Parents your job has been one of tears and smiles. Through the years you have been our teacher, counselors and inspiration. We appreciate and love you for your untiring efforts and devotion.

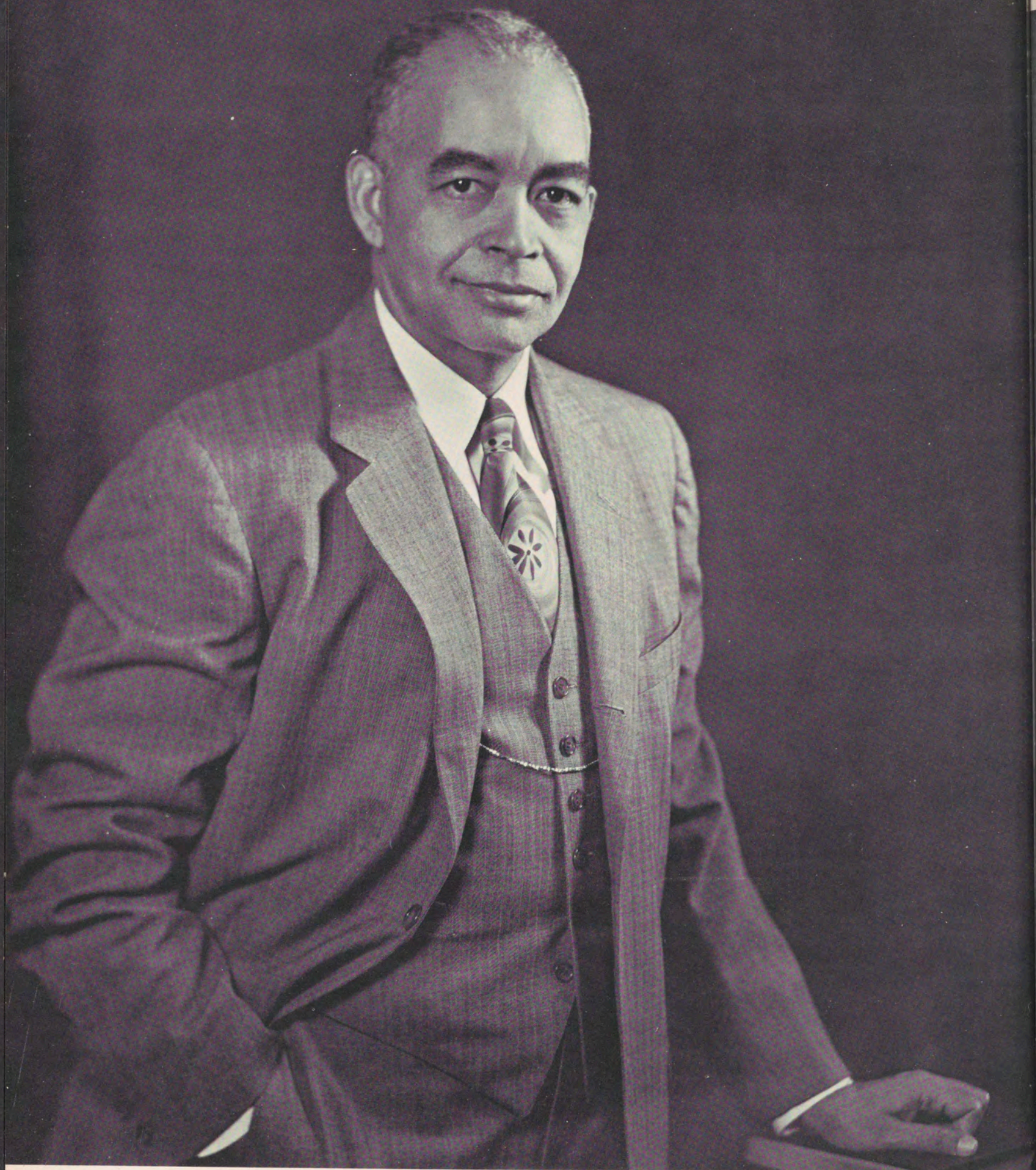

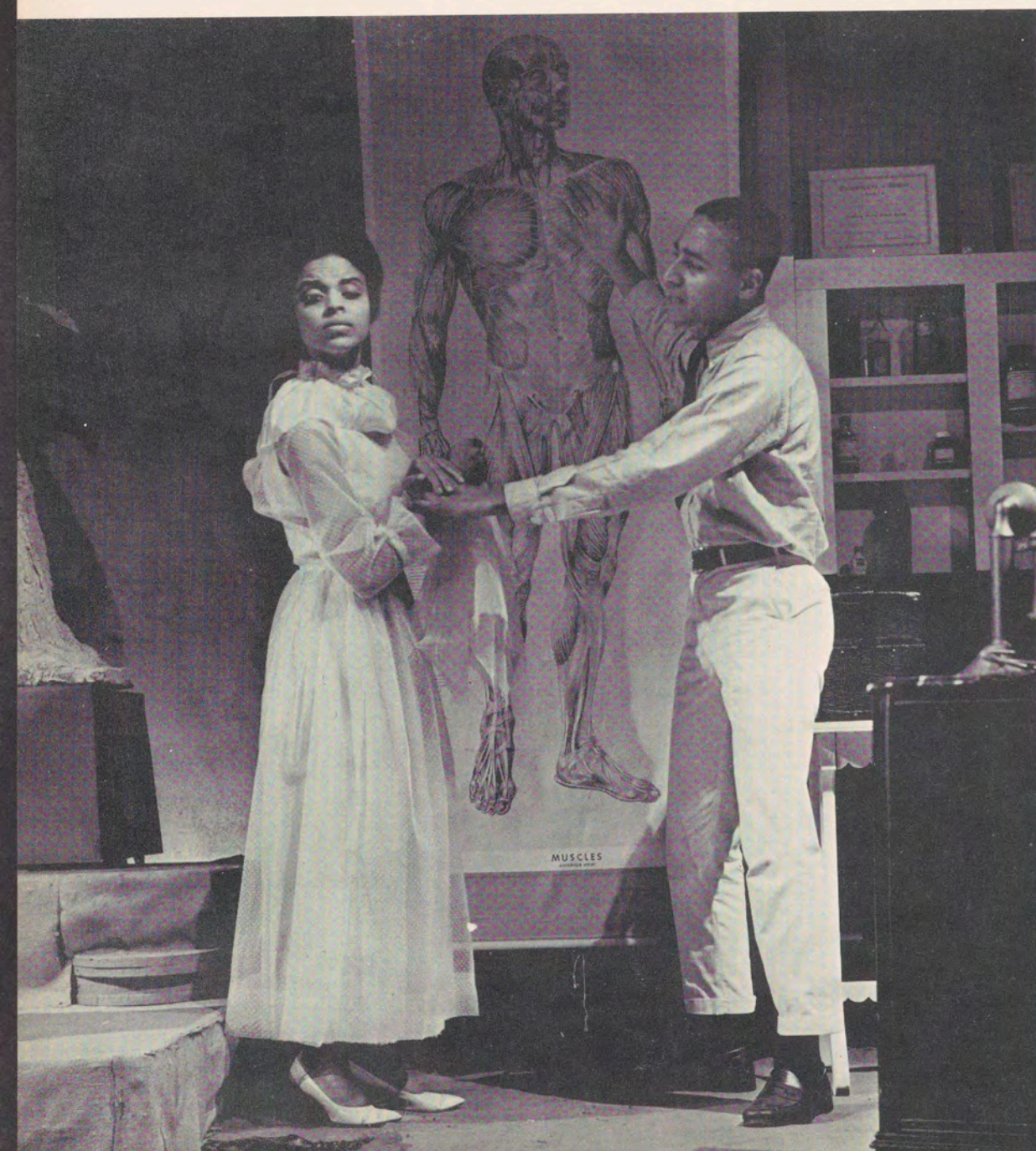




## THE AMS PLAYERS

These students direct their time and efforts toward several dramatic presentations each year.

