sciences, and in engineering. They received advice on the selection of a graduate school, admission procedures and financial aid.

Outstanding women scientists from Spelman and other educational institutions, government, and industry served as panelists and speakers. Presentations were also made by an employment specialist and a testing specialist.

The morning session consisted of two panels: "Opportunities for Women in Science—The Employment Picture of the 80s," and "Graduate School Admission and Student Support." In the afternoon, the participants attended small workshop sessions on "Graduate Training for Preparation for Careers in Biology, Chemistry, Mathematical Sciences, Economics, Engineering, Physics, Psychology, Sociology and Political Science." The group reassembled for the final presentation, "Life in Graduate School."

Dr. Etta Z. Falconer, professor of mathematics and chair of the Department and of the Division of Natural Sciences, was director of the workshop.

Spelman Dance Group in "Swing Low."

Swing Low, a production depicting the history of religious music of blacks, was presented on December 11, 1976 in the Atlanta Civic Center by the Atlanta Philharmonic Chorale with the cooperation of the Bureau of International and Cultural Affairs of the City of Atlanta. The production was a gift from the City to the Atlanta community and included a series of dances by the Spelman College Heritage Repertory Workshop.

The dance played a most significant role in the development of religious songs and rituals from slavery to the present, and the Spelman dancers were invited to interpret this aspect of black history. Ms. Pearl Primus, pioneer of black concert dance and an anthropologist, served as a consultant and assisted with the choreography for the series of dances. Ms. Primus has spent over thirty years researching the religious dance heritage of blacks, and her research has taken her to Africa, the Caribbean, the Deep South, and other parts of the country. Because of her expertise and assistance with the choreography, every gesture, step, and floor pattern in the dances were symbolic of the black heritage. One of the works presented was choreographed entirely by Ms. Primus; other works were choreographed by Mozel J. Spriggs, coordinator of the Spelman Dance Program and director of the Heritage Workshop Dancers.

Spelman College Family Planning Program

The Family Planning Program at Spelman College was initiated as a funded pilot program in October 1972 for students, faculty, and staff in the Atlanta University Center. The continuation of funding by the State of Georgia Department of Human Resources, the Ford Foundation, and the Rockefeller Foundation has permitted the program to develop into full-scale services. The increase in the patient load (from ten to twenty patients per clinic session) and in the full-time and parttime staff has contributed greatly to the overwhelming acceptance of the program by the community at large.

The purpose of the project is to enhance freedom as well as responsibility among young adults through education. Increased knowledge and awareness of one's psychosexual development and needs, family planning, and population dynamics in relationship to one's total health are points of emphasis.

The objective of the project is to provide information, medical services, and contraceptives for individuals in the Atlanta University Center, so that intelligent choices regarding one's reproductive health may be made. Family Planning protects the health of parents and children by confining childbearing to the most safe reproductive years, enables the best spacing of births, and encourages the optimal physical, emotional, and educational development of each individual. Through family planning education and medical services, the project hopes to assist the participants to reach their full potential.

The number of persons eligible to receive services from this program is approximately 9,000 students, faculty, and staff. Through educational services, i.e., rap sessions, health seminars, and clinical services for both males and females, most of the eligible persons are reached.

Employment of a health educator affords the program formal and informal educational activities. Formal course offerings in Human Sexuality and Family Planning/Population Education reach over forty students each semester. Informal rap sessions are held on each college campus in the dormitories and at freshmen assemblies.

New patients attend a Patient Edu-

cation Seminar, the format of which includes discussions of the following topics: "Human Reproduction of Males and Females"; "Conception and Pregnancy"; "Menstruation"; "Contraceptive Technology"; "Sexually Transmitted Infections"; and the clinic procedures. A slide series called Sex and Self is shown, followed by a discussion of its content. Patients have an opportunity to discuss their concerns. Literature is distributed on sexuality and contraception. Literature and films are provided for the patients to read and view during their clinic visits.