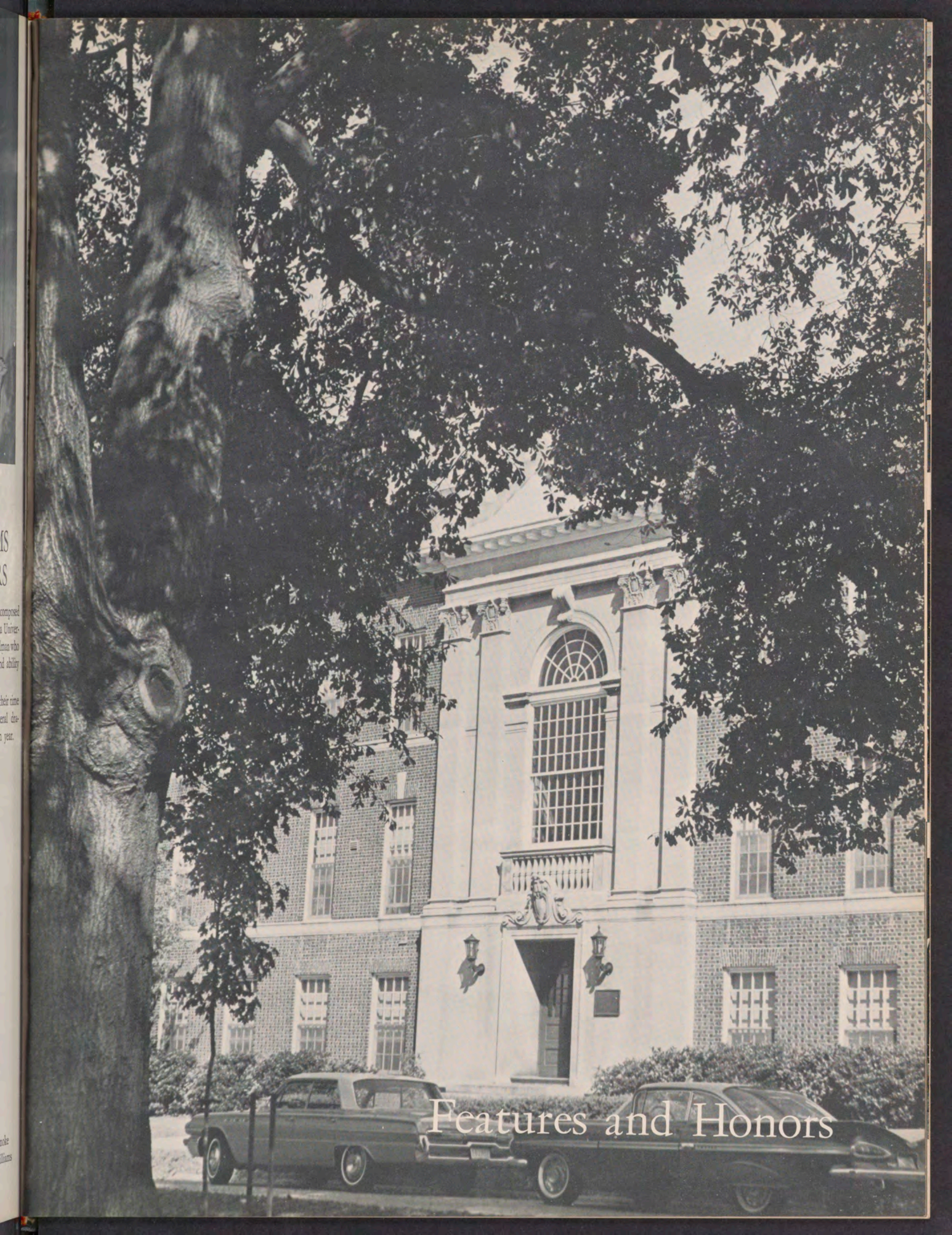