The medical services component includes a wide variety of clinical and laboratory services. The medical examinations performed by the nurse practitioner or the OB-GYN physician include a pap smear, breast examination, with instructions to patients, abdominal or pelvic examinations, and gonorrhea screening. Laboratory services include blood pressure readings, measurement of weight and height, hematocrits, urinalyses, sickledex, and pregnancy testing. The comprehensive medical services emphasize preventive care to the participant patients. Social and medical histories are obtained by counselors before any examinations and all medical records comply with the National Center for Family Planning Service requirements.

Referrals and counseling services are available for services not provided by the clinic, e.g., vasectomy, pregnancy termination, infertility, sexual therapy, and counseling.

The program staff includes a medical director who advises on the medical and educational services; a project director/health educator who supervises the program activities and teaches the formal courses; the service director/ nurse practitioner who provides clinical expertise in counseling and educating patients and gives medical examinations: OB-GYN consultants who conduct medical examinations and provide leadership in medical services; patient interviewers who counsel patients and complete medical histories of patients before they see the clinician; and a medical technologist who is responsible for performing laboratory tests and for the training of student assistants for laboratory work.

The extension of these medical ser-

vices to the college community includes luncheon sessions and health seminars for the clerical and administrative staff of the Center institutions.

The projected activities for the year include:

(A) Clinical Services

Clinical services will be increased gradually during the coming year to include: Family Planning medical services, education, and counseling for males; two additional clinic sessions for patients needing medical follow-ups; a refill clinic to increase the service hours from approximately eight hours per week to a total of eighteen hours per week; and clinic services to faculty and staff of the Atlanta University Center by reserving one clinic a month for them. In the past, only two clinics per year have been offered to faculty and staff.

(B) Educational Expansion

A new course. Health Services Administration, will be offered during the second semester of the 1976-77 academic year. The course outline includes general information on urban health problems, e.g., cardiovascular and neoplasm diseases, communicable diseases, nutrition, family planning, and human sexuality. Representatives of medical care organizations, both private and public, will discuss the administration of health care facilities. The suggested textbook, The Dynamics of Disease, by Drs. Carter L. Marshall and David Pearson will give students a firsthand view of today's health problems and the organizations which contribute to the solving of problems. Visits to the Center for Disease Control, the Family Planing Program on campus, and local health departments provide onsite information about the administration of health services by various organizations.

(C) Outreach Activities

Community education is an important focus of Spelman's program. Health seminars coordinated by the student assistants and nurse practitioner are being planned for the coming year. Topics of the Health Seminars will include: "Rape and Self Defense"; "Male Health Problems"; "Hypertension"; "Sex-

ually-transmitted Infections": "Problem Pregnancies"; and "Human Sexuality." The human sexuality seminars will include discussions on

topics such as homosexuality, contraception, sexual dysfunction, and deviate sexual behavior. In order to reach all students, faculty and staff, a task force of representatives from each school will be established to coordinate these seminars.

Renovations to Tapley Hall

An extensive renovation of the science building, Tapley Hall, was undertaken in 1974 and completed in April 1976. This building was constructed in 1925 and received its first renovation in the summer of 1973 which involved several biology laboratories, a chemistry laboratory, a mathematics laboratory, and two classrooms. The remaining portion of the building was renovated in 1974-76 and a new ground-level annex constructed adjoining the original building. This work has created a modern, well-equipped science building.

The basic work in the older building included lowering ceilings, tiling floors, painting, sandblasting, roof repair, and the repartitioning of some areas; in addition, new doors were installed and obsolete furniture and equipment replaced. Existing space was used to provide four office-research laboratory combinations for biology faculty, a science reading room, a seminar room, and a biostatistics/statistics laboratory.

The new annex covers 4,500 square feet and includes a student biochemistry laboratory for twenty-four students, two office-research laboratory combinations for chemistry faculty, a chemistry storeroom, and two faculty offices. The laboratory is adjoined by a walk-in cold room and a temperature-controlled instrument room. The annex has two outside entrances and access to a parking area.

The first floor of Tapley including the annex is centrally airconditioned. Individual units are installed in classrooms and faculty offices on the second and third floors. Comfortable lounge areas have been provided.

A biology laboratory was renovated to provide a nutrition research laboratory for twelve students. This laboratory, named in honor of a Spelman graduate, Gladys Williams Powell ('35), is used for the teaching of nutrition courses involving analytical methods

as well as for food microbiology, protein analysis, calorie studies, titrimetric techniques, extraction procedures, chromatography, and electrophoresis.

Funds for renovation, construction, and equipment were provided by the Ford, Kresge, Commonwealth, Dreyfus, and Rockefeller Foundations, and by the Coca-Cola Company.

It is the feeling of the science faculty that teaching effectiveness has increased immeasurably due to the improved physical facilities. Faculty and students have begun to conduct additional research projects. Finally, the number of majors in the Division of Natural Sciences has increased from 244 in the fall of 1974 to the present 374.





Biochemistry/Nutrition Program

Nutrition has advanced remarkably during the past few decades and the search for answers to questions on adequate dietaries for human beings has been generated through the efforts of research. Since 1974, the Division of Natural Sciences has made steady progress in the development of its Biochemistry/Nutrition Program, which is an interdisciplinary science-based program designed to provide training for students in the employment of basic principles of nutrition through biochemical techniques used in the assessment of nutritional status. These techniques provide students with the knowledge and skills of the research methodology used in the prevention of diet-related diseases.

The uniqueness of the program may be recognized by its attempts to focus upon both the science and practice of nutrition. Field practicums for students are assigned in health care facilities as well as in community health care institutions. Carefully structured experiences designed as field study projects allow students the opportunity ty to participate in public health or research in nutrition as part of a health-care team.

Students enrolled in the Biochemistry/Nutrition Program will be making full use of the recently renovated laboratory with modern equipment purchased with funds from two grants received from the Rockefeller Founda-

tion and the Atlanta Gas Light Company. The laboratory design is dual purpose in that one side is equipped with kitchen facilities for diet preparation and the other side allows for biochemical analyses.

On April 13, 1976, the nutrition research laboratory was dedicated and named in honor of Mrs. Gladys Williams Powell ('35). Dr. Zelma Payne is director of the Biochemistry/Nutrition Program.

Credit Union Established

In early November, Spelman employees became eligible to join the Atlanta Teachers Federal Credit Union. The initial cost of enrollment enables members to either save or borrow through payroll deductions. It is hoped that all employees will take advantage of the opportunity to save automatically through the payroll deduction plan. The interest rate on savings is currently 6 percent, but discussions are now taking place in an attempt to have this rate increased.

A request has been made to the Union to have its representative on the campus at least once a week to handle credit union business. In the meantime, the Staff Development Office is handling all inquiries.

To date, more than sixty employees have enrolled.

On Tuesday, January 4, ID pictures were taken and Foreign Language and

Individual Registration Conferences were scheduled for the remainder of the day. In the evening, President and Mrs. Stewart held a welcoming reception in Reynolds Cottage for the new students and members of the Orientation Committee.

Enrollment

Student enrollment for the first semester was the highest in its history. There were 1284 students enrolled; they came from forty states, including the District of Columbia and the Virgin Islands, and from fourteen foreign countries: Bahamas, Bermuda, Ethiopia, France, Guyana, Kenya, Liberia, Nigeria, Rhodesia, Seychelles, South Africa, Tanzania, Viet Nam, and Zambia.

Albert E. Manley Presidential Scholars

The names of the Albert E. Manley Presidential Scholars were announced in 1976; they are Deborah Hunter (History) of Kingstree, South Carolina; Zelice Brown (Economics) of Columbia, South Carolina; Denise Marshall (Politcal Science) of Albany, Georgia; Sandra Stroud (Psychology) of South Bend, Indiana; and Patricia Hampton (Sociology) of Washington, D.C. These students, now sophomores, had grade point averages for the first semester of their freshman year of 3.5 and above.

The Albert E. Manley Presidential Scholars, funded by the Merrill Foundation, are students, one each from the Departments of History, Economics, Political Science, Psychology, and Sociology. They are being guided through research for three years of their academic study at the College. Special attention is being given to these students with the hope that by their junior and/or senior year they will have produced research which will be publishable individually or jointly with faculty.


